

### "MENTAL HEALTH" SOCIETY TO BRING LECTURERS HERE

Six lectures on mental health, bringing outstanding authorities as speakers, are in store for Eugene people during January and February, it is announced by Mrs. Carl Phetteplace, executive secretary of the Eugene unit of the Oregon Mental Health Society, sponsors of the lecture course. First of the series is scheduled for next Thursday evening, January 17, and others will follow every Thursday evening through February 21.

"Eugene's mental health group is the second in the state," says Mrs. Phetteplace. "The Portland unit recently sponsored a lecture series, and it is through them that we are securing our speakers. It is all a part, however, of a greater new national movement organizing for education in mental health, similar to the physical health movement which has operated in the United States for a number of years."

The schedule of lecturers and their subjects follows: Jan. 17, Dr. H. H. Dixon, noted Portland psychiatrist, "Mental Health: Its Meaning and Application"; Jan. 24, Dr. Elam Anderson, president of Lincoln College, "Mental Health from the Viewpoint of the Educator"; Jan. 31, Dr. O. R. Chambers, professor of vocational psychology at O. S. C., "A Psychologist's View of Mental Health"; Feb. 7, Dr. Laurence Selling, Portland neurologist, "Mental Health and the Physician"; Feb. 14, Dr. Hudson Ballard, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Portland and authority on religious psychology, "Mental Health and Religious Adjustment"; Feb. 21, "Mental Health in the Home," presented by one of the university professors. Each of the lectures, one hour in length, will be followed by an hour's discussion.

The lectures will be held on the university campus, the exact location to be announced next week. The first of the series is free to the public, according to Mrs. Phetteplace. Season tickets for the entire course will sell at one dollar, with single admissions at 25 cents. Proceeds will be used to cover the expenses of the outside speakers.

"Mental health work in Oregon grew largely out of the work of Dr. Harold Leonard Bowman, former pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Portland, explains Dr. Howard Taylor, acting head of the university psychology department. "Dr. Bowman found that, after all, much of the trouble and difficulty, as well as the happiness, which people experience is caused by subjective factors within themselves rather than by organic diseases. Most physicians are quite aware that 50 per cent of their practice is composed of cases in which the chief factor is not physical ailment, but lack of adjustment to environment."

"The statement 'there is nothing either good or bad, but thinking makes it so' is perhaps an exaggeration, but it contains the germ of the truth. Our problem is to inform people of the importance of mental hygiene and the help which exist for them. In this way we must try to get at some of our psychological maladjustments, just as we have attacked the problems of physical health."

### Gent's Pullets Lay In Frigid Alas

Mrs. Lee Stearns of Petersburg, Alaska, writes to P. A. Gent of Eugene's Leghorn farm, that her pullets, shipped to her two months ago, laid the very first day and laid from 60 to 75 per cent from the start with weather for two weeks continually below zero and when it warmed up they laid 90 per cent.

The first batch of 30,000 of Gent's Leghorn chicks came off Wednesday, January 9, and were the initial delivery of 1000 chicks being brooded in January for sale as pullets later, by the Junction City Pullet farm operated by Gent's Leghorn farm and by Francis Torber formerly of Portland. Mr. Torber is raising 15,000 Gent's chicks.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Jan. 12.—(UP)—Hugo Mayer, the "Wild Man of Indigo Creek," will probably go on trial next week before Judge H. D. Corton here on a charge of the first degree murder of Robert Fanta, his nearest neighbor in the wild Illinois river country on the Curry-Josephine county border.

It is believed by many members of the organization that in the past the votes of some legislators have been influenced by the ownership of such securities.

A resolution adopted at the last meeting of Central grange follows: "Whereas, we believe that in times past the vote of some of the members of our state legislature have been influenced by the fact that they owned stocks, bonds, or securities in certain banks, railroads, power companies, or other utilities; by the fact that they were the agent or attorney for some of these utilities or corporations.

this time asking that a law be passed by the state legislature making it mandatory for every candidate of the Oregon state legislature to file with the Secretary of state 30 days before the primaries a sworn statement stating the amount of bonds, shares of stock, or securities of private utilities owned by him or his immediate family; also whether he is at present or has within the year passed acted as agent, manager, or attorney for any bank, corporation, or private utility, this statement to be open to general public inspection.

"Such a statement should be mandatory for all legislative candidates filing as independents after primaries and before general election.

"Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to each of our representatives from Lane county.

### Japanese City Is Destroyed By Fire

SAKAIMACHI, Torrori Prefecture, Japan, Jan. 12.—(UP)—Fire destroyed a third of this town during the night, reducing 500 houses to ashes. Casualties were not known.

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
