

DEFICIT NEAR TWO BILLION MARK AS BOOKS ARE CLOSED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—(AP)—The treasury closed its books on the first half of the fiscal year tonight with the deficit rapidly pushing toward the two billion dollar mark.

With figures for the last two days not to be made public, this excess of money spent over money received stood at \$1,600,240,861, in spite of an increase of nearly half a billion in revenues.

Both general and emergency expenditures were greater than in the corresponding period of a year ago to produce a correspondingly greater deficit than that of \$1,162,972,505, which the books revealed December 31, 1933.

Borrowings to finance the administration recovery drive over the last six months jumped the public debt by nearly a billion and a half. When the fiscal year began it stood at \$27,008,414—last Friday it was \$28,450,000,124.

And the \$1,427,521,700 borrowed all has been spent and a little besides, for the treasury's cash balance is now about twenty millions less than when the fiscal year started last July 1.

With these facts before them, President Roosevelt and his advisors are constructing a budget for the remainder of the current fiscal year and for the fiscal year which will end June 30, 1935.

The message and its figures are awaited with intense interest by all Washington, for it will reveal with absolute certainty the chief executive's plans for relief payments through the end of the winter and the size of the public works program he has in mind. Unofficial estimates of its extent have ranged from two to ten billions.

A year ago Roosevelt forecast a balanced budget by June 30, 1935. So far this fiscal year, relief payments have cost the government nearly a million dollars. More than half a billion has gone through PWA.

The exact figures are \$830,388,000 for relief and \$655,476,486 for public works.

All emergency expenditures for the six months just closing stood at \$1,387,501,977 as compared with \$1,162,972,505 for the same period a year ago. General expenditures aggregated \$1,710,302,425, as compared with \$1,460,045,214.
