

THACHER-MARTIN CONCERT WILL BE GIVEN ON SUNDAY

Eugene music lovers will again have an opportunity to hear Jane Thacher, pianist, as well as to hear Gertrude Graves Martin, soprano, of Portland as guest artist in a concert Sunday under the sponsorship of Phi Mu Alpha, men's national music honorary at the University of Oregon music auditorium. This will be Mrs. Martin's initial appearance in Eugene. She is considered by critics as the possessor of a soprano voice of pleasing quality, interpreting her music with intelligence and charm.

As well as having an enviable record in the east and in Canada as a concert singer, Mrs. Martin was soprano of the Gregorian quartet which was well-known in New York and had a large operatic repertoire.

A music critic for the Morning Oregonian states: "Mrs. Thacher is a pianist of unusual ability, and her playing is characterized by a brilliance of tone and a clear-cut technique that is a delight to hear." Her concert in Eugene have always been well attended.

Admission to the concert will be 25 cents. Tickets will be on sale at McMorran and Washburne's Friday afternoon and all day Saturday, and at the University Co-op Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. A special student admission rate has been set at twenty-five cents.

Proceeds from the concert will be added to a fund being gathered by Phi Mu Alpha to provide scholarships for four high school students entering the university next fall. Scholarships will be offered in piano, voice, woodwinds and violin. A board composed of music school faculty members will select the scholarship winners early in the fall term of the next school year.

NEW AGREEMENT HINTED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—(AP)—An impending international monetary agreement was hinted at today by Attorney General Cummings in his gold clause argument in the supreme court.

Cummings asked the court to uphold the new deal law suspending gold payments so as not to hinder the United States in any conference with other nations.

"Great things are afoot," he said, adding that progress toward an international agreement "can be seen dimly on the horizon."

"The time will come," he predicted, "when the United States will be conferring with other nations of the earth with regard to monetary and currency matters, fixing the value of the currency of the nations, and making arrangements essential among civilized nations if we are to live together in peace and prosperity. Let nothing be said here (by the court) which will make us in these conferences a cripple among the nations of the earth."

\$20,000 Taken In As License Fees

A little more than \$20,000 has been taken in at the office of Sheriff C. A. Spradley in automobile license fees since the application began coming in December 15, it was announced at the office Wednesday. The rush seems to be over, only a few applicants coming in this week, but up to the latter part of last week the lobby in front of the license window was crowded every day all day long, especially during the last few days of December and the first days of January.

On December 15 the receipts for the day totaling \$663.50 and they gradually increased until the peak was reached on December 31 when the total collected was \$2,471.63. The next highest was \$2,341.30 on January 2 and the amount gradually decreased until January 5 when it was \$624.50 for the day.

But there was known to be strong opposition in the gathering to some changes under discussion.

The farm administration, too, was looking into the future in an attempt to prepare for it. Because he regards the system of collecting processing taxes to pay farmers to control production as only an "emergency" measure, Secretary Wallace and his assistants were studying possible alternatives. The half dozen he has listed from time to time range from compulsory control of major crops, such as is now exercised over cotton, to a vast plan to purchase farm land and take it out of production for good.

But the plan Wallace says he really would like to see tried out in the future is a lowering of tariff walls so America would buy more goods abroad. This, he contends, would revive foreign markets for American farm products.

Meanwhile the administration strove to remedy one job of alteration on which leaders had not counted. Senator Tom Connally, author of the oil control section of NIRA which the supreme court adjoined unconstitutional, announced he would introduce a joint resolution without delay designed to meet the court's objections.

quarrelled. Attempts by the defense to shake Schiller's story in cross examination brought no apparent result.

Kirkpatrick, who with his brother Finis took pictures of Bowman when the defense was accusing him of suffering a fractured leg when he tried to vault a fence, testified he did not at that time believe the man badly hurt and that the snapshots were taken in fun. Previously Special Prosecutor George Mowry said the state would show Bowman's anxiety to get the pictures caused him to quarrel with Lamplin just before the shooting.

The defense's opening statement by State Senator H. H. Yeater, yesterday, it was charged that the state placed too great an emphasis on the pictures, and attempted to minimize Bowman's injury, which Hesa claimed caused him to plunge to the ground from his car and that his rifle accidentally discharged, the bullet entering Lamplin's head. JAFSIE IDENTIFIES HAUPTMANN THREE TIMES AS "JOHN"

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

in vain for a baby that then lay dead and unnoticed in a woods near Hope-val, said he saw Hauptmann on the street in August, 1934. That was before Hauptmann's arrest.

The elderly negotiator's eloquent manner of relating the futile searches for the baby after the ransom had been paid brought moist eyes to Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, the baby's father, who had already related his own story without emotional display.

