FARM PROJECTS TO BE OUTLINED BY COMMITTEES

Projects for Lane county agriculture in 1935 are being outlined this week at a series of meetings by committees of the Lane County Agricultural Council in the office of O. S. Fletcher, county agent.

The meetings started Monday afternoon at 1:30 with poultry problems being discussed by a committee composed of: Al Hoffman, chairman, H. E. Peterson, Kenneth Nielson, Roy Overgard, Carl Petzold, H. E. Cosby, extension poultry specialist from Oregon State college, was present to assist.

The horticultural committee will meet Wednesday afternoon, the rodent and predatory animal control group on Thursday, dairying on Friday and general livestock on Saturday.

Members of the committees, appointed by F. B. Harlow, president of agricultural council, and their advisors are as follows:

Horticulture: Truman A. Chase, president, Ben Davidson, secretary, other officers and directors of the Lane County Horticultural society, and O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulture specialist, O. S. C.

solidation of boards and departments. In fact, I feel that we have made only a beginning along this line."

Referring to the great power issue at the time of his election four years ago, the executive stated that now "the government's power undertaking at Bonneville obviates any necessity of the state assuming a heavy load of bonded indebtedness for power development."

The governor did recommend, however, the legislature memorialize congress for construction of the Bonneville project to its full capacity and to construct the necessary transmission lines.

"I promised the people of Oregon an economical and businesslike administration of state affairs," said Meier. "During the four years of my administration state appropriations have been reduced \$5,450,138, and an inherited deficit which at one time reached \$4,500,000 has been wiped out."

Among his other recommendations listed as he reviewed the various achievements of the state departments with which he has had contact, Meier urged consideration of legislation to reduction of local taxes as well as holding the budget down in order to wipe out the state tax on real property.

The governor also urged consideration of the demands of hotels and restaurants in dispensing liquors, a subject "difficult of solution." He lauded the work of the state highway commission and its economical administration, and the work of the Oregon national guard during the recent strike unrest in Portland.

In closing the executive paid tribute to Thomas B. Kay and Hal E. Hoss, treasurer and secretary of state respectively, who died while in the service of the state the past four years. He also commended P. J. Stadelman, retiring secretary of state, his secretary, Beatrice Walton Sackett, and to all departments which cooperated with him during his administration.

The Southern Pacific company reported Monday that there was a light fall of snow at Cascade Summit Monday forenoon and that the temperature was below 25 degrees. A lot of fresh snow fell over the week-end and it is now something over 60 inches deep on the level.

Monday was a raw cold day in Eugene and vicinity. The minimum temperature was 28 degrees some time early in the morning and it was only four degrees higher—exactly at the freezing point—at noon. Light snow flurries were seen in the air occasionally. The wind was from the north and a genuine old "norther" seemed to be a possibility. Hereafter the snow has been from the south and, mixed with rain, it was very moist, but let the temperature get down to freezing and with the wind in the north and the snow if any is entirely different and usually stays on.

the United States this year. Seemingly there has been an astronomical recession of the Far West.

A lunar eclipse occurs when the moon passes into the shadow of the earth. When only part of the sun's light is cut off from any portion, there is a faint darkening known as the penumbra. When the same part is entirely hidden from the sun, a very dark shadow, the umbra, appears. The umbra may cover only a part of the moon (partial eclipse) or all of it (total eclipse).

On Saturday the first indication of the eclipse will be the appearance at 4:39 a. m., Pacific standard time, of the inconspicuous penumbra at one edge of the moon. This will gradually move inward until it spreads over the entire disk. At 5:53 a. m. the black umbra will begin to creep over the face of our lunar neighbor. By 7:04 it will cover all of it. Totality will last until 8:31 a. m. The moon will set totally eclipsed for those on the coasts of the United States and Canada.

The moon does not usually become entirely invisible even when fully eclipsed. It has a faint reddish appearance due to the small amount of sunlight reaching it by refraction through the earth's atmosphere. The Hebrew prophet likely had in mind eclipses of the sun and moon when he wrote, "The sun shall be turned into darkness and the moon into blood."

According to calculations the moon will set at Eugene at 7:47 a. m. Observers should attempt to have as nearly as possible a distant, level horizon toward the northwest where the moon will set. A hill cutting off only five degrees of the sky will cause the moon to set half an hour earlier than the predicted time. Sunrise will occur at about the time of moonset.

Farm Accounting Class Will Start

Group leaders will be instructed in the use of the simple farm accounting record books supplied by the A. A. A. at a meeting to be held Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock in the Eugene high school. O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, will be in charge, assisted by H. H. White, farm management specialist from Oregon State college.

All farmers who have signed contracts for crop control projects are expected to keep the record books although not required to do so. The books, also are available to other farmers wishing to keep records, said Mr. Fletcher. Those attending the training school will in turn serve as instructors for groups of 15 to 20 in their own communities.

Escort Question Fumbled

LONDON, Jan. 14.—(AP)—It was stated officially tonight, following a meeting of the British cabinet, that Great Britain believes the time has come for releasing Germany from the military clauses of the Versailles treaty, provided she joins an armaments limitation pact.

A reliable source said the British cabinet understands that the government of Premier Flandin of France will be more liberal toward Germany and stand ready to accept Germany's allegedly illegal armaments as legal.
