NEW YEAR IS WELCOMED BY WORLD CITIES

greatest Celebration in Five Years Inaugurates 1935 Entrance

OPTIMISM EXPRESSED

Year Is Quiet After Many Upheavals; Message of Hope Broadcast

The New Year came in exuberantly today, welcomed by noisy demonstrations, many of them the best in years, and expressions of optimism for its future.

New Yorkers, disdaining entertainment prices that ran about 25 per cent higher than those during prohibition, turned out for the greatest holiday merrymaking in the city's history, jamming Times square with its biggest throng ever.

Confetti Showered
San Francisco, for the first time in five years, escaped a New Year's Eve rain and belated Market street with a rain of its own making—confetti.

Atlanta was not so lucky, encountering a steady downpour, but saw back a challenge with horns, whistles and other noisemakers along full blast.

Chicago drank deeply to the New Year, to a single of celebration estimated as high as \$300,000 for the last hour of the old year and the first two of the new.

Toasts Recorded
By south's winter resorts celebrated the advent of 1935 with the most elaborate receptions in years, both Palm Beach and Miami extending warm and gay greetings.

Vice President John N. Garner's all and farewell to the years was: "For health and happiness in the New Year. We already have prosperity."

General Hugh S. Johnson, former RA administrator, said: "We are our way out."
The New Year's message from Joseph S. Hecht, president of the American Bankers association, was: "The people of the United States

EUGENE JOYFUL AS YEAR STARTS

Hundreds Flock to Opening Of New Playground In Cascades

Garbed in a blanket of glistening frost and waving the thermometer at 28 degrees, the New Year made its appearance in Eugene with a flourish, Tuesday.

A glorious, sunshiny day, New Year's looked on a sleepy-eyed city, however, for Eugene made rousing preparations for the coming of 1935 with numerous dancing parties, open houses, watch-night parties, and other entertainments, Monday night.

Hundreds of Eugeneans trekked to the upper McKenzie Tuesday for the dedication of the winter sports playground sponsored by the Obsidians club, the chamber of commerce, and other groups.

Those remaining at home found it a very quiet city. Streets were deserted with all business closed for the holiday. The only stir down town was the arrival of University of Oregon students returning to start their winter term, Wednesday.

Not a single arrest was made by city and state police or the sheriff's deputies for drunkenness, New Year's eve, or after 1935 had been ushered in. Officers reported there was plenty of hilarity but that no one seemed to get too loud and no unseemly disturbance was noticed on the streets or in public places.

Three traffic accidents were reported during the early part of the evening, Monday, but liquor was not responsible for either, officers stated.

3-GUN MAN RUNS WILD
HAMILTON, O., Jan. 1.—(AP)—A New Year's eve celebrant from whom police took two revolvers, suddenly drew a third from his pocket early today, shot and killed one policeman, wounded another and was himself slain in a patrol wagon.

Mowry Will Assist Bowman Prosecution

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 1.—(AP)—George Mowry, chief criminal deputy district attorney here under Lotus L. Langley last night, announced his resignation from office in order to assist in the prosecution of Dan Bowman on murder charges at LaGrande. Bowman has been charged with murder as a result of the death of Fred Lamplin, eastern Oregon publisher, who was shot with a rifle during a hunting trip on Nov. 9. Mowry said he had been retained to aid in the prosecution, but made it clear that he was not employed by Union county. Parties interested in the prosecution of Bowman retained Mowry, he reported.

2 Molalla Boys Reported Missing

OREGON CITY, Ore., Jan. 1.—(AP)—A searching party pressed through snow in the mountains south of Molalla today in search of French, 19, and Kendall Washburn, 17, who left on a hiking trip last Thursday and have not been reported since.

One group of searchers went toward High camp, where the youths may be snowed out. The boys did not have sufficient food to last until today.

40 WITNESSES TO AID STATE IN BRUNO CASE

Hill Folk To Testify Alleged Slayer Near Scene Of Kidnaping

BETTY GOW ON STAND

Prosecution, Defense Expect To Secure Jury With No Delay

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 1.—(AP)—Forty witnesses will be called by the state of New Jersey to prove that Bruno Hauptmann was in or near Hopewell on the night the infant son of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh was kidnaped.