Dr. Condon's first identification of Hauptmann came shortly after he began to testify early in the day. He stared at Hauptmann, said he paid \$50,000 to "John," was an extended finger in front of him and loudly cried:

"John" is Bruno Richard Hauptmann."

Sees Bruno On Street

Then he gave more testimony about "John," about sitting with him on a park bench to arrange for the ransom payment, when "John" asked him: "Will I burn if the baby is dead?"

"John" is Bruno Richard Hauptmann."

Then, again telling about the meeting in St. Raymond's cemetery in the Bronx where he and Colonel Lindbergh went with the ransom money on the night of April 2, 1932, and relating the payment of the money and conversation with "John," he was asked for a third time: "Who is John?" and for the third time he replied:

"John" is Bruno Richard Hauptmann—or rather Bruno Richard Hauptmann."

Condon, Reilly Tangle

He did not explain the tongue slip that brought forth "Rudolf."

When Reilly flared at him for cross-examination, heckling and calling upon him to announce that he had said Hauptmann was innocent, the attorney ran headlong into a lecture, a severe lecture in the Bronx man's best schoolmaster manner.

When Jafsie settled back he asked the court if he had been too severe. Reilly, flushed, declared "Come on, I can take it."

The Brooklyn attorney clasped with the prosecutors when he questioned Jafsie about a book on symbolism which had been drawn from the New York public library by a "John Condon."

Jafsie said: "My name is John Francis Condon."

"Master Mind" Noted

The book was reported to contain the symbol that marked all of the authentic kidnap notes. The defense hinted once before that it might pursue this line of questioning when Colonel Lindbergh was asked if he did not think a "master mind" of the kidnaping might insert and himself answer a ransom advertisement. Dr. Condon came into the Lindbergh case through an advertisement inserted by him in the Bronx Home News.

Both Reilly and Condon had their "dander up," bristling. Once Jafsie insisted that "This man be made to speak English." That was when Reilly asked: "You are enjoying your day in the sun, aren't you?"

After identifying notes exchanged between himself and the then mysterious "John," Dr. Condon added to his identification by saying that Hauptmann was the man who met him and sat on a bench with him for an hour in Van Cortland park sometime before the ransom was paid.

The notes he identified were the letter he received in response to an advertisement he inserted, and subsequent notes giving him directions, all of them bearing the strange "three-fold" symbol for signature.

The first letter identified him as going between and instructed him to get an advertisement in a newspaper saying "money is ready." Enclosed with it was a note to Colonel Lindbergh, saying the kidnap had accepted Condon as intermediary.

Dr. Condon examined the notes with meticulous care before he would identify them. When he received the first letter, designating him, he said: "I felt rather pleased that I was so honored."

The Bronx man at times appeared to be consciously dramatic about his testimony. Melodrama tinged his voice on occasions, such as when he related that in the Lindbergh home: "I step in the baby's nursery."

Jafsie Loquacious

There was rolling "Ah's" over the courtroom. Attorney General David T. Wilentz repeated: "So you slept in the nursery?"

At time he became loquacious, especially about his own early life, and Wilentz would step him. Defense attorneys wanted him to be allowed to ramble on.

His first identification of Hauptmann came early in his testimony. Wilentz quickly leading him up to the night of April 2, 1932, when he drove with Colonel Lindbergh to St. Raymond's cemetery with \$70,000 to meet the man known as "John."

After he testified that \$50,000 was separated from the money, Wilentz asked:

"Did you give the money to a man that night?"

"I did," he answered, his voice beginning to rise.

"Who did you give it to?"

"John."

"Who is John?" Wilentz's own voice cracked.

"Bruno Richard Hauptmann," Hauptmann blushed, turned deep

scarlet, and glared at the aged witness, Jafsie, glared back.

Here is Dr. Condon's story of his first meeting with "John" at the gate of Woodlawn cemetery in the Bronx, with the prompting questions eliminated:

File Describes Meeting

"I saw a handkerchief inside from someone inside the gate being waved—the man was inside the cemetery gate."

"A man put his arm through the bars, which were wide enough to admit a man's arm, entering or retracing. I walked over there and said, 'I see you.'"

"The man was standing about three feet away on the inside... The gates were closed. About the locking I do not know... The man was John."

"John is Bruno Richard Hauptmann... He said 'Did you get it the money?'... I said 'No, I couldn't bring the money until I saw the package... About a minute or so I heard a rustle in the leaves. There is a little bit of a pathway on the inside of that gate and I heard a rustle in that direction... He heard it and said, 'There's a cop.'"

"He caught about of the bars and climbed, what I call 'Turner' fashion, up to the top of that fence and jumped in front of me..."

"Did you send the cops?" he asked. I said 'No, I gave you my word that I wouldn't do that, and I kept my word.' He then said: 'It is too dangerous and started to run in north-easterly direction.'
