

SCIENTISTS WAIT
CHANCE TO VIEW
"END OF WORLD"

PASADENA, Cal., Jan. 11.—(AP)—A few of the end of the world is awaited by astronomers. They are waiting for the first glimpse of the largest telescope they expect to see sometime in the next two years, says Dr. Fritz Zwicky, physicist of California Institute of Technology.
At this stage, he thinks, will be in the position of a star cluster, some 100,000,000,000,000 miles away, from among Virgo's 500 galaxies. Zwicky said today, one of the galaxies will probably step forth in the role of a super-nova and "the end of the world" quite possibly for the astronomers who study it.
The play will be fatal to the star, it will explode with a brilliance equal to that of a hundred suns.
There have been such colossal explosions before, but modern astronomy has not yet studied one. These super-novas have been recorded by the Chinese, and even found on astronomical photographic plates as far back as 1850, but never have they been studied through modern instruments.
Zwicky believes any star may become a super-nova. The study of a super-nova with modern instruments will give the answer to questions at the history, evolution and death of stars.
The theory gives us a new idea of the possible nature of the end of the world, he said, pointing out that the sun thereafter would be nothing but a hot cloud of gases drifting space.

INDIVIDUALISTS ARE
SEEN AS FOES OF
ROOSEVELT IN '36

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WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Opposition to President Roosevelt in the 1936 election may come from any of three political parties which are developing radical programs to the left of the New Deal.
Each of these three parties is dominated by an individual. They are:
Sen. Robert M. La Follette, Progressive, Wis.
Gov. Floyd B. Olson, Farmer-Labor, Minn.
Sen. Huey P. Long, radical democrat, La.
Long has definitely broken with the administration after months of bickering. He generally is considered to be a candidate for nomination for president one year from next June. His personal and political affairs are being arranged for the prospective campaign.
Olson and La Follette are more cautious. The governor was re-elected on a platform which in the preamble proposed that capitalism be abolished in favor of an economic program founded upon socialism.
The farmer-labor platform projects a co-operative commonwealth founded upon socialization of industry. It proposes government ownership of banks, utilities, insurance companies, and social legislation.
He is not yet committing himself to oppose the new deal.
La Follette is keeping himself in a strategic position where he can buck the new deal or back it in 1936. He and his brother, Governor Phil La Follette, organized the progressive party last year and won the state. Their platform goes beyond the new deal on some major issues, as follows:
1.—Spend \$10,000,000,000 or more to provide a job for every person not employed by private initiative.
2.—Control credit through a central bank.
3.—Government ownership of railroads.
4.—Government ownership of the munitions industry.
5.—Immediate cash payment of the war veterans' bonus.
The progressives are nearest of the three to the new deal.
Long presented his "share the wealth" plan this week to a national audience. He sought support for it as opposed to the new deal. It includes a capital levy; a limit of \$1,000,000 on annual income to any individual; a home, automobile and radio for every family; guaranteed employment; assured education; old age pensions, and a debt moratorium.
