Pumpkin Cream Pie
1 cup brown sugar.
1 teaspoon cinnamon.
1/2 teaspoon ginger.
1/4 teaspoon cloves.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1 1/2 cups cooked, strained pumpkin.
1 tablespoon melted butter.
2 eggs.
1 1/2 cup evaporated milk.
1/2 cup water.
Unbaked pie crust.
Mix sugar, spices and salt. Blend with pumpkin. Add slightly beaten eggs, butter, and diluted evaporated milk. Line nine inch pie tin with unbaked pie crust. Pour in filling. Bake about 45 minutes in a slow oven (300 degrees). When knife blade

Law For Grading Of Eggs Urged in Grange Resolution
Urging proper grading and marking of eggs for retail sale, a resolution adopted by Santa Clara Grange No. 746, was forwarded to state legislators Wednesday. The resolution, signed by E. C. Hart, master, and V. Veneta Chezen, secretary, urges rigid enforcement of such a law to prevent inferior products flooding the market at low prices.
Following is the resolution:
"Whereas the production of eggs in this state has grown to be one of the leading cash crops, which brings in the greater part of our income from Eastern Markets and outside money to Oregon;
"And whereas: Our egg grading and marketing laws do not protect our home markets against unscrupulous dealers who misbrand to undersell;
"And whereas: Our sales of eggs are greatly reduced by the low quality being thus sold which reduces consumption and therefore is a great handicap to the producers of quality products;
"Therefore We, the Santa Clara Grange No. 746, do go on record favoring a law to require and enforce the proper grading and marketing all eggs for retail sale so the grade is known by all buyers, either dealer or consumer."

HIGHWAY MEETING POSTPONED WEEK

SALEM, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Six hundred thousand dollars of road work will be awarded to low bidders at the next meeting of the State Highway commission in Portland which was postponed one week, until January 31, it was announced by the highway department today.

The funds for the letting will be part of the \$3,500,000 appropriated by the federal government for federal, secondary and highways within municipalities. R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, stated.

Of this appropriation the state already has under contract \$2,500,000 worth of work. The last of the fund will be let at a meeting in February, by which time it was expected funds for proposed grade crossing eliminations will be available.

The department was busy this week preparing its report to the governor on activities the past year and a half, and will have the complete two years report prepared sometime during the session of the legislature.
