Eugene's Yuletide will be given a festive start, Saturday evening, when will be staged the annual Christmas Revels for university faculty and students and townspeople. The party is planned for 8 o'clock Saturday evening in Gerlinger hall. A very small admission fee is asked.

A varied program, worked out under the direction of S. Stephenson Smith, faculty chairman for the party, and Miss Henriette Horak, student chairman, will be presented along the manner of old English Yuletide.

Dancing is to be featured this year, the rest of the program to take up less time this year. A chorus of Christmas carols is to be featured, too. Special stunts from the faculty and student groups will be given, while to top off the program there will be a joke Christmas tree, with Barney Clark, much discussed campus columnist, to present the "Bronx cheers" to the campus notables, each "notable" to get his appropriate gift.

Among dance features will be a group of faculty folk doing the Virginia reel. A live-wire orchestra is promised for the evening, with 23 tunes lined up for the dances. Numbers will include classic jazz and modern tunes, too. The campus rally team, dressed as "mummers," and a comic tumbling team will be other program features.

of one per cent on the total expenditures under the contract.

The Du Pont company built the plant near Nashville, Tenn., in 1918, under a contract making its fee only \$1.

The contract provided, however, that the company would get a percentage of all powder manufactured which quickly mounted to \$1,961,000, the Du Pont testimony said.

Company officials contended their profit was only \$275,000 after deduction of taxes and disallowance by the government of expense claims. Du Pont told the committee today that Newton D. Baker, then secretary of war, plainly indicated to him in November, 1917, that he considered the Du Pont Powder company "a species of outlaws" because of the terms of concern had insisted on in building the government powder factory.

J. R. Mimi, deputy county good control engineer this morning warned residents that a big fall of water was rushing down Pickens canyon, the mouth of which is only a short distance from the main streets of Montrose.

Pickens canyon was one of those in the foothill area that experienced forest fires last spring, the slopes being benuded of vegetation and marking the region as an easy prey for flood waters in the event of heavy rains.

Pasadena, southeast of the Montrose-La Crescenta area, has experienced rainfall measuring 1.32 inches in the 24-hour area ending this morning, bringing the total for the immediate storm to 3.54 inches, and the total for the season to 11.08 inches. Precipitation for the season at this time last year was 4.39 inches in Pasadena.

The Rules Are Simple

Entrants are to choose the 65 most appropriate verse-answers for the 65 pictures and write them on the answer blanks, together with the names of the Books wherein they are found, and the chapter and verse number of each.
3. Pictures and verse-answers are to be submitted at one time, as a set, before midnight, Saturday, February 23. If they are mailed in, the envelope or package must bear a postmark date of not later than February 23.
4. Entrants may submit as many complete sets as they desire without being disqualified or handicapped in any way. Only one set turned in by a person (that person's best set) will be given a prize, and not more than one member of an immediate family will be eligible for any of the awards.
5. The entrant or entrants submitting the largest number of most appropriate verses and nearest and most attractive verse-answers will be eligible for the first prize. The entrant or entrants submitting the next largest number of most appropriate verses and nearest and most attractive verse-answers will be eligible for the remaining prizes in the order of the appropriateness of their verses and nearestness and attractiveness of their sets. In the event of tie between or among entrants having an equal number of most appropriate verses, and after consideration of the nearestness and attractiveness of their sets a duplicate prize will be awarded each tying entrant.
6. Beneath each of the 65 pictures will be found a ruled space with lines provided for the verse-answers, the names of the Books wherein it is found, chapter and verse numbers, and the entrant's name and address. Entrants may, if they wish, submit each verse-answer for each picture on a sheet of paper 5x8 inches in size, on which may be drawn (not traced) in pen and ink, or with a pencil, a facsimile of the picture and the ruled space with its printed contents. Copies of The Oregonian are on file at libraries where they may be examined without charge.
7. All verse-answers for the series of pictures must be found in a reference book entitled The Bible Treasury, an abridgment of the Scriptures. This book may be consulted free of charge at the office of The Oregonian, or an entrant may ask the authorities of any regularly constituted public library to obtain a copy. The Bible Treasury will be supplied to one public library in each city and town within the territory prescribed by these rules. For your convenience, The Bible Treasury has been printed in booklet form, a copy of which may be had after next Sunday at Bible Game Headquarters, Oregonian business office, for 25c. Postpaid to any address in the Pacific Northwest for 35c.
8. A committee of official judges will inspect the sets of pictures and verse-answers when submitted. Their decision will be final and entrants take part in the Bible Game with this understanding.
9. The Oregonian reserves the right to keep all sets of pictures and verse-answers submitted.
10. The Bible Game is non-sectarian. Hence The Oregonian will not interpret verses, publicize sectarian views, or engage in correspondence on these subjects.
