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ing on the subject so that citizens could express themselves on the plan.

Overhead Crossing Talked
Judge E. O. Potter, chairman of the commission, said Friday he believed the commission would hold such a hearing if the council requested it. He pointed out the commission, in its master city plan, had recommended a setback along East Eleventh, but the plan does not contemplate the work at once.

Councilman Zumwalt recalled Friday that when the matter of widening East Eleventh was considered a few years ago, engineers of the Southern Pacific company indicated that company would be willing to put in an overhead crossing on Eleventh if the street were widened and made a through street. He said this matter should be investigated to see if the company were still willing to do this at the present.

Council to Get Petitions

One petition bearing more than 40 names was given to Mr. Zumwalt Friday morning by Lennie Halderson, resident of the area just west of the city. He said several more petitions were being circulated, urging the council to make West Eleventh a through street on the grounds it would curtail accidents. The petitions point out that many farmers and others residing west of the city use Eleventh street as a route into town, thus concentrating considerable traffic on this avenue.

Whether or not the council will take any action on the Eleventh street matter Monday is doubtful. Mayor Large said, due to the fact considerable routine business must come up at that meeting. However, it was certain the petitions and the Realty Board's recommendation would be placed before the city fathers at that time.

To the Planning Commission,
City of Eugene, Oregon.

The following statements are hereby respectfully submitted as substantial facts, as pertaining to the proposal to make Eleventh Avenue a "Through" or "Stop" street as a safety measure for the general public.

"First: Eleventh Avenue, being the only street running directly and completely through the City of Eugene, and centrally located, has become the natural traffic artery through Eugene; notwithstanding the location of the state highway being else here.

"Second: The fact that Eleventh Avenue has become the natural major traffic artery through the city, it seems to be considered as actually a "Through Street" and is used as such to the extent that its traffic has become an actual hazard to vehicles entering from other streets, causing destruction to life and property that can and should be avoided by making said Eleventh Avenue a through or stop street.

"Third: Eleventh Avenue being a straight street through the city, it is used by the Eugene Fire Department more than any other street in the city in making emergency runs; which naturally adds another hazard to the public on a non-stop street. Furthermore, the fire station being located on Eleventh Avenue, it becomes imperative that at least a portion of this street be used by the fire department at all times, further makes the need of a through street quite apparent.

"Fourth: Eleventh Avenue being located directly on the newly located "Route F" to the beach, the further increased traffic on this street naturally points to the necessity of a through and unobstructed highway through the city.

"Fifth: The growing demand and necessity of a centrally located through street to both the east and west portions of the city, as well as through the city, makes Eleventh Avenue the natural artery for such, as a safety measure for the general public, which has been repeatedly demonstrated by the many traffic accidents that could and should be prevented by making this street a through, stop and safety street.

"Sixth: Eleventh Avenue being the natural gateway through the city for the movement of freight from east to west to the deep water terminal over the newly designated "Route F" now under construction, further evidence is apparent that this street should be made a stop or through street to accommodate the increased demand for the movement of such freight, together with the safety provision that a stop or through street would furnish.

"Seventh: The trend of international affairs, relative to national defense, clearly indicate that air craft will undoubtedly be the predominant method of warfare in the future by all nations. Therefore, in the latest proposals by our government to provide an adequate air defense along the Pacific coast by establishing a number of air craft bases, one of which is being sought by Eugene, because of its natural position for such defense base and that our Eleventh Avenue being

the most direct route to the airport again stresses the necessity of making it a stop or through street.

Nuys (D., Ind.) and Edward McGrady, assistant secretary of labor. Miss Perkins explained that "the federal government does not make grants to individuals under this program."

The direct aid to states for the aged and indigent, she said, is to take care of this group until the old age pension funds can be established.

President Roosevelt said today he probably would submit the social security program to congress in a special message next week and Senator Wagner added he would introduce the legislation.

It is the present intention of administration leaders to group the various proposals into one bill.

HOLC Probe Proposed

Meanwhile, between an empty senate chamber and a house occupied with routine debate, nine supreme court justices canvassed with judicial carelessness the closing judgments on which they will decide whether the suspension of gold payments by the government was constitutional.

At a press conference, President Roosevelt made public a report by the federal power commission showing that the public utility bond holdings of life insurance companies were valued at \$100,000,000 higher today than before the stock market crash of 1929.

A searching investigation of "irregularities" in the Home Owners Loan Corporation was proposed in the house by Representative Sweeney (D., Ohio) shortly before the house ratified the list of democratic chairmen and members of 45 committees chosen yesterday at a party caucus. Republican committee assignments will be approved next week.

Give Banks Time

In an interview, congress was advised by Carter Glass, Virginia's veteran senator and banking authority, to let banking legislation alone at this session and "give the banks a rest."

"It is my feeling that the less legislation the better," Glass said, "in order to give the present laws time to work out."

An appearance of Joseph Kennedy before a house appropriations subcommittee renewed chances that the securities and exchange commission he heads may get more funds than the \$1,670,244 allowed by the appropriations group. The budget had recommended \$2,370,000. Kennedy also asked \$900,000 in emergency funds for the current year.
