

OLYMPIC BRIDGE EVENT TO BENEFIT LEAGUE'S PROJECT

A benefit of the "different" order is scheduled for February 1 when the Welfare League of Eugene sponsors the local part of the World Bridge Olympic for the benefit of its project to establish a children's ward at the Pacific hospital.

The tournament, which is for the one night only, will be held at 7:30 o'clock in the Osburn hotel. It will not be a duplicate or progressive, each foursome to play at its own table. George F. Schaefer is giving his services to direct the play and the Osburn hotel is giving the use of the rooms. All proceeds will go to aid the ward project, no expenses being paid for those helping with the event.

Fifty nations and 200,000 persons will play these hands simultaneously. The hands were chosen by the world's greatest authorities. Sixteen hands, presenting no intricate problems nor freakish distribution but similar to hands dealt in the course of an ordinary evening of bridge, have been selected by the famous experts and authorities of the World Olympic bridge committee.

As a further service in this event, the Olympic committee has obtained Ely Culbertson's analysis of the correct bidding and play of every one of the 16 hands. On the day after the tournament, this analysis can be obtained.
