

CITY COUNCIL HAS HOT SESSION OVER BEER REGULATIONS

unless the council members were so narrow-minded they could not see their duty they are bound to recommend licenses when asked by legitimate business.

John T. Evans heard

John T. Evans opened the debate on the dry zone.

"Is it the object of this ordinance to create a monopoly for the downtown places?" he asked. "Is it class legislation? If you are going to let anyone sell liquor, why give one group a monopoly? You should give all an equal chance or run them all out. There is no reason that the students should be made to go to town for beer if they want it and they are going to get it if they do want it."

Carlson's motion to retain the ordinance carried 5 to 3, Simon, Zumwalt, Bond, Harris and Carlson voting "yes" while Lamb, Hendershott and Reid voted "no."

Boundaries of Zone Stated

The dry zone as defined by the ordinance is bounded as follows: By a line starting at Tenth and Pearl, running east to the mill race and along the race to the east city limits, south along the city limits to the southern boundary of the city, then west to Pearl and north on Pearl to Tenth. The ordinance originally passed the council without exception after an earlier draft involving a smaller area had been turned down.

Not only does the ordinance ban licensing the sale of liquor in the zone, but it also makes it unlawful for drinks to be given away in homes in the district. It was pointed out during discussion. This was not the intent of the ordinance, Mayor Large stated. As read before the gathering, section two of the ordinance states: "It shall be unlawful in the city of Eugene for any person, firm or corporation to sell or give away or permit to be sold or given away on one's premises alcoholic liquor within the university district as herein defined."

viduals, containing several hundred signatures of persons living in territory tributary to West Eleventh, were presented to the council, asking that the street be made a through street, both for the greater safety of present traffic and because of prospective increased use with the development of route F. The matter was referred to the police and street committees.

Two petitions opposing widening of East Eleventh as being destructive to beautiful trees along the street were tabled. A petition from the Eugene Realty board asking the improvement was tabled also.

Contracts were awarded to the Union Oil company and the General Petroleum company to supply the city's need in gasoline during 1936, both firms submitting bids of 14 cents per gallon. Other bids called for 17 and 18 cents per gallon.

The request of milk distributors for lower licenses and truck fees, first submitted to the council in October, was referred to the health committee and the city recorder instructed to get data from other cities on plans in use.

A proposed new plumbing ordinance which would require a fee of \$50 from all sellers of plumbing materials and license journeymen and apprentice plumbers was referred to the sewer committee.

The city engineer was instructed to get data to property on Twenty-third avenue east between Hillyard and Alder preparatory to steps to open the street. The city and the Eugene school board own most of the land on either side of the street. Opening of the street would give Eugene another through east and west street.

Committees Chosen

Appointments by Mayor Large, approved by the council were: Dr. Irvin R. Fox and Dr. L. S. Kent, reappointed to the health board in accordance with the ordinance enacted at the last city election; Mrs. Edith Chambers, reappointed to the planning commission; H. R. Gould, reappointed to the playground commission; Mrs. W. H. Maxham, reappointed to the park board; A. R. Tiffany, reappointed to the library board.

Councilman Lamb was elected to serve as president of the council for 1936. Mr. Hendershott filled the post the past year. Council committees as named by the mayor are: Judiciary—Harris, Reid, Simon. Finance—Hendershott, Harris, Zumwalt.

Street—Lamb, Bond, Reid. Fire and water—Bond, Hendershott, Lamb.

Health—Zumwalt, Harris, Carlson. Printing and park—Carlson, Simon, Zumwalt.

Sewer—Reid, Lamb, Hendershott. Police—Simon, Bond, Carlson.

Other council business included: A request by business men for more street lights along West Park, referred to the fire and water committee.

A request for one-hour parking along Park street from Oak to the first alley east, referred to the police committee.

Passed ordinance assessing the cost of raising the Gaylord property.

Approved the writing of two bonds for \$50,000 each for the city treasurer and a bond of \$1000 for the city recorder.

Ordered the police committee to investigate the request of Delmer Dietman for a renewal of his taxi license.

Approved a rooming house license for Mrs. Lela Bates at 70 East Broadway.

Ordered bids called for the annual audit of city books, bids to be opened in two weeks.

Voted condemnation of buildings at 109 West Second and 1569 Williams.

Approved a request from I. F. Koch for use of the butte park cottage on Monday and Tuesday nights for adult study classes for staff members of the transient camp.

PUBLIC UP IN THE AIR OVER AMELIA'S IMMEDIATE PLANS

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Amelia Earhart today held her air-minded public somewhat in the air as far as her immediate flying plans were concerned.

America's "first lady" of the air, travel weary from her epochal solo flight across the Pacific on the lonely Honolulu-to-California stretch, and her leisurely jaunt down the coast-line from Oakland to Los Angeles, made this much known:

She wanted to take off for Washington, D. C.

She directed her ocean-spanning monoplane service.

That was the last heard of the blonde, tousled-headed aviatrix late last night when she left the Union Air terminal at Burbank, forced because of bad weather reports to cancel for the time being, at least, her hoped-for cross-country spin to the nation's capital.

Airport officials poured gasoline into the plane's tanks, serviced it completely—and sat down to await either Miss Earhart's reappearance at the field or further directions.

News that the noted flier was heading to Los Angeles yesterday from Oakland spread quickly and fully 2,000 admirers were at the Burbank field when she brought her ship to a stop.

Amelia's mother, Mrs. Amy Otis Earhart, who lives at Toluca Lake, near the airport, was not at the field to greet her daughter, but Amelia said she had expected her mother. She intimated they would be together later in the night.

