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more than a gesture on our part." He will plead the case himself. Continuing, Allen declared:

"We are not asking for any temporary restraining order. To do so would involve filing a bond and, if the restraining order should eventually be dissolved, would result in heavy expense to us.

"By the commencement of this suit the governor, secretary of state, and the state treasurer are formally notified that the legality of the governor's salary is questioned. However, they may—if they choose—go ahead and pay him. They then can move to have the suit dismissed as being without subject matter. After that our best bet would probably be to wait until the new governor receives as much as \$1500 in 1935 and sue to prevent his receiving any more in that year.

This would give us more time to prepare the case and to raise money. If our state officials want to cooperate with us in getting this question settled before the legislature adjourns, we can probably get it done. If not, we will have to wait.

"We assume, however, that our state officials are even more interested that we are in getting this matter thrashed out in time to let the legislature know how it stands so it may, if necessary, submit a constitutional amendment to the people."

Rush Will Wait For Birthday to Take Senate Seat

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—(AP)—Rush D. Holt, 29-year-old senator-elect from West Virginia, will not present himself to be sworn in as a member of the senate until June 10, his 30th birthday.

This was determined today at a conference of the young legislators with Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic leader, and at a meeting of the democratic policy committee of the senate.

Robinson said the democratic leadership will insist on Holt's right to his seat when he is 30, the age prescribed by the constitution for entrance to the senate.

"It seems probable that if Mr. Holt refrains from presenting himself for his oath until he is 30, he will then be seated," Robinson said.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—(AP)—Senator Robinson, the democratic leader, said today it was "assumed that if and when" the certificate of election of Senator Cutting (R. N.M.) is received "he will be seated unless some issue unknown to me respecting the subject arises." Dennis Chavez, democrat, is contesting Cutting's election.

TAMPICO, Mex., Dec. 31.—(AP)—The waters of the Tamico river at El Caracol were searched today for the bodies of 25 women and children who drowned yesterday when a passenger launch sank. The boat, enroute to Tampico, was attempting to dock at El Caracol when it struck obstruction. All the men aboard apparently reached safety but helpless women and children were carried away by the swift currents.

LISBON, Portugal, Dec. 31.—(AP)—Dispatches from Alcazar said today 17 workmen were drowned when a small boat was caught in a river whirlpool and capsized. Only one man reached shore.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—(AP)—FEHA today denied any knowledge of an impending shake-up in the Idaho state relief administration, reiterating that any changes in personnel of the organization "entirely in the governor's hands."

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mittee consideration should not be given, but I see no reason to delay the thing until May.

Door Not Closed
"If the committee reports a bill, I think it should be given a rule (legislative right-of-way) and be brought to a vote."

Some leaders on Capitol Hill said they considered the president's action a serious obstacle to the bonus movement but others were quick to emphasize that Mr. Roosevelt did not close the door to all compromise.

Representative Fuller of Arkansas, democratic member of the ways and means committee which doubtless will handle any bonus legislation, said he was in favor of "disposing of the issue now," but said he was not sure yet just how it should be done—in installment payments or otherwise.

Vets Get Preference

With the president engaged in last hour polishing of his message to congress and especially with planning a new human relief program, special interest was centered on his statement that "All expenditures for relief have been made in the interest of recovery and for all our citizens, non-veterans as well as for veterans."

The chief executive said "All citizens in need have shared in the direct distribution for relief, and in employment." "A very definite and distinct preference is given to veterans."

It is probable that Mr. Roosevelt will deliver his annual message in person to a joint session of congress where he will have an opportunity again to touch on the bonus issue in outlining federal relief activities.

"NOTHING TO SAY"

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 31.—(AP)—Frank N. Belgrano, national commander of the American Legion, refused comment today on President Roosevelt's opposition to the present payment of the soldier's bonus.

The legion has been campaigning for discharge of the adjusted service certificates by the coming congress as a relief and recovery measure.

"I have nothing to say," Belgrano stated when he heard the president's message.

Asked if Mr. Roosevelt's stand would alter legion policy, he replied simply: "You heard my first answer, didn't you?"

In all, three shots were fired before the assailants jumped from the windows and fled in waiting automobiles.

The disturbance called out international policemen who restored order in a hurry. No troops of the international army, sent here by the League of Nations to maintain the peace, were called into action.

The most seriously injured at Bielefeld was Heinrich Imbusch, Catholic leader, who was struck on the head by a beer mug and was beaten with chairs.

out clean when stuck in the custard. Let pie stand 24 hours before eating.

Mrs. Arthur Fay, R. R. 2, Eugene.
Grandma's Custard Pie
Enough milk to fill raw crust with 1-3 cup sugar dissolved in it. Three eggs, keep 2 whites for top. Beat eggs, cup sugar. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Add 1-8 teaspoon salt. Put in crust and shake nutmeg on top. Bake hot oven ten minutes then cooler until custard will not stick to silver knife. Beat the whites of eggs with 2 tablespoons sugar and cover pie and brown.

Mrs. Arthur Fay, R. R. 2, Eugene.
Cream Pie
This is a cream pie recipe which my grandmother used to make.

Put 3 cups of milk and lump of butter in double boiler to heat.

Mix 1 cup sugar, 3 heaping tablespoons of flour together. Beat 3 egg yolks, add little milk and mix with sugar and flour mixture and stir into hot milk and boil. Remove from fire, flavor to taste and beat in at least a part of the stiffly beaten egg whites.

Sometimes I keep some out for meringue and sometimes I cover with whipped cream. Makes enough for two pies.

Orange Meringue Pie
2 cups water.

4 tablespoons cornstarch.

2 tablespoons flour.

1 cup sugar.

3 egg yolks.

6-8 tablespoons orange juice.

2 teaspoons grated orange rind.

1/2 teaspoon salt.

Put water on to boil. Mix cornstarch, flour and sugar with one-half cup cold water until smooth; mix in egg yolks, slightly beaten; add slowly to boiling water. Cook 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from fire, add orange juice, rind and salt. Pour into a baked crust.

Meringue
3 egg whites.

3 tablespoons sugar.

1 teaspoon baking powder.

Beat egg whites, add sugar slowly, and baking powder, beating between each addition. Spread thickly on top of pie. Bake in moderate oven ten minutes or until brown. Makes one nine-inch pie.

Vitus Is Barred From Driving Car For Next 2 Years