Most of these witnesses will be drawn from the hill-folk in the Sourland mountains. Their testimony will be disputed by Hauptmann's alibi witnesses who will try to place him in his Bronx apartment at the moment of the kidnaping.

Hauptmann Guarded
Hauptmann will come into court tomorrow, shackled to a deputy sheriff, and two state troopers will guard him constantly until he is convicted or acquitted of a charge of murder in connection with the kidnaping.

Defense and prosecution believe they will succeed in getting a jury of Hunterdon county citizens within the first two sessions of court.

"I do not intend to question the prospective jurors about their prejudices," Lloyd Fisher of defense counsel said. "There isn't a man or woman in the United States who hasn't read about the case. If a man whose name is on the jury panel said to me that he hadn't read or heard about it and had not formed an opinion I would consider him either a liar or a moron. We will accept anybody who has an open mind and who looks intelligent."

Both prosecution and defense scoffed at the idea that any new witness would be called.

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Three Accidents New Years Eve Brings 653 Total

Three traffic accidents, reported to the city police Monday afternoon and night brought the total for the month of December to 68 and a total of 653 for the year. One death and 17 persons injured is the traffic toll for the month just ended. Traffic deaths for the year were five.

Monday night at 8:15 o'clock Gene Doran, 14, of 1168 West Sixth, was out on the head and sustained bruises when a car driven by Fred Voigt, struck him as he was crossing the street at the intersection of Blair and VanBuren. The report of the accident, made by Voigt, said the boy ran almost in front of his car.

In a collision between cars driven by Howard D. Lewis, 701 West Twelfth, and Peter Hansen, 140 West Sixth, at the intersection of Twelfth and Charleston streets at 3:30 p. m. Lewis sustained several cuts but his injuries were not believed to be serious.

Monday at 9 p. m. cars driven by Carl Clifford Ross, 117 Madison, and G. A. Metzger, 638 West Third, collided but the occupants were unhurt, the police report said.

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FRATERNIZING ONCE MORE!

Curtis Will Be Invited to Aid Bruno Defense

NEW YORK, Jan. 1.—(AP)—C. Lloyd Fisher, associate counsel for Bruno Hauptmann, said today he would invite John Hughes Curtis, Norfolk, Va., boatbuilder, to testify for the defense in Hauptmann's trial on a charge of murdering the Lindbergh baby.

Fisher and his wife came here from Flemington, N. J., to attend a New Year's eve celebration. The associate counsel was suffering from a heavy cold at his hotel today, but said he would be in the court room at Flemington when the trial opens tomorrow morning.

The associate defense counsel said he was certain Curtis was not in New York, and Fisher branded as erroneous reports that the Norfolk boatbuilder, who was convicted a little more than two years ago on a charge of obstructing justice in the kidnap search, had offered to identify Hauptmann as one involved in the kidnap case.

Marriage Licenses Gain During Year

Cupid had a better year during 1934 than the year previous, according to the marriage license records in the office of County Clerk Walter D. Dillard. A total of 463 licenses were issued in 1934 as compared with 378 in 1933, a gain of 90.

The merry month of June as usual had the best record of all the months, 60 licenses having been issued in that period. Oddly enough, exactly the same number was issued in June, 1933.

The monthly record for the year follows: January 23, February 24, March 30, April 30, May 46, June 60, July 35, August 43, September 38, October 43, November 37, December 39.

Two Are Killed In Asylum Tragedy

UKIAH, Cal., Jan. 1.—(AP)—Two men were killed in what police said was a murder and suicide in the home of Dr. R. A. Cushman, superintendent of the Mendocino state hospital for the criminally insane near here, last night.

Ike Rainey, 42, former attendant at the hospital, was named by police as the slayer who shot down Frank Reed, 50, watchman at the hospital, and then committed suicide. Sheriff E. L. Williams said Rainey was apparently crazed by jealousy over attentions Reed had been showing to his divorced wife, housekeeper at the Cushman home.

