Committees to Report on
Butterfat Content
On Saturday

Milk problems cropped out into the light here again, Saturday, with several new developments chalked up. Announcement was made through local office of the state milk commission that, temporarily, prices be back on the basis preceding the order of Dec. 15, \$2.12 per hundred for both milk and cream as prices paid producers, and milk received at 10 cents for 4.2 per cent butterfat content.

The order of Dec. 15, boosting the price to producers and re-adjusting butterfat content to allow graduation retail prices has been rescinded temporarily until a new price or ruling comes from the state control.

Present Law Favored

Meanwhile, the Lane County Dairy-association held its annual meeting Saturday, elected officers, and discussed more or less open discussion regarding the state milk set-up. The producers are in favor of the present state milk law, George H. Gilmore, secretary of the producers, stated. While the group made no formal statement regarding the milk control board, in previous sessions and informal talk, several of the producers have expressed dissatisfaction over some of the actions of the control board.

The producers passed a resolution urging upon Lane county's representatives and senators in the legislature to keep dairymen of Lane county well informed on any measures that might come before the legislature affecting the milk industry.

Group Names Officers

F. Hyde, one of the representatives in the legislature from Lane county, attended the meeting and told the group he would give his support to a workable program helping the dairymen, the report from the legislature stated. Other Lane legislators were unable to attend the meeting.

Another meeting of the directors of the association will be held next Saturday morning at 10:30 o'clock at the chamber of commerce rooms. The meeting is called to hear reports from the committees. One committee named to study the butterfat content question. The city ordinance puts the content at 3.8. Some have wanted the content at 3.5.

Oregon Demos Wander Afield For More
Plums; Non-Partisan Legislature Due
To Be Dream As agreements Wobble

Their emblematic donkey braying his metaphorical best, the Oregon democratic party foraged widely in state political fields during the past week in a renewal of their efforts to grab political plums as the 1935 session of the state legislature draws near.

Displaying a slight tendency to kick over the traces, the democrats began their last-minute drive to be top dogs in the state by reopening the apparently closed matter of the senate presidency. They followed this with a drive on Prospective House Speaker John Cooter to induce him to name William Graham, Portland democrat, as chairman of the powerful house ways and means committee.

That last move has shaken political railbirds of Eugene and Lane county because it was generally supposed Cushman's Earl Hill would get that particular job. The way they figured it, Representative Hill, a strong candidate for the speakership before the overwhelming democratic victory and who turned this support to Cooter, was entitled to this position if he wanted it. Incidentally, Hill has never said that he did want it, but it is believed he would like that job this year. Well, with Hill giving Cooter his support and upon Cooter's assurance that he would not play politics but would make his appointments strictly along non-partisan lines, local observers felt sure Hill would get the chairmanship of the ways and means committee.

Hill, with two sessions behind him and considerable experience on the ways and means committee, was considered the most logical choice in the house for this position.

OATHS TAKEN BY
EUGENE OFFICIALSBryan to Assume Office
Monday; Councilmen
To Wait Week

Completing better than a dozen years as city recorder for Eugene, R. S. "Rock" Bryson closed his books and went home Saturday afternoon, making way for his successor, Calvin M. Bryan, elected city recorder in the last city election. Mr. Bryson's term officially ends at midnight Sunday when Mr. Bryan's term begins, but nobody expected the two men to be on hand to effect the change at that time.

Mr. Bryan will be in the office Monday morning, probably the youngest official in the state, or at least one of the youngest.

Bryan, Fred Wentworth, city treasurer, Orlando J. Hollis and Percy W. Brown, members of the water board, and Fred Carlson, Dr. M. C. Harris, Arthur Hendershot, A. A. Reid, Sam C. Bond, all councilmen, filed their oaths of office in the city recorder's office Saturday. While Bryan and Wentworth will be on the job Monday, councilmen and water board members start their new terms on Monday, Jan. 14, when their groups meet.

Recorder Bryson announced he planned no immediate changes in the routine of the office.

Mr. Bryson was first elected city recorder in 1910, serving till 1919 when he became county clerk. He served the county in this capacity slightly more than eight years, being succeeded by W. B. Dillard.

