

PURRI CAT WOMAN BRINGS CHEER TO HAPLESS FELINES

MEDFORD, Ore., Dec. 25.—(AP)—A bowl of milk and an unlighted Christmas tree will bring the Christmas spirit, manifest by loud, contented purring, to the home of Medford's "Cat Woman."

Miss Frances C. Everett, 30, known as "The Cat Woman" because all cats are welcome at her home, knows just how to bring happiness to her family of 10 (or more) cats.

Starry-eyed children at well-kept homes will fondle streamline toys; their joyous shouts will bring happiness to the hearts of parents. Sumptuous feasts await them.

Cats Bring Joy

But the purring and capers of her cats will bring joy and contentment to the Cat Woman who the day after Christmas will celebrate her birthday at her little brown house where the weeds grow tall at the outskirts of the city.

There will be no gifts in the corner. There will be no lights on the Christmas tree, but there will be fancy papers. For Miss Everett knows "that's how cats like it best." She has given them just such a tree each Christmas the past 12 years.

Not the same cats each year, of course, but ever a large group. For when one passes on, soon another laps milk in its place. A blessed event in the cat family, or a stray cat fills the niche.

No Prejudice Here

Miss Everett's house knows no race prejudice, makes no discrimination against color. Persian, Angora, Maltese, Tortoiseshell, black, white and yellow cats find the door open and a pan of milk on the floor.

The Cat Woman is traditional here, and her bent little gray figure is as well known on Medford's streets as mayor, police and fire chief.

During the 18 years she has lived in Medford alone with her feline family she has missed few funerals. She knows the birthdays of the wealthiest and the lowliest children.

And if she isn't in church when the opening hymn is sung the pastor knows "it's her rheumatism again."

Death Ends Career Of "Old Roman" Of Arizona's Politics

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 25.—(AP)—Death today ended the distinctive career of George Wiley Paul Hunt, 75, former waiter, cowboy and copper mine mucker who became such a political power in Arizona that he captured the governorship seven times.

He served as United States minister to Spain in 1920-21 and performed other services for the federal government. His seventh term as governor ended in 1932.

Known as the "Old Roman" of Arizona politics, he first was elected governor in December, 1911, about two months before Arizona was admitted to the union. He was the "baby" state's first, second, third, sixth, seventh, eighth and tenth chief executive.

Mr. Hunt died unexpectedly at his home. Physicians said heart disease was the immediate cause of death, but he had long suffered uremia and diabetes and had been ailed for the past two weeks with a cold and bronchitis.

Christmas Cheer Sales Are Heavy

SALEM, Dec. 25.—(AP)—Holiday cheer in the Capital City resulted in the highest sales under the new liquor era Saturday with promise at noon today the December 24 mark will establish an even higher total, the manager of state liquor store No. 1 announced. Railroad Company Liable For \$10 Fee

SALEM, Dec. 25.—(AP)—The Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company is liable for the payment of a fee of \$10 to the state utility department for filing an application to construct a 30-foot extension to the spur track serving the Triangle mills in Portland, Attorney General Van Winkle ruled today.

The railroad company contended that the payment of the fee was required only when the application was contested. The opinion was sought by Utilities Commissioner Charles M. Thomas.

JOHN DORE FILES COERCION CHARGES AGAINST BREWERS

SPOKANE, Dec. 25.—(AP)—Four suits described as "the first guns in an impending war between members of the Brewery Workers' union and the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, which may spread over the entire west" were filed in superior court today.

John F. Dore, former mayor of Seattle, filed the suits, which charged four Spokane breweries and members of the teamsters' union with conspiring to prevent enforcement of the collective bargaining section of the N.R.A. Dore is Pacific Northwest counsel for the International Brewery Workers' union.

Superior Judge Fred H. Witt immediately signed an order temporarily restraining the companies and teamsters from coercing the brewery workers, making threats to discharge them, hearing representatives in collective bargaining other than those selected by the brewery workers, and from calling any strike against the plants of the four concerns named in the suits.

A permanent injunction was sought and Judge Witt set January 7 as the time for the hearing on the temporary restraining order.

Defendants in the suits are the Spokane Brewing & Malting company, Bohemian Breweries company, International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffeurs, Stablemen and Helpers of America, locals 690 and 174, joint council of teamsters, 28, Portland joint council of teamsters 37 and Dave Beck, northwest organizer of the teamsters' union, Dore said.

"This is not confined to Spokane. All breweries in Portland, Ore., and Vancouver, Wash., were locked up Saturday, throwing hundreds of men out of work. We have obtained a permanent injunction in Walla Walla. The teamsters are putting on this big battle in the northwest to force the American Federation of Labor to recognize the teamsters' union in the east."

"The breweries are playing ball with the teamsters. I understand they plan to spread this battle into California and other states. The teamsters and company representatives will hold a meeting here today, Dore declared, adding he understood they planned to lock out the brewery workers after the first of the year."

Henry F. Ashurst Declines Big Post

PRESCOTT, Ariz., Dec. 25.—(AP)—Henry F. Ashurst, veteran U. S. senator from Arizona, told the Prescott Evening Courier today he had declined the offer of President Roosevelt to name him judge of the ninth circuit court of appeals, San Francisco, to succeed the late William H. Sawtelle, who fell to his death on the stairs of his home last week.

in cold water. When firm remove from molds and garnish with marsh-mallow paste and chopped nuts.

Peanut Butter Muffins

2 cups flour.
4 teaspoons baking powder.
½ teaspoon salt.
¾ cup brown sugar.
¾ cup peanut butter.
1 egg, beaten.
1 cup milk.
2 tablespoons melted butter.
Sift flour and baking powder and salt twice. Mix with brown sugar. Rub peanut butter into mixture. Add milk and beaten egg gradually beat together well. Add the melted butter. Bake in greased muffin tins in hot oven for 25 minutes. This makes 10 large muffins.

Cream of Peanut Butter Soup

1½ tablespoons butter.
1½ tablespoons flour.
3-4 teaspoon salt.
3 tablespoons peanut butter.
3 cups milk.
¼ teaspoon paprika.
Melt the butter in the top part of a double boiler placed directly over the fire. Remove from fire. Add the flour, salt and paprika mixing to prevent lumps, slowly stir in 2½ cups milk until the whole is evenly mixed. Return to flame and cook and stir for three minutes. Place over water. Mix the peanut butter with the reserved half cup milk. Add to soup just before serving. Beat with an egg beater.

Peanut Butter Cookies

1 cup brown sugar.
1 cup white sugar.
1 cup peanut butter.
1 cup butter (½ cup lard, ½ cup butter).
2 eggs well beaten.
2½ cups flour.
Mix well in order. Roll in little balls. Press flat with a fork and bake. Good with nuts or coconut added.

Other Provisions Of Lumber Code To Remain In Effect

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 25.—(AP)—Although the price-fixing provisions of the N.R.A. lumber code have been suspended by the national recovery administration, the Western Pine association today advised its members that other code provisions, including production control, minimum wages, maximum hours and forest conservation, remain in full force and effect. S. V. Fullaway Jr., secretary manager of the pine association, announced further that because the N.R.A. board will give further study to costs and prices in the lumber industry, all members of the Western Pine division will be expected to continue to furnish the association with copies of all orders accepted.

The association said the effect of this action will be to continue open price reporting and dissemination of current market statistics.