Twelve Portland Speakeasies Raided

PORTLAND, Jan. 1.—(AP)—Police swooped down on twelve alleged "speakeasies" during New Year's holiday last night and made ten arrests.

All arrests were made on search warrants and charges of sale and possession of liquor were placed. The "speaks" were closed.

Talk of Compromise Gets Boost Following F-D Letter

VETO FIGHT FEARED

Van Zandt Attacks Record Of Texan Who Asked Roosevelt View

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—(AP)—Talk of possible compromises on the bonus to avert a knock down and drag out fight was intensified among democratic leaders in congress today.

With President Roosevelt expressing plain opposition to full and immediate payment of the \$2,000,000,000 soldiers' bonus and powerful blocs in congress enlisted in a drive for just such payment, leaders were making no attempt to discount the magnitude of the fight threatening.

Veto Fight Not Wanted
Though the opinion of the White House on any bargaining efforts was not disclosed, several leaders who did not wish to be quoted felt the president had not closed the door on such attempts. They made no secret of their preference for a mutual agreement rather than a veto fight.

Whether a compromise acceptable to both sides could be reached remained for the future to determine. Many of those who have fought for veterans' legislation in the past have turned thumbs down on a suggestion to cash the certificates for only those veterans in need.

Van Zandt Takes Issue
There remained little doubt in the minds of most legislators Mr. Roosevelt would veto full and immediate payment in view of the views he expressed yesterday.

In reply to a letter from Garland R. Farmer, head of the American Legion post at Henderson, Texas, the president said, among other things, that there was misunderstanding on the subject; the certificates were all the same.

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Petty Thievery Annoys Eugeneans Last Day Of Year

Petty thieves were rampant in Eugene the last day of the year, according to city police records. Articles from baby clothes to car batteries and rabbits were reported stolen during the day and night.

Eugene Field, 730 West Eleventh, reported that a tire and rim were taken from his car parked in front of his place of residence early in the evening.

Professor O. F. Stafford said when he tried to start his car in the evening there was no life in it at all and searching around for the difficulty he found his battery gone. Someone had entered the garage and carried the battery away.

Paul Landrus, 111 Grand street, lost two rabbits from his yard. One was a large white and orange animal and the other was a small one. They were taken during the day, he reported.

Jealousy Brings 2 Wounded, One Dead

SEATTLE, Jan. 1.—(AP)—Because his attentions were spurned, Floyd Lewis shot and critically wounded Mrs. Oleana Johnson and Walter Nitsche, then killed himself today near Renton, south of Seattle. Mrs. Johnson said Lewis urged her to marry him, but she refused. She went to a New Year's Eve dance with Nitsche. There was an argument, and Lewis shot Nitsche, then turned his gun on her. He then killed himself.

Portland Adds 2 To Traffic Deaths

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 1.—(AP)—John Elinen, 40, and Mathias Atkins, 72, died today from traffic injuries. Elinen apparently was the victim of a hit-run driver. He was found unconscious in the street and died an hour later.

Englishman Hanged For Baby Murder

LEEDS, England, Jan. 1.—(AP)—Frederick Rushworth, 20-year-old farm hand, was hanged in Armley prison today for the murder of his baby.

He was convicted with Mrs. Lydia Binks, 24-year-old domestic, of burying the child alive. Both were sentenced to death, but the woman's sentence was commuted to life imprisonment after thousands joined in petitioning the home office that she be granted clemency. A plea for a reprieve for Rushworth was denied.

FIRE KILLS 5 AT HOME FOR AGED

Convicts Carry Frightened To Safety in Early Morning Blaze

GAFFNEY, S. C., Jan. 1.—(AP)—Five aged men were burned to death and 15 were injured early today when fire destroyed the main building of the Cherokee county home as the temperature stood at freezing.

Convicts from a prison camp a few hundred yards from the scene rescued screaming inmates, wrapped them in blankets from the camp and aided in rushing them to hospitals. Approximately 50 persons were housed in the building.

Origin of the early morning blaze was not determined immediately. The main building was the only one to burn.

