

LITTLE THEATER'S PLAYERS WORKING ON 'DOUBLE BILL'

With the opening date set tentatively for Tuesday, Jan. 29, the Very Little Theater is planning to open its annual season of public performances with a "double bill," the most ambitious ever undertaken by the organization.

Strindberg's classic theory that "love between the sexes is strife" will be revived in the presentation of the great Swedish dramatist's tragedy, "The Father." With it will be presented W. S. Gilbert's "Pygmalion and Galatea," one of the most brilliant comedies the great British satirist ever wrote.

The double program will be used also for a demonstration of modern theater technique which is expected to be of much interest to Grange players and others in Lane county who are active in the rapidly developing community theater movement.

Lance Hart, president of the Very Little Theater has designed a set of "plastic" type which will be used for the two entirely different plays. Special lights and draperies will give the effect of a complete change of setting to fit the character of the two plays.

Ernest Christie is directing "Pygmalion" with many new and many familiar faces in the cast. Arthur Gray who directed and played in some of the original Very Little Theater productions five years ago has returned to Eugene and he will be seen as "Pygmalion." Mary Jean Warner plays "Galatea," the idealized statue which comes to life. Mildred Le Compte Moore will be Cynisca, the vengeful wife.

In the role of Cynisca, the millionaire patron of the arts, Hugh Rossen steps out of his familiar activity as manager of University athletics and pioneer pageants and into a rich comedy part. Maize Glustina who has appeared in numerous county plays has the role of Daphne, the wife of the magnate.

Gretchen Wintermeyer and Jack Bryan do a refreshing version of "flaming youth," while Jack Burden symbolizes the "intelligentsia" and Alex Atterbury a "one man labor movement."

"The Father," Ernesto Knollin and Elizabeth Scroggs have the leading roles of "the Captain" and his amazing wife, "Laura." Kenneth Shumaker is the ministerial "voice of conscience," Robert Horn is the shrewd doctor; Sally Allen is "Margaret," the sturdy old nurse; Mary Shore Miesher, the daughter who is the center of dispute. Blair Alderman plays the philandering soldier, "Noid," and Karl Thumemann is the ancient orderly.

Plans call for the double production to run at least a week and there is possibility it may play ten nights, since it has been the experience of the Very Little Theater that in accordance with the Little Theater policy of aiding other community movements, the opening night proceeds will be given to the Girl Scouts.

Education Program For Transients to Be Discussed Here

An innovation in adult education consisting of a project for giving educational facilities to transients at the federal transient camp at Skinner Butte is planned here, it was announced Thursday by H. R. Gould, city school superintendent.

A meeting of men at the camp will be held Monday night at which time H. L. Robe, one of the instructors in the adult education classes at the Eugene high school, will be present to outline possible courses for the transients.

The men will be asked to express their opinion on the project and, if favorable, to determine the courses in which they would be interested. Courses in elementary reviews likely would be of most interest to these men, Mr. Gould believes, but there are several courses they may have if they desire.

In the event it is decided to hold the courses, Mr. Robe will act as instructor and will meet with the men Mondays and Tuesdays at the Skinner Butte camp.

IDEAL IN SERVICE CLUB WORK TOPIC FOR ACTIVE MEET

The day of regarding a service club as a charitable institution is passed. It is a mistaken idea that every time a dollar is to be raised or a contribution made that one should run to a service club for help. Such a practice is wrong and unfair. The function of a service club is to have some objective that makes for better living for its members, their neighbors, their city, state and country.

Such was a thought expressed in an informal talk on the general topic of service clubs by Arch A. Bernard at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Eugene Active club, Thursday noon at the Eugene hotel.

Mr. Bernard served the Eugene Kiwanis club for two years as president, giving up his office the first of the year, and also served the group as lieutenant governor for this division.

Development of good and fine citizenship should be the ideal of every member of every service club, Mr. Bernard pointed out. All should work for a better and higher type of citizenship, he added. Each member should consider himself a part of the commonwealth and nation.

Many think the service club is taking the place of the chamber of commerce. It is not, he declared. The chambers of commerce are concerned more with the material development of their communities. Service clubs are concerned with the spiritual values. Every service club should work in cooperation with its chamber of commerce but never should a service club look at itself in a commercial sense, he continued.

Quoting from "The House by the Side of the Road," Mr. Bernard said the sentiment there is fine, but service club members can not sit in the house by the side of the road and watch the rest of the world go by. Service club members must pave the road, fill the ruts and make the way smoother for those who follow them.

The speaker was introduced by Stuart Bowie. A guest at the luncheon was Richard Odell. Al Brandt announced that the program next week would include a talk by Col. E. V. D. Murphy, commandant at the University R. O. T. C., who will tell of his experiences in Hawaii. Melvin Long is to give the weekly five-minute talk from a member.

G. L. Inman gave the five-minute talk for the meeting Thursday. Edwin Johnson announced a new attendance contest. V. C. May, George Evans and G. L. Inman are captains for the three teams.
