

REQUIREMENTS ON HEALTHY CATTLE RATING REVISED

A revision of the requirements for establishing a cattle herd accredited as free from Bang's disease has been ordered by the state agricultural department. It was announced Monday by O. S. Fletcher, county agent, who attended a hearing conducted by Dr. W. H. Lytle, chief of the division of animal industry of the department.

Mr. Fletcher attended the meeting in company with J. W. Maxwell, president of the Eugene Farmers Creamery.

In an order issued by Max Gehlar, state director of agriculture, and Dr. Lytle, the requirements were revised and amended "to the extent that the definition of an accredited abortion free herd shall mean any herd of cattle which has passed at least two successive abortion tests with no reacting cattle, provided Bang's disease control work has been started prior to January 1, 1936, after which date three successive abortion free tests shall be required; these tests being not less than eight nor more than twelve months apart; provided that no reacting cattle have been removed from such a herd within eight months. Any accredited herd certificate issued covering such a herd shall be valid for not more than twelve months."

County Agent Fletcher states that formerly four successive tests with no reacting cattle were required for accreditation and that the revision will assist materially in promoting the federal state plan for the control of Bang's disease that is now under way in Lane county. Since the requirements have been amended, Oregon cattle owners may meet the requirements of the federal agreement for testing cattle for Bang's disease by making one test at their own expense after the free government test, providing the first test shows no reacting cattle.

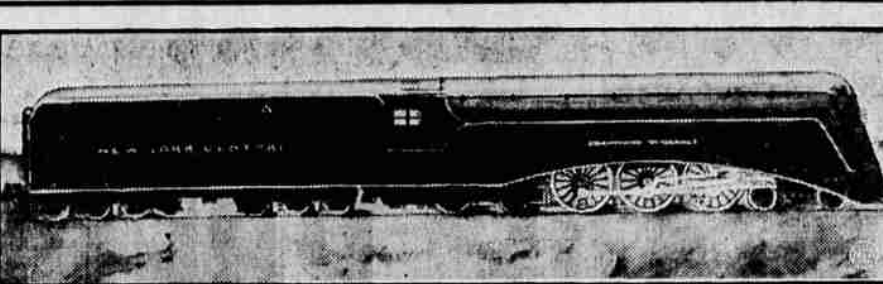
wages and maximum working hours, and the code requirements for fire prevention and reforestation. In these provisions, the industry still has effective tools for stabilizing its operations and maintaining a fair realization for its products, without the difficulties and complexities of legal minimum prices.

The majority of west coast sawmill operators will welcome the board's decision "with relief," he said, adding, however, that many lumbermen also will be disappointed.

"The opinion that minimum prices have proven unworkable and unenforceable has been growing rapidly within the industry during the past four months," he said.

He listed a number of "defects in the set-up" which he said had handicapped the effectiveness of such cost-protection provisions. Among them were: That prices at which lumber is sold to wholesalers have not been controllable, that the government itself has been largely unable to enforce code prices in its own purchases of lumber, and numerous legal difficulties, including "conflicting decisions by various federal courts, that threw the legality of the whole program into doubt."

STREAMLINE STEAM LOCOMOTIVE FACES TEST!



This first streamlined high power steam locomotive soon will be given a series of tests by the New York Central railroad to demonstrate the rail line's faith in steam, despite recent advances in Diesel-powered locomotives in the west. The engine, named the Commodore Vanderbilt, after founder of the road, is streamlined to cut air resistance 35 per cent at a speed of 70 to 90 miles an hour.

Ice Box Peanut Butter Cookies

1 cup shortening

1 cup peanut butter

2 cups brown sugar

2 eggs

2 tablespoons cream

1 teaspoon vanilla

4 cups flour

1 teaspoon soda

Cream shortening, peanut butter and sugar, add well beaten eggs and cream, pinch of salt, then sifted flour in a roll over night; in the morning when ready to bake, slice thin with a sharp knife and bake in a moderate oven until brown.—Mrs. C. C. Dwiggins, Route 1, Eugene.

Peanut Butter Cookies

1 cup peanut butter

1/2 cup shortening

1/2 cup sugar

1 beaten egg

1/2 cup milk

1/2 t. vanilla

2 1/2 cups flour

1/2 t. salt

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 t. nutmeg. Cream the peanut butter and shortening, work in the sugar. Add the egg and milk, then sifted dry ingredients. Roll thin, cut with cookie cutter and bake in a moderate oven.—Mrs. Atwood, Foster, 1081 Jefferson, Cottage Grove.

Peanut Butter French Toast

1/2 cup peanut butter

3 eggs

1 1/2 cups milk

1 teaspoon salt

Pepper

8 slices of bread

Method: Cream peanut butter and work in slightly beaten eggs, then add the milk slowly, and season with salt and pepper. Dip slices of bread into the milk mixture and saute in butter or other cooking fat.—Mrs. M. C. Hack, Eugene.

Noticing a new story from Oregon City to the effect that the election costs in Clackamas county were low in 1933, County Clerk Walter B. The election costs in Clackamas county, according to the story, were \$5,390.54. There are 61 precincts in that county and 25,000 voters. In Lane county, with 96 precincts and 32,000 voters the election costs amounted to only \$3,722.69, the clerk points out.

"Wednesday's Child," at the Heilig, is a picture you owe it to yourself to see. There are a number of reasons for this. One is the superb acting of young Frankie Thomas in the leading role. Another is the finely drawn problem the picture presents, and a third is the understanding direction which makes it one of the really fine pieces of work of the year.

"Judge Priest," at the State, is Will Rogers' crowning achievement. Only one other picture, "David Harum," deserves to rank with it. Will is seen as the kindly judge, tempering justice with mercy, who controls the destinies of nearly all the inhabitants of the little southern town. A swell cast supports him, and its ideal holiday fare.

The Rex closes a picture today which we heartily enjoyed. It has just about everything, and while it isn't billed as a special, it is something many films must feel envious of. In a happy combination of laughs and tears, woven together with a believable plot and competent work by all the principals. Title is "Have a Heart," and it's the story of Jean Parker in love with Jimmy Dunn, Stan Erwin and Una Merkel give grand support.

"Hell in the Heavens," which ends today at the McDonald, offers Warner Baxter as a daredevil aviator on the western front, whose sole purpose in life is to bring down a German airman called the "Baron." The "Baron" is obviously patterned after Baron Manfred von Richthofen, the German terror of the air, but the fact that Baxter nails him in the picture ends made it impossible to so designate him. It's a pleasant picture, though, with the boys flying an occasional patrol and spending the rest of the time drinking Bourbon and champagne. Like college pictures which depict college as it ought to be, "Hell in the Heavens" is a graphic picture of war as it should be fought.
