JENSEN, CLINGMAN TO RESUME MIGHTY FEUD ON THURSDAY

The mat bout fans have been waiting more than a year to see—the culminating frays in a wrestling feud that packed the armory several times in 1933 and 1934, will be fought on Thursday night when Thor Jensen, the Elkton Thunderbolt, resumes hostilities with Otis Clingman, the Oklahoma Sailor, in the main event of Herb Owen's mat card.

The few times the pair battled before when they were both here have lived long in the memory of county fans, and ever since the Thunderbolt returned from his South African trip the question uppermost in the mind of every enthusiast was "When will Herb Owen match them again?"

Many Expected
 Owen has waited some time, but at last has agreed to match the pair. The tenseness has been increased by the wait, and fans, seeing the improvement Clingman has shown and noting the many tricks Thor picked up in the wild, will turn out thousands strong to see which is the better, which has improved the most, since their last battle.

The course of the match will not run smoothly, and the promotion of it is none too easy for Owen, either. Jensen has flatly refused to wrestle if either Harry Elliott or Fred Moracci is the third man in the ring, while Clingman says he doesn't give a hoot who referees, but only wishes to gain lasting vengeance for the fatal dive over the ropes which layed him out and sent him to the hospital in the last battle here between the pair, in the fall of 1933.

 Jensen is definite in his refusal to accept the officiating of Elliott and Moracci, and Owen is casting about for a substitute arbiter. "I have several in mind," he says, "but definite announcement of the referee will have to wait until Monday. However, fans may be sure the bout will be staged, and I guarantee to have a capable arbiter on hand if I have to send to San Francisco for him."

Getting back to the wrestling match itself. The Jensen-Clingman feud is a genuine hatred, and in their previous matches both boys have done serious damage to each other. The score is still slightly in favor of Jensen, however, and Clingman is anxious to even it. "I know I have improved since my last appearance here," says he, "and Thor will find it out, too."

Jensen is certain to rough things up, and Clingman amply demonstrated last Thursday that he could reply in kind. The hour will combine brilliant wrestling with terrific give and take, and every fan should come away satisfied.

Carlson, Former U. H. S. Star Now Eligible At U. O.

Fred Carlson, freshman athlete at the University of Oregon, and former University high star, was yesterday given notice that he would be able to compete his full three years on the varsity.

Professor H. C. Howe, university faculty representative in athletic affairs, sought exemption for Carlson, who, before coming to the Webfoot institution, had registered, but not attended at Willamette.

He unwittingly ran afoul of conference regulations in doing so, Howe said, and was deprived of his freshman competition as well as one year of varsity. However, his fine record as a student acted favorably in his case, and he was extended leniency.

Local fans will remember Carlson as one of the finest athletes ever put out at the campus prep school, Weibull, but 165 pounds, he led the Golden Tide football team his senior year, and played a bang-up game at running guard. He was classed with Elton Owen as one of the finest blockers in the district, and was considered an outstanding prospect for this year's freshman team when news of his ineligibility came.

J-C COMPETITION TO AFFECT STARS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 12—(P)—Northwest conference heads today ruled that in the future any competition for an athlete at a junior college will count the same as a year of completion at any conference school to which he transfers.

Athletes are allowed four years of varsity or varsity and freshman competition in the conference. Previously junior college or normal school transfers were allowed three years competition even if they completed more than a year before transferring.

Several minor eligibility rules were clarified.

The conference ruled that a year of varsity reserve play will count as a year of competition for Jim Burdett of Willamette university. Burdett subsequently played three years of varsity ball, hence was ruled ineligible for the coming season.