Leaving the county clerk's office, Mr. Bryson entered the abstract field, leaving this to become city recorder in 1929, filling out the term of George A. Gilmore, who died suddenly.

Cordon Retained
As Representative
Of O-C Counties

Members of the Lane county court Saturday signed an order agreeing to bear Lane county's share of the expense of employing Guy Cordon, district attorney of Douglas county, as a representative of the interests of the 18 O. and C. grant land counties in maintaining their local tax equity in the lands.

The courts of the other 17 counties have signed a similar order, according to County Judge Fred Fisk, and Mr. Cordon will at once enter upon his duties.

Mr. Cordon has long been associated with the several counties in connection with their tax equities in these lands, which quite a number of years ago reverted from the Oregon and California Railroad company to the government. After this occurred a bill was passed by congress to reimburse the counties, each year for the taxes lost in taking the property off the rolls. Lately there has been a movement to transfer the lands to the national forest department and it is felt that if this is accomplished the counties would lose the taxes entirely. A strong fight will be made by the 18 grant counties to prevent any such action.

State-Federal Cop
Force Is Proposed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(AP)—A state-federal police force, composed of men trained in the justice department's ferreting school, was disclosed today to be one of the 18 anti-crime recommendations by the senate anti-racket committee.

Senator Copeland (D-N.Y.), chairman of the committee said 35 states had approved a plan which calls for a new type of correlation of federal and state anti-crime forces.

Under the bill, the states would select men to be trained in the department of justice school for special agents. These super-policemen would return to their home states, be vested with state police powers and operate under the supervision of the attorney general.

No Relief Change
Pending Legislation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(AP)—State emergency relief administrators were directed today by Harry L. Hopkins, federal administrator, to maintain existing methods of giving relief at "full efficiency" until congress enacts new legislation.

Hopkins emphasized that the new system of providing work relief for 3,500,000 employables depended on new legislation.

APPEAL SUCCESSFUL

Assessment Held Out of
Line With That of
Other Firms

A reduction in the total valuation of Booth-Kelly lumber company properties from \$109,400 to \$172,150 was ordered by the state tax commission Saturday, on an appeal filed by the company from the order of Lane County Board of Equalization, refusing the sought reduction.

The lumber company had sought the reduction here and failing, appealed to the state tax commission.

The total valuation of \$172,150, as set by the state commission, was distributed substantially as follows: Land, \$150; improvements, \$34,700; railroad lines and spurs, \$28,000; locomotives, \$15,500; logging camps and equipment and manufacturing machinery, \$83,800. The valuation of land set by the Lane county board at \$4,650 was reduced by the commission to \$100.

Order Signed Saturday

The order effecting this large reduction was signed Saturday, Jan. 5. The Booth-Kelly company, in appealing from the decision of the county board, held that Assessor Ben F. Keeney had set the assessed valuation of the Wendling mill property disproportionately high when compared with valuations on the sawmill properties of other owners in Lane county.

Supporting this contention, the company submitted at the hearing before the commission a list of 18 sawmill properties of other owners, the assessed valuation of which totaled \$522,050 in 1931 and \$419,850 in 1934.

In comparison, the company stated, the assessed valuations on the Wendling mill property have continued in the same amount for each year from 1931 to 1934. Assessor Keeney, in retaliation, asserted the company had used a "picked list" in making its claims.

Picked List Charged

The commissioner's order continued: "Following the Assessor's suggestion, the commission has made some investigations of comparative assessments on sawmill properties in Lane county over the period from 1930 to 1934."

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Cordon Retained
As Representative
Of O-C CountiesSAAR PLEBISCITE
MAY BE DELAYED

SAARRUECKEN, Saar Basin Territory, Jan. 5.—(AP)—A possibility that the Saar plebiscite may be postponed several months was seriously discussed in official quarters tonight as rival Nazi and anti-Nazi factions prepared for mammoth open air demonstrations tomorrow.

Permission was given the two groups to hold the mass meetings, expected to be the biggest since the plebiscite campaign opened, in Saarbruecken the same day.

If the gatherings cannot be held peacefully the final Sunday before the balloting, it would be dangerous to attempt to carry out the plebiscite one week later, officials said they believed.

The task of preserving order during the test of the Saar's discipline will be left to police, troops of the league's international army being kept in barracks.

