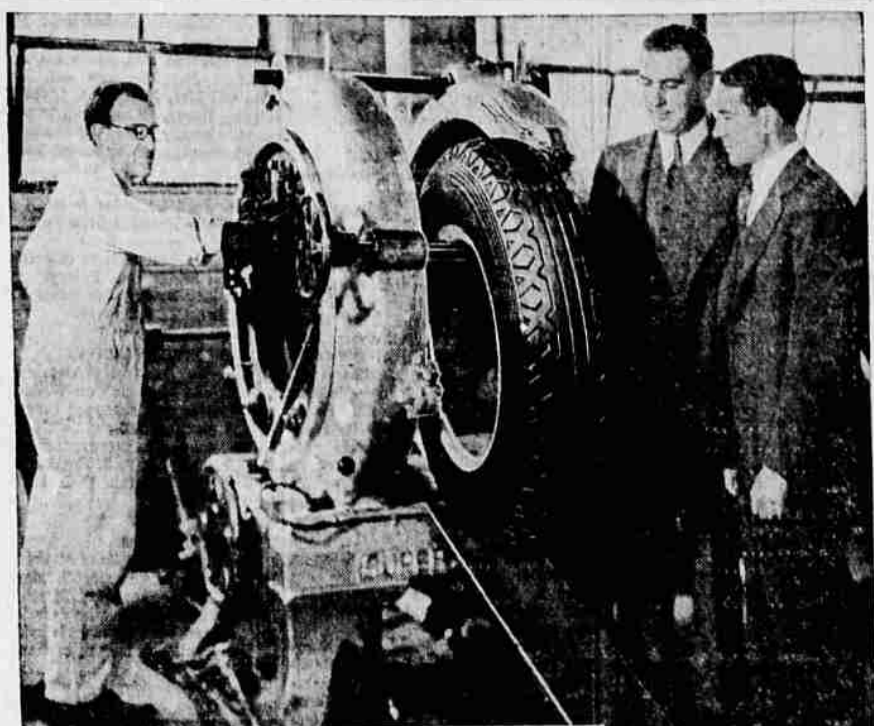


STAR OF JUNCTION ELECTS OFFICERS

another one comes roaring through the straits. Always apprehensive of capsizing in their shallow bottomed boat in one of the gales, continually sweeping them along, the two men sailed over Admiralty Sound, through Gabriel channel, around Brecknock peninsula, into Desolate bay, on the west side of the Cape Horn group.

From Ushuaia through Murray Narrows to Cape Horn on the southern part of Cape Horn island, the utter desolation of this region, said Burg, was not only depressing but in its way impressive.

There are three tribes of Indians in this area: two tribes of Canoe Indians who live in and about the Cape Horn group and the Patagonian channels to the north.

The Indians down there are fast disappearing, according to Burg. Any bad epidemic might wipe them out. Up to now very little was known of the lives and customs. It was Burg's purpose to photograph these natives and record their histories and customs for posterity.

Returning to Magallanes by transport Burg shipped the "Dorjun" to Buenos Aires and shipped out around the Horn around the east side and up the west side of South America for 1000 miles in a training ship of the Chilean navy.

Going back to Magallanes Burg shipped from there up to Rio de Janeiro where he remained for several weeks taking color plates and pictures of that city.

Burg spent 22 days in Rio de Janeiro and about 10 days in Sao Paulo taking color plates of the coffee plantations there. This spot is the center of the coffee industry in Brazil, the greatest coffee producing country in the world.

Continuing northward the explorer stopped at Barbados island in the British West Indies, the second most densely populated island in the world.

Burg expects to remain in Oregon until about March, when he is to go to Washington, D. C., to lecture before the National Geographic Society.

While in Portland, he is to lecture and show pictures of his trip. He also may return to lecture in Eugene, where he attended the university for several years.

Sour Milk Waffles. 1 1/2 cups cake flour, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 3 beaten egg yolks, 1 cup sour milk, 1/4 cup butter melted, 3 stiffly beaten egg whites.

Sift flour and measure, then add soda, salt and sugar and sift twice. Add the beaten egg yolks, milk and melted butter and beat with egg beater until smooth. Then carefully fold in whites with mixing spoon.

Bake until crisp. Makes five large waffles. Serve with butter and honey. Success depends on a light hand—Mrs. Frederick Frey, Goshen.