The dead: Tom Young, 73; Pink Young, 68; Frank Franklin, 75; Wash Gregory, about 70; Alf Emory, about 70.

Damage to the brick structure, the dormitory of the county home, was not estimated pending a further check. Authorities began an immediate investigation of the fire which was believed to have started in the roof.

No fire fighting apparatus was available to fight the raging flames, which melted ice from trees and shrubbery under the mercury had fallen to freezing early in the night.

There was no water, said L. F. Allison, prison camp foreman, and nothing was left to do but watch the fire lick through the structure.

At a hospital where the surviving victims were carried, physicians expressed belief none was seriously injured although all suffered from exposure and from smoke.

The bodies of the five dead were recovered later in the morning by the convicts who were given temporary liberty to aid in the rescue work.

Relief, Social Security To Face Debate By Congress

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WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—Congress, with the advice of the president, must provide for 23,000,000 persons who are expected to be on relief rolls before the winter is over.

It will also make the first stab at a social security system similar in part to those long existent in the nations of Europe.

These two vast programs should not be confused with each other. Unemployment insurance is not unemployment relief, as it doesn't apply to those now unemployed. Old age pension legislation to be enacted, however, may tend to reduce the unemployment relief burden.

Federal, state, and local relief are now costing about \$175,000,000 a month. More than \$2,500,000,000 was spent for relief—including charity—since May, 1933, and almost the entire load is now being carried by the treasury.

PACIFIC IS DUE TO GET NEW STORM

Warning Ordered Posted Along Coast in Northwest

MID WEST SHIVERING

Pennsylvania Gets Heavy Snow; Slippery Roads Collect Toll

CHICAGO, Jan. 1.—(AP)—The New Year ushered in a bitter cold wave for the upper Mississippi valley.

Zero temperatures prevailed as far south as northeastern Iowa, Mercury readings tumbled rapidly soon after midnight. A drop of 30 degrees was registered at Chicago in a few hours.

The weather bureau said the area of extreme cold extended west from the western portion of the upper Great Lakes region to the Rocky mountains. Precipitation was only scattered.

The extreme cold was not expected to last much more than 24 hours. The weather bureau predicted moderating temperatures for most of the region.

A storm warning was issued for the north Atlantic coast. The weather bureau said a secondary disturbance now centered over New Jersey would move northeastward with increasing intensity.

STORM WARNINGS UP

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 1.—(AP)—Blustery weather inaugurated the New Year along the north Pacific coast. Southeast storm warnings were ordered up at 8 a. m. at the mouth of the Columbia river and on the Oregon coast. Small craft warnings were flown at points along Puget Sound. Strong winds or gales are expected by tonight, the weather forecaster said.

PENNSYLVANIA WHITE

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 1.—(AP)—The heaviest snow of the season—between two and four inches—blanketed Pennsylvania on the first day of the new year.

Five persons were killed and numerous motor accidents reported as ice and sleet covered the highways shortly before midnight. Five persons were shot in Philadelphia celebrations.

SCHOOLS RESUME WORK WEDNESDAY

The Eugene city schools and practically every other school in Lane county will reopen Wednesday morning after a little more than a week's vacation for the Christmas and New Year's holidays.

Most of the schools closed Friday afternoon, Dec. 28, and held no classes during the following week, but there are a few in the rural districts that held classes last week in order to dismiss that much earlier at the end of the year.

As this is not the end of a term in the Eugene schools, classes will be resumed Wednesday morning where they ended a week ago Friday, it is announced.

Work Relief Is Aim

Congress will be asked to finance a program which will take as many people as possible off cash relief and put them at productive or other socially valuable work.

Months ago, Roosevelt came to agree with FERA Administrator Harry Hopkins that the cash dole was bad for the unemployed and bad for the country. "Work relief" has been the subject of numerous New Deal conferences and is the administration's latest answer to the problem of the 10,000,000 unemployed.

Bill Spingarn, assembled at White Sulphur Springs, has demanded the cash dole and as little of that as possible. The dole is a bit cheaper than work relief.
