FOUR BILLION FOR WORKS IS F-D REQUEST

Budget Balancing Impossible While Unemployment Remains, View

DEFENSE GETS RAISE

Urges Continuance For Emergency Setups; Farm Aid Cut

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Facing unemployment the sole barrier to a balanced budget, President Roosevelt stirred dissent in congress today with a request for \$4,000,000,000 in one lump to finance his new work relief plan.

Despite the signs of great controversy, however, his forecast of a new peak public debt of \$34,239,000,000 on June 30, 1936, was accompanied by recognition at the capitol that the jobless presented a problem that must be confronted.

Industry Challenged

"As rapidly as private industry is able to reemploy those who now are without work," Mr. Roosevelt wrote, "the great disparity between federal expenditures and receipts can be closed up." In this sentence, and given even more definitely in a preliminary White House press conference, was read a bid to industry to make more jobs or stop demanding a balanced budget.

While democratic leaders in general agreed with his stand, the lump sum feature of the work relief fund—to be allocated by Mr. Roosevelt himself—was criticized from within both parties. Senator McNary, the republican leader, regretted the "inability" to strike a balance now but said federal aid of the unemployed was "necessary."

Deficit Slightly Smaller

New Shipping Strike Threat Gets Notice

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Threat of a new sailors and longshoremen's strike on the Pacific coast unless shipping lines discontinue employment of Filipinos was brought to the official attention of war and labor departments today.

Longshoremen at Seattle were reported to have refused to unload the S. S. Sagebrush of the Shepard line unless Filipinos engaged by that company, estimated at about 1000, are discharged.

Resident Commissioner Pedro Guevara made representations to the bureau of insular affairs. The department of labor is understood to have communicated with Seattle labor leaders in an effort to obtain a hearing and inquiry before the situation becomes critical.

OIL CONTROL ACT

IS HELD INVALID

New Deal Loses in First Test of NRA Before Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—In its first decision on federal new deal legislation, the supreme court today held invalid the clause of the national industrial recovery act under which the government is attempting to curtail oil production.

Lawyers said this decision would not affect the remainder of the recovery act.

The decision was delivered by Chief Justice Hughes.

He said a wide range of delegation of legislative authority can not be approved without limitation. Nothing had occurred to warrant congress in assuming it had constitutional authority to make unlimited delegation of legislative power, he added.

The cases challenging the validity of the recovery act were brought by the Panama Refining company and the Amazon Petroleum Corporation, both of East Texas.

The federal district court for East Texas ruled against the government, but the fifth circuit court of appeals took the opposite view.

Section 9 (C) of the recovery act, the one under attack, follows:

"The president is authorized to prohibit the transportation in interstate and foreign commerce of petroleum and the products thereof produced or withdrawn from storage in excess of the amount permitted to be produced or withdrawn from storage by any state or valid regulation or order prescribed thereunder, by any board, commission, officer, or other duly authorized agency of a state.

"Any violation of any order of the president issued under the provisions of this subsection shall be punishable by fine of not to exceed \$1,000, or imprisonment for not to exceed six months or both."

MEIER PLANS MESSAGE

SALEM, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Earl Snell of Arlington was formally inducted into the office of secretary of state at 10:30 this morning, by Justice J. U. Campbell of the state supreme court.

The brief ceremony was conducted in the absence of P. J. Stadelman, popular predecessor of Snell, who was confined to his home at The Dalles with a hard cold. Stadelman was unable to be at his office last week, nor could he meet once more with the board of control as was his wont.

Meier Plans Message

Governor Julius L. Meier was expected at the capitol to hold either his last board of control meeting or one of the last. Snell will get a taste of this function prior to the introduction of a new chairman next Monday when Martin takes over Meier's reins.

In the meantime Governor Meier was preparing his farewell address to the legislature in which he will point out the achievements of the past four years and suggest several other activities as the result of his experience during his regime. His message, he said, would be completed the last of this week.

Martin to Move

General Martin, assisted it was understood by his planning commission, was likewise spending considerable time on his initial message to the legislature, which is the one the legislators will attend with special interest. The governor-elect will move to Salem this week and make the state capital his residence.

Legislators are also arriving and those who did not make reservations in advance for rooms, will find it a difficult task to find suitable quarters. John E. Coater, who will be speaker of the house, has already moved to Salem, and this week will

German Consul Will Act For Killer Hermit

PORTLAND, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Robert G. Clostermann, German consul here said today he had agreed, on request of the Josephine county district attorney, to act as defense attorney for Hugo Mayer, "Hermit of the Cragles," who goes on trial at Grants Pass on Jan. 14 for murder.

Mayer, a native of Germany, fled from that country about 25 years ago to escape compulsory military service. He is charged with the fatal shooting of Robert Fantz, a neighbor in the wilderness of the Curry county hills. The killing is said to have occurred a short distance within the Josephine county boundary.

British Tanker Is Thought Foundered

SAN PEDRO, Cal., Jan. 7.—(AP)—A possibility that the missing British oil tanker La Crescenta foundered 900 miles northeast of Hawaii was seen in a radio report received today from another tanker which passed that vicinity. The Radio Corporation of America reported receiving the following message from the master of the tanker Athelbeach:

"Passed through pools of oil 35-92 north latitude 164 west longitude. British tanker La Crescenta last heard from that vicinity."

Attempt to Kill Starhemberg Fails

VIENNA, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Renewed precautions against communist and socialist outbreaks were taken by the government today after discovery of an attempt to assassinate Prince Ernst Rudiger von Starhemberg, vice-chancellor.

Two communists arrested near an airfield confessed to the attempt, police said. The attempt occurred at noon, when shots were fired from ambush at a large touring car sometimes used by von Starhemberg. Its sole occupant, a member of the helmswer (national guard) named Sello, was injured. Prince von Starhemberg was in Linz at the time.

