

MYSTERY WOMEN ARE INTRODUCED TO AID DEFENSE

Hacker, took the stand before the end of the court day at 4:07 p. m.

The session ended with testimony by New Jersey and New York police who identified samples of handwriting penned by Hauptmann following his arrest on September 10, 1934. The samples were admitted to evidence over the caustic objections of the defense, and were obviously preliminary to the state's coming expert evidence designed to show that Hauptmann was the writer of the many ransom notes.

Colonel Breckinridge, friend and legal advisor to Colonel Lindbergh, testified that Dr. Condon had opposed payment of ransom unless the baby was delivered C. O. D.

Fisch, Not Messenger He was called upon by the prosecution to clear up an off-the-record charge of the defense that one of the ransom notes is missing. This charge was made at the noon recess after Dr. Condon had testified.

There were two notes in the package containing the baby's sleeping suit, which was delivered through the mail to Dr. Condon's home and opened by Colonel Lindbergh.

Colonel Breckinridge remembered only one note, Mrs. Hacker said it was her best recollection there were two notes. Mrs. Hacker also told of the delivery of a note to her father by a dark, slim young man, about five feet, six or seven inches tall. Really showed her a picture of Isador Fisch, from whom Hauptmann claims he got the ransom money, and she said she did not believe he was the man who delivered the note.

Jafsis Recognizes Women Rellly waved letters before Condon and asked him if he had not shown them to the two women named as Mrs. Hermina Koren and Mrs. Busch, and told them they were in the handwriting of the kidnapers. The 74-year-old educator remembered no such incident.

Mrs. Koren, dressed in green, was brought forward in the courtroom. Jafsis recognized her as one of two women who came to his home in the Bronx to discuss a real estate transaction. He remembered also that the other woman was Mrs. Busch.

"And did you say to this lady and the lady that was with her that you knew the kidnapers to be four in number?" demanded Rellly.

"Not to my recollection," replied Jafsis.

"I won't say either until I am sure. Might I ask a question?" He was not allowed to ask his question. Mrs. Koren lives on a farm near Hopewell, Mrs. Busch was identified as a woman living near Flemington.

JAFSIE DENIES GANG STORY FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 10.—(AP)—Counsel for Bruno Richard Hauptmann attempted unsuccessfully today to show through Dr. John F. Jafsis) Condon that the Lindbergh baby was stolen by a gang.

Questions of this line hammered at the state's star accuser of Hauptmann by Edward J. Rellly produced only negative answers.

The aged educator, who yesterday identified Hauptmann as the mysterious "John" of the Lindbergh ransom, didn't remember ever telling anybody that he believed a gang kidnaped the baby, and he denied the attorney's assertion that he had told a newspaperman the baby's body had been brought back to the spot where it was found in the woods a few miles from the Hopewell home of the Lindberghs.

He also ignored the attorney's use of the term "the chief," when asking if the box, in which the ransom money was placed had been planned and ordered by "the chief." Jafsis said the box was ordered by Colonel Lindbergh and Attorney Henry Breckinridge and built by a New York woodcarver.

Street Incident Figures Rellly brought up his line by asking him why he made no attempt to have a bus driver run down the man he saw on the street in the Williamsburg section of New York in August, 1934, a man he said he recognized as "John," identified by him as Hauptmann. Jafsis was on a bus at the time.

"Did you call out to the chauffeur, 'Get that man?'"

"No, it was none of my business," Jafsis replied, and this brought from the attorney:

"So, it is your sworn testimony then that you made no effort to capture the man to whom you say you gave \$50,000, the man who double-crossed you on the ransom?"

"I didn't say that," parried Jafsis, explaining there was too much traffic to permit a chase.

Jafsis denied ever telling anybody that he thought a gang which kidnaped the baby had headquarters on City Island.

reached Rellly shot at Jafsis a query of a purported transfer as principal of a public school in 1902 because of conduct unbecoming a gentleman with a woman teacher.

"No sir," Dr. Condon snapped. Attorney General David T. Wilentz charged Rellly was attempting to assassinate Dr. Condon's character "by inference."

Rellly pounded again on the "hollow cough" that the mysterious "John" had when he sat on a park bench with Condon for an hour to discuss the ransom. The defense may contend that Condon talked, not to Hauptmann, but to Isador Fisch who died of tuberculosis in Germany. Hauptmann has claimed that Lindbergh ransom money found in his possession was given to him by Fisch for safekeeping.

obligations shall be paid in more of a given unit than otherwise," he said.

Contracts Not Prohibited Bourne challenged the contention that the gold clause impeded congress in its power to regulate the currency. The gold clauses were employed, he said, because of the gold standard act of 1900 which specifically set up a yardstick for the measurement of currency.

"That being so," he said, "these contracts came into being with that standard of value. Congress meant to say that if that yardstick entered into contracts those contracts would be binding."

"No case ever decided by this court has held that persons may not enter into contracts even if the indirect result is to limit the things congress may do."

Bourne challenged claims that gold is affected with a public interest such as light, air and water are. "If it has any public interest," he said, "it is as a standard of value. Why, then, shouldn't it be used in gold clause contracts?"

The attorney said he did not question the right of congress to do things that might have unexpected results. He challenged, he said, its power by direct enactment to invalidate the gold clause contracts.

Even though it is impossible to carry out the terms of the contract in gold coin, nothing in the gold reserve act prohibits payment in gold bullion, the lawyer charged.

WARNING CIRCULAR SENT HOP-GROWERS BY BIG COMMITTEE

SALEM, Jan. 10.—(AP)—An opposing element to the proposed hop growers' code, as drafted recently by growers from Oregon, Washington and California, made itself known here Wednesday.

Circulars headed "Warning" and signed by a committee composed of B. O. Schuchling and S. J. Hoover, Polk county; D. P. McCarthy and P. J. May, Marion county; Stuart Hurd, Lane county; Ada Weston, Josephine county; Smith Brothers, St. Paul-Oregon City, and Schultz Brothers, Donald, were received by a number of growers here.

The circular read: "Warning to all hop growers. Beware of all high-power, smooth-talking promoters who desire to set up a dictatorship with the power to control the production, sale and prevention of sale of your hops. They make many promises but can guarantee absolutely nothing. Attend all meetings to protect your rights, but do not be tricked into signing away your vote and rights of future meetings to anyone who may or may not carry out your wishes at these meetings. Cast your own ballot and retain your rights. Play safe."

Hop growers in the Eugene district are holding a meeting at 7:30 o'clock Thursday evening at the chamber of commerce, at which time an advisory committee from this section will be chosen.

Davis mocked the "spectacle of industry, which kept production down to an annual average of only 57 per cent of its 1929 production for the last five years, putting its tongue in the cheek and crying 'shame' at the farmer who maintained an 87 per cent level of the 1929 production during those same five years."

"If I were a radical reductionist," he said, "How gloomy I would be to discover that in 1934, in spite of all our control programs and in spite of the most disastrous drought in our history, our national agricultural production was only 15 per cent below our production in 1929—while industrial production was 42 per cent below the 1929 level."

Davis called on industry to increase output 45 per cent to effect a rise in agricultural prices through increased employment and purchasing power.

Fire trucks frequently use Eleventh and during the past year this street saw more traffic crashes at intersections than any other main street. For that reason, it is believed wise to widen it.

Since the city council will have considerable regular business to transact at the meeting Monday night, the widening project will not be submitted, Councilman Zumwalt said.
