

SPRIT OF REVOLT SWEEPS LOUISIANA

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 8.—(Special)—Louisiana's two largest cities seethed with revolt against Huey Long's dictatorship today.

New Orleans was faced with a financial crisis as a result of Long's position for a re-election against the city. Public funds were tied up.

A new political party, the "Square Dealers," was springing up in a spirit of open revolt. Leaders urged the men to "lynch every legislator in the state" and eradicate "this monster Huey Long and his puppet governor, O. K. Allen."

Turmoil spread to other parts of the state. Five hundred citizens gathered in a mass meeting at Homer, Claiborne parish, and sent a delegation to the governor with a resolution demanding an immediate session of the legislature the repeal Long's dictatorship laws.

FARM LOAN STORY

481 loans made in the year and the total sum brought in amounts to \$1,026,150.

The report of the secretary showed that the total number of land bank loans at the present time is 619 and the amount of the loans totals \$1,750,200. This is a separate and apart from the commission's loans.

Secretary Hyde's report further showed that out of 135 federal land bank loans made during the past year the bank paid to Lane county \$26,955 in taxes or an average of \$273 per loan and out of 130 commission's loans the amount of taxes paid was \$16,589 or an average of \$127 per loan, making a total of \$53,544 paid in taxes in the year. Many borrowers paid their own taxes before their loans were finally obtained. The borrowers pay four and a half per cent on the land bank loans and five per cent on the commission's loans.

Professor E. L. Potter, head of the division of agricultural economics at the state college, and A. A. Rogers and Claude Davison of the federal bank at Spokane addressed the meeting.

liberally construed for accomplishment of this purpose. Suggestions Are Listed

"The Ministerial association recognizes that there is much to be done before the best results announced above can be accomplished and therefore offer these suggestions:

"1. That we call upon the legislature soon to go into session to provide for a commission to organize and conduct a state-wide program of scientific temperance education, the work of the commission to be financed from the profits from liquor sales.

"2. That we go on record as opposing the stimulation by any means whatever of increased sales by the liquor stores.

"3. That we call for a complete elimination of all liquor advertisements by press, bill-boards or radio originating within the state.

"4. That we favor action by the legislature to give the liquor commission power to sell through the liquor stores all classes of alcoholic beverages and not hard liquor only but none thus sold shall be consumed on the premises.

"5. We oppose the efforts of the Oregon Hotelmen's association to persuade the legislature to permit the hotels to sell hard liquor by the glass.

"6. We commend the liquor commission in its tightening restriction over roadhouses and other places which tolerated abuses in the past and also in their action in lessening the number of licenses granted and the raising the fees therefor."

Pour liquid off beans in separate pan and let boil. Turn beans on bacon and fryings, let cook till nearly dry with cover on, then put hot liquid on, let cook 1/2 or 3/4 hour. Add more hot water if desired, a little at a time. 1 cup tomato may be added with small onion if desired to bacon.—Mrs. Fred C. Byers, Junction City.

Corn and Cheese Pudding 2 cups corn 1 cup milk 1/2 cup cheese 2 eggs 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 bunch of pepper 2 tablespoons butter. Grate cheese, beat egg, and mix together with all remaining ingredients except butter. Place in a baking dish and dot the top of the mixture with the butter. Bake in a slow oven of 325 degrees F. for about 50 minutes.