During the afternoon Mr. Fletcher and Mr. Jackson will speak at the annual meeting of the Junction City Cooperative Exchange in Danish hall.

New Hitler Attack Rumor Held False

BERLIN, Jan. 7.—(AP)—The latest of many rumors of an attempt to assassinate Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler, published in the United States and other countries, proved after a thorough check of officials and private sources today to be as baseless as preceding ones.

Government members expressed extreme annoyance at the recurrent fiction, branding it as "senseless gossip." The latest was that two storm troopers had tried to shoot Hitler in his car, missing the Fuehrer, but wounding or killing his chauffeur.

WEEK-END RAINS RAISE WILLAMETTE

24 Hour Period Records Downpour Amounting To 1.20 Inches

Heavy rains that fell a greater part of Sunday and well into the night have caused the Willamette river and tributaries to rise again and at 12:30 Monday afternoon the river registered 5.5 feet above low water mark, having risen a foot since the morning reading was made at 7 o'clock and over four feet since Sunday morning. A total of 1.20 inches fell in Eugene from 7 a. m. Sunday to that hour Monday.

The temperature was comparatively high Sunday forenoon and considerable snow in the mountains melted, but it turned colder later in the day and more snow fell on the high elevations. Snow was seen as far down as the Coburg hills Monday morning.

Word received from McKenzie Bridge at the Willamette national forest office Monday stated that three inches of snow fell at that place during the night and light flurries were occurring at intervals at the time the message was sent at 10:30 a. m. Six inches of new snow had fallen during the night at the ski run above Lost Creek ranch.

The Southern Pacific company Monday forenoon received word that 12 inches of new snow had fallen at Cascade Summit, making a total of 64 inches now on the ground at that point. It was snowing moderately and the temperature was 30.

FRANCE AND ITALY SIGN NEW TREATY

Other Powers Expected To Pledge Backing For Peace Move

ROME, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Premier Benito Mussolini and French Foreign Minister Pierre Laval tonight signed an accord generally regarded as an outstanding safeguard for the future peace of Europe.

Three main agreements and additional protocols were signed at 7 p. m. at a ceremony in Venice palace.

Britain and Germany soon will notify the powers of their acceptance of the pact which guarantees the integrity of Austria, one of the most troublesome and dangerous issues confronting European diplomats.

The accord, which other powers will be invited to join, was concluded here after week-end negotiations.

The Franco-Italian agreements' protocols include:

1.—A document providing that France and Italy would collaborate to induce Germany to return to the league of nations and co-operate with league members in the interests of peace.

2.—A general pact regarding the Danubian basin with a guarantee of Austrian independence.

3.—An agreement on colonial affairs—possibly of greatest significance in future development of Africa and vitally affecting European affairs.

4.—A general consultative policy in the interests of European peace.

5.—Several documents aiming at atmosphere of peace in Europe.

Many authorities regarded the agreements and protocols as the greatest move toward general European peace since the World war.

Passengers Breakfast Quietly After Liner Grounds on Reef

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 7.—Shipwrecked passengers who went calmly to breakfast before braving a rough sea in lifeboats told a vivid story today of the grounding of the Ward Line Havana on a Bahama coral reef.

The ship struck the reef Sunday while most of those on board were asleep, but the passengers arriving today on the freighter El Oceano said the impact when the liner grounded was so gentle many were not awakened.

Another rescue ship, the United Fruit steamer Peten, sped toward Havana with other passengers taken off the Havana. The El Oceano landed here with 38 of the 51 passengers on the ship's list and some of the crew, while the Peten carried 11 passengers and members of the crew.

One passenger, identified as Robert Hittenbach of Brooklyn, N. Y., died of asphyxiation in a lifeboat, the only known fatality. One other passenger was not placed in the incomplete

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 7.—(AP)—The nursemaid Betty Gow collapsed today after the strain of nearly three hours as a witness in the trial of Bruno Richard Hauptmann for the kidnaping and murder of Baby Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr.

She had testified:

"That the undershirt found on the body of the slain baby was made by her and put on it the last night she saw it alive."

"Red" Johnson Told

That a thumbprint worn by the baby was found by her a month after the kidnaping a hundred yards from the Lindbergh home in Hopewell, N. J.

That she told "Red" Johnson, her sailor friend, and probably others that the Lindberghs were not returning to the home of Mrs. Lindbergh's mother, Mrs. Dwight W. Morrow, the Monday which just preceded the fateful March 1, when the baby was taken from its crib.

Insinuations Denied

That Lindbergh, when apprised his baby was gone, produced a rifle, stood in the nursery and cried:

"Anne, they've stolen our baby."

She indignantly denied insinuations hurled at her by Edward J. Reilly, chief of Hauptmann's defense counsel, and defiantly asked: "I did not" when Reilly asked her is she herself

check, and Captain A. W. Peterson of the Havana said a sailor was missing.

The transfer of the passengers to the El Oceano was carried out in heavy seas without mishap except for the swamping of one lifeboat which was struck by a large wave. A woman and her two children were swept into the water, but were saved by a seaman.

"I think most people aboard the Havana didn't know what happened," said T. E. Francis of Boston, one of those picked up by the El Oceano.

"Although it had been raining, it was bright sunlight when the boats were swung over the side, I boarded the El Oceano absolutely dry."

Dr. Howard Fox, New York physician, said the first he knew of the accident was when a steward came to his stateroom and awakened him.

"After all was clear as to where we were to go in the event the ship was abandoned," Dr. Fox said, "we went down to breakfast."

"The swamping of the lifeboat launched immediately ahead of ours was the only untoward incident of the whole episode."