George Palmer Putnam, wealthy husband of the flier, who kissed her goodbye when she took off from the Honolulu field to accomplish what no woman had ever done and what no one had ever done alone, was reported hurrying to the United States by boat to rejoin his wife.

counties except those specifically rejoining the plan.

Establish a state planning board appointed by and responsible to the governor to devise a comprehensive long-term plan of development for the state of Oregon.

School Problems Discussed

Concerning the need for a more stable and systematic plan of financing and administering public schools the governor said:

"There is a growing tendency in other states, as well as Oregon, towards centralization of responsibility for the operation of schools. This tendency has manifested itself in Oregon during recent years through the urgent appeal of distressed school districts for financial support from state sources of taxation and through the universal cry of property owners for some relief from the burden of taxes."

"Experience has proved that no marked degree of economy, financial stability or educational leadership can be attained under a system of a multiplicity of small independent, and often conflicting, tax-levying school districts."

Costs Still Too High

"In Oregon, we are confronted with the situation of having expended in 1934, even on greatly reduced budgets, about \$16,914,000 of property

taxes though some 2200 different school districts. Under this system, flagrant inequalities have developed, both in the cost of, and the facilities afforded for, common school education. Samples of such inequalities are: "A tax levy in mills of 3 in one district and 25.4 in another of Tillamook county; a tax per pupil enrolled of \$5.41 in one district and \$889.41 in another of Douglas county; a tax per teacher of \$17.05 in one district and \$7,838.32 in another of Lane county; assessed valuation per pupil of \$1,004.11 in one district and \$95,126.49 in another of Clackamas county; assessed valuation per teacher of \$34,475 in one district and \$883,887 in another of Umatilla county."

half teaspoon nutmeg. Mix well together and put in crust. Bake about half an hour.—Mrs. B. E. Stafne, 1403 Villard street, Eugene.

Cherry Dimples
1 quart canned black cherries
1 cup sugar
2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 teaspoons baking powder
3-4 cup milk

Put the quart can cherries and sugar on to heat. When thoroughly hot make dumplings of the other ingredients and drop by spoonful on the cherries. Do not let the fruit juice entirely cover any of the dumplings. Cover the sauce pan and steam until dumplings are cooked. Serve with cream and sugar.—Mrs. S. F. Olson, Eugene.

Fruit Pudding

First part:
One egg
One cup sugar
One cup milk
One teaspoon butter
One teaspoon baking powder
Flour to make cake batter.

Second part:
2 cups canned fruit
1 cup sugar (if fresh fruit, less when canned)
2 tablespoons butter
2 cups boiling water

Pour the boiling hot second part over the first part in the pan it was stirred up in and bake till done; test with toothpick. Fitted canned pie cherries are fine in this.—Mrs. F. L. Waite, route 3, Eugene.

Weatherford was present Monday to see the democratic party enjoy its victory.

As Cooter took over the job as speaker, he waggled an old bell, used by his grandmother as a dinner bell on the old Jefferson ferry in 1838, remarking as he did so that it seemed fitting to have this old bell since it likely was used to call Mr. Weatherford to dinner when that gentleman first went to the state legislature at Salem.

The youngest member of the house, M. C. Rodman, representing Crook and Jefferson counties, made the first motion in the house Monday. He is 24 years of age, a graduate of Oregon State college. His motion, to proceed with organization of the house, was seconded by William V. Knight, of Douglas county, 23 years old, who graduated from the University of Oregon and was admitted to the bar in 1932. Present house members are proud of the youth in the house—there are nine men under 30—pointing out that this is evidence of the new spirit in politics ordained by the people of the state at the last election.

With the lot-de-rol over, the house adjourned as Speaker Cooter had not yet completed his committee assignments. Republicans smiled at the difficulties the democrats are having getting things organized, and expressed some doubt if the state's business could be brushed off in 40 days at the rate things were being started.

They pointed out, however, that business probably would be expedited after the democrats "got the hang of things."

The boys and girls of the legislature are still on "dress parade." It's always that way at opening. Everybody wears his best, collars that cut, suits neatly pressed, shoes that squeak and pinch. As the legislation is dragged off to the committee rooms many of them will get back to the frayed cuffs, stringy ties and gravy-polka vests.

MR. MASON, CIVIL WAR VETERAN, DIED

Frank B. Mason, Civil War veteran and old-time printer, died Monday at the age of 93 years. His home was in Vida.

Funeral services are to be held at 1:30 p. m., Thursday, in the Stetter-Simon chapel.

Mr. Mason was a native of Indiana born near Rockford on an old farm. He enlisted in the Union army during the Civil war on Aug. 6, 1862. He served in the 10th Wisconsin Infantry, went with his regiment to the south after that city was taken, and from there to the Florida to fight the cause of Union.

In 1865, Mr. Mason came west, worked on the Morning Oregonian in Portland as a printer for two years. He had learned his trade in Wisconsin.

After leaving Eugene, Mr. Mason went to West Springfield to the farm. He went to California for 10 years, and returned to Portland in 1885. Later he went to Oregon to work on the Oregon City paper when it was organized into a fire.

Nearly 45 years ago Mr. Mason returned to the Eugene vicinity, take up farming on the McKenna place. The old McKenna road was to run along the river bank by home. Later, the road was built along the north side of his home.

Mr. Mason is survived by one daughter, Mrs. F. W. Beyles of Eugene, Wash. She is to be here for the funeral services.