S. A. Indebtedness
Reported Cleared

All indebtedness of the local Salvation Army corps was cleared up as a result of the campaign last fall and with the balance in the bank and payment of pledges to come, the local corps will be able to carry on its work throughout the year 1935, it was announced by J. E. Richmond, finance chairman, Saturday.

The money is being administered by a board of citizens and Adjutant Ford reports expenditure of \$75 a month from the fund. During the month of December, \$100 was turned over to the board. More than half of this was in new subscriptions not recently solicited, it was said.

2 More Prisoners
Will Test Serum

CANON CITY, Colo., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Prison routine soon will end and the life of laboratory test tubes will begin for two more Colorado convicts.

Officials said two prisoners, young men this time, will be selected within two weeks for further tests of the tuberculosis serum developed by physicians at the National Jewish hospital at Denver. The strictest secrecy will be thrown around the new experiments, it was learned, as the doctors felt the initial tests were given too much publicity and "ballyhoo."

LINDBERGH'S ON STAND AGAINST HAUPTMANN!



Thirty-four months after his son was abducted from his home near Hopewell, N. J., Colonel Charles A. Tract Of 108 Acres
Near Siuslaw Given
By County As Park

Lane county Saturday deeded to the state highway department a tract of 108 acres adjoining the Oregon Coast highway on the west and adjacent to Glenada, to be used as a state park. It has been suggested by members of the county court that the tract be named Joaquin Miller park for the reason that the eminent poet at one time owned this land.

Last private owner of the land were the late George M. Miller, brother, and Juanita Miller, daughter, of the poet, and it was deemed appropriate by the members of the county court to name it after the family.

Fall Creek Man
FATALLY INJURED

Charles Mooney, 65 years old, farmer of the Fall Creek district, was injured fatally, Saturday, after stepping off a 3-C truck while it was still running. Mr. Mooney died soon after reaching the Eugene hospital.

According to reports of the accident, Mr. Mooney stepped on the running board of the truck to ride a distance and attempted to get off while the vehicle was still running. His clothing caught and he was thrown beneath the truck.

Higher Rates Are
Hinted By I. C. C.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(AP)—A hint that it believes the railroads of the country should be permitted to increase freight rates unless traffic increases are made was given today by the interstate commerce commission.

The commission, in its annual report, today cited the restoration of railroad wages due to be completed April 1 and additional costs of materials used, adding that the ability of the carriers to bear such increases "will depend in large part on the further revival of traffic."

Polish Miners End
Eleven Day Strike

KATOWICE, Poland, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Forty coal miners, all that remained of 80 who started an underground strike 11 days ago—climbed out of the Basena mine near Sosnowice tonight after local authorities agreed to find work for them.

They were exhausted and weakened from their stay in the dark, damp shaft 250 feet underground. About forty of the original number of strikers had surrendered during the last few days because of their sufferings underground.

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 5.—(AP)—The announcement of Edward J. Reilly, chief defense counsel for Bruno Richard Hauptmann, the man would name four persons next week as the "actual kidnapers" of the Baby Lindbergh evoked from Prosecutor Anthony M. Hauck, Jr., tonight a challenge to name the persons immediately.

Reilly, in New York for the week-end recess of the Hauptmann trial on a charge of murdering Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., announced he would disclose the names of the four persons probably about Thursday.

Direct Reply Dodged

Hauptmann, he said, was not one of them. He would not comment when asked directly if Betty Gow, the baby's nurse, was one of the four he intended to name.

"If Mr. Reilly knows any other persons connected with this case, as a member of the bar and as an officer of the court, he should disclose their identity to the prosecution authorities of Hunterdon county immediately," Hauck said.

OTHERS ENTER TRIAL

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 5.—(AP)—The baby murder trial of Bruno Richard Hauptmann has turned, in three short days, into a trial not of the chalk faced German carpenter alone, but of many others—men and women, persons alive and persons dead.

That is the now apparent strategy of Edward J. Reilly, the shrewd Brooklyn lawyer who is directing the attempt to save Hauptmann from the chair. With double-edged questions, Reilly has waved the pointing finger (sometimes subtly, sometime boldly) in the direction of various persons whose names have long been familiar.
