Back in the early days of the hooked rug, the cat was one of the popular motifs in rug designs. Whether the family pet was thus immortalized or whether the cat in itself suggests cozy comfort, it is not clear. However, when a cat is as handsome as this one, it will be sufficient excuse to use it as a decoration on a hooked rug. The background may be mottled, using all variety of scraps of color in one solid color. The cat will show off nicely either way and can, of course, be done in a light or a dark color so long as it contrasts with the background. The rug can be made oval, oblong or square. This pattern is a companion rug to Pattern 584, the popular Scottie rug.

Pattern 621 comes to you with a transfer pattern of the design, consisting of a cat 18 inches long and four corners, and complete directions for making a hooked rug.
