Peanut Butter Bran Bread

1 1/2 cup peanut butter
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1 1/2 cups milk
1 cup bran
2 cups flour
5 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup seedless raisins

Method: Cream the peanut butter and sugar together, add the well beaten egg and the milk. Mix the bran, sifted flour, baking powder and salt and add with the raisins. Mix well. Pour into a greased loaf pan and bake in a moderate oven for 1 1/4 hours at 325 degrees.—Mrs. M. C. Hack, Eugene.

Peanut Butter Puffs

1 cup brown sugar
2 unbleached eggs
1 pinch salt
1 cup chopped dates
1 cup peanut butter
1 cup chopped peanuts or any kind.

Mix all this together and spread this mixture in 1/2 in. layer in greased pan. Bake in slow oven 300 degrees F. 30-40 minutes. Remove from pan and turn on a cake rack cut in 1-inch squares, dust with powdered sugar when cool. This makes 2 dozen. They are very nice for tea and keep for weeks, the older the better they get.—Mrs. M. L. Cowherd, Rt. 3, Eugene.

Peanut Bread

1 cup peanut butter
1 cup milk
2 eggs
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup chopped peanuts

Soak peanut butter in the milk for 1/2 hour, add sugar, well beaten eggs, flour, baking powder, salt and nuts and bake in slow oven about 25 minutes.—Mrs. C. L. Royds, Crow Stage, Eugene.

Peanut Strips

Peanut butter
Lemon juice
Egg white
Chopped peanuts
Pastry

Roll paste very thin. Place on inverted baking tin. Brush half with peanut butter thinned with lemon juice. Cover with the other half and with a sharp knife mark in strips four inches long and one inch wide. Set in a quick oven. When baked, brush with white of egg diluted with one teaspoon of cold water and sprinkle with finely chopped peanuts. Return to the oven for about three minutes until the nuts are slightly crisped, then cut apart.
