

HOPKINS PLEADS FOR THOUGHT OF FOLK ON RELIEF

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—(AP)—Harry L. Hopkins, federal emergency relief administrator, today broadcast an appeal for a sympathetic understanding by the rest of the country for the "eighteen million people on relief."

He painted a vivid picture of the destitution and want that existed in all parts of the country even among the people who were on relief and reminded his listeners that all of it was not a result of the depression.

Describing several extreme cases he said, "such poverty does not creep up on us overnight."

"We should allow ourselves no vague feelings of charity at this holiday season," he said, "to know that the federal government is attempting to take care of the actual physical wants of eighteen million people. We are merely paying damages for not having had a thought about things many years ago. We will have to do a great deal of thinking from here out."

He defended the administration's effort to displace straight relief payments by work projects, in spite of the increased cost, as the only way to preserve the morale of the unemployed.

"Work for the unemployed is something we have fought for since the beginning of the administration, and we shall continue to fight for it," he said.

COUNCIL APPROVES BOND ISSUE SALE

WHAT THE COUNCIL DID RECEIVED bids on bond issue. APPROVED payment of fund for city parks. ORDERED light for McKy court.

On a bid of \$9,271, from the Portland bond firm of Ferris and Hardgrove, the Eugene city bond issue of \$75,000, authorized by voters at the last election, was sold at a special meeting of the city council Friday evening. Interest on the bonds will be 4 1/2, instead of 5 per cent as authorized in the election.

In selling this bid, which means that for each \$100 of the issue, the city receives \$99.27 and a fraction, the city was enabled to obtain the low rate of interest. Funds derived from this sale will be used to pay off contractors' warrants on city street improvements, the city saving greatly on interest charges since the warrants draw six per cent.

The council voted, on recommendation of the fire and water committee, to give \$50 a year toward care of the city park blocks near the court house. The council also authorized placement of a light in the McKy court. The matter of the assessment against the Gaylord property for payment of the raising costs was put over till the next regular meeting.

The council passed on file a petition asking for a sidewalk on the highway east of the Anchorage to the city limits.

mittee assignments on the city council will be made at the council's meeting early in January.

Selection of a juvenile officer for the city will follow answers to the questionnaire being prepared; it was announced Saturday by Judge Fred Flek. H. R. Gould, city school superintendent, is directing the preparation of the questionnaire. Training along social science lines, some legal background and general experience in juvenile cases is regarded as necessary in properly filling this position, Superintendent Gould said.

The juvenile officer will receive \$1800 a year, \$500 from the city, \$500 from the school district and \$800 from the county. He will have all cases of delinquent youth, will investigate these cases and is expected to devote considerable time to a program of prevention of juvenile delinquency in Eugene.

The names of the 14 applicants for the job were not divulged by Judge Flek Saturday.

The sound of Christmas bells, the sight of the familiar Salvation Army Christmas kettles on the streets of Eugene are a reminder to all that this sacred season of the year is here.

This present Christmas effort is third of a group of three specific instances when the public of Eugene have been asked to cooperate with our organization in our efforts to assist in bringing cheer and help to the poor and needy. The first of these efforts, The home service drive, while not reaching our objective, made it possible for us under Dean Wayne L. Morse of the U. of O., and the Army advisory board to clear the Eugene Corps of all local debt amounting to \$1179.00 and to have a little cash each month to meet current bills; thus laying a fine foundation for the Army work and drive in October of 1935.

The second effort which called for cooperation of Eugene citizens was the annual Thanksgiving Dinner for the poor. This was a decided success. Everyone who came was fed. All bills incurred were paid, and some supplies were leftover for the Christmas boxes.

This statement brings me now to the third subject which to be a success must have the cooperation of a large number of the citizens of Eugene. We are planning boxes of provisions for 200 families valuation of each box to be \$3.00. This will provide not only food for the family's Christmas dinner but food for several days after. Tickets for those boxes will be distributed Tuesday afternoon, 2:30 o'clock, December 18 at the Army Relief headquarters, 65 W. 8th street. Boxes will be distributed Christmas morning beginning at 9 o'clock at the same place.

Foodstuffs and fruits of all kinds as well as vegetables and meat must be provided and delivered to the relief office before December 25, as the boxes will be packed Monday night the 24 of December by Army workers. We cannot take care of these two hundred families unless the people of Eugene respond quickly and generously with provisions and money to buy articles such as coffee, sugar, etc., etc. Provisions may be delivered at the relief office 65 W. 8th and cash may be brought to the same place or mailed to the Army care P. O. Box 245.

The annual Christmas party for the poor will be held in the Army hall, 7th and Pearl streets on Christmas night Tuesday Dec. 25th at 8 o'clock, nuts, and candy, and good wearable children's clothing are needed; none of which has been received to date save three hundred of toys and a few articles of clothing and a small sack of nuts. There must be an immediate response in this matter.

Yule Apples

3 cups dried apricots, 1 cup filbert meats, 1 cup salted walnuts, 2 slices canned pineapple well drained, 3 cups shredded coconut, 2 teaspoons grated orange rind, 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind, 1/4 cup lemon juice.

Wash the apricots and steam 5 minutes. Put the apricots, coconut, nutmeats and pineapple through a food chopper. Add the orange and lemon rinds and lemon juice. Knead the mixture until the ingredients are completely blended. If too moist work in a small amount of confectioner's sugar. Shape into balls about one inch in diameter (or larger if desired). Roll in granulated sugar. Insert whole cloves at top and bottom to represent the stem and blossom. Wrap each yule apple in cellophane (dark blue preferred). Have your wrapper large enough so the four corners can be pulled together and twisted, and then tie with a bright colored piece of string or ribbon. Makes a nice ornament for the Christmas tree.
