

BREMER KIDNAPER AND MOTHER FALL UNDER U. S. GUNS

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OKLAHOMA, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Fred Barker, long sought for the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, wealthy St. Paul banker, and his mother, "Ma" Barker, were shot to death today by department of justice agents after a withering six hour machine gun battle.

Just after the furious battle ended, the federal agents said two men and a woman had been killed, but a later check disclosed that only the Barkers were slain. Apparently, they were the only occupants of the house.

Summer Home is Hideout
The gangsters barricaded themselves in a fine summer home on the bank of Lake Weir, they had rented two months ago. About 6:45 o'clock this morning the agents, fifteen of them, surrounded the place and ordered the occupants to surrender.

There was a blaze of fire from a machine gun in answer. The agents replied and set up their own machine guns and retaliated. A blazing battle raged and continued, except for occasional lulls until 11 o'clock. The agents resorted to tear gas in an effort to smoke out their quarry.

Cook Feels Safe
A negro cook employed in the house, residing under the name of T. C. Blackburn, was sent inside by the agents.

In a moment he returned with the cry: "They are all dead."

None of the justice agents engaged in the battle was injured. A coroner's inquest was called and the agents kept out all except eye-witnesses.

The dead woman was about 60 years old and the man between 30 and 35.

\$50. Now the Safeway company, holders of the lease, asks the full \$75 plus back rent for the period of the \$50 payments.

Rent, heat and lighting for the lower floor, costs the chamber \$100 a month, says H. E. Cully, secretary of the chamber, whereas heat and light for the second floor, seldom used for official chamber affairs, costs but \$10 a month.

Club Department in Red
The club department, operated on the second floor, goes into the red about \$100 a month for lack of patrons. Nine outside groups use the upstairs meeting rooms regularly without charge. Heat, furnished by the chamber, averages about \$75 a month, says Mr. Cully.

Savings made by moving the office to the second floor would free funds toward retiring the bond debt and aid in raising \$2000 held needed for proposed special activities, including \$800 for advertising literature on Eugene and Lane county, a feature which has been abandoned the past several years.

Opponents to the moving proposal held that the ground floor offices are necessary to properly contact people from other places wishing information about Eugene and that the additional expense is justifiable by making the offices more easily accessible.

Holahan, veteran prison warden, jumped from the running board of his automobile as six convicts kidnaped him. He suffered a fractured skull, and may die.

An hour later a deputy sheriff telephoned the prison that he had got the drop on the fugitives and had taken all of them into custody.

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CALIFORNIAN SEES HAUPTMANN TRIAL

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 16.—(AP)—Mrs. A. B. Cohn, who helped trap 22-year-old Brooke Hart's kidnapers and killers in San Jose, Calif., in 1933, saw the Hauptmann murder trial today in terms of that kidnaping.

"I kept thinking of Brooke," said the woman who crossed the country from her home in Stockton, Calif., to attend one trial session.

"I see the whole thing in the light of that."

"Until Brooke was kidnaped I never knew what the Lindberghs had gone through."

Mrs. Cohn kept one of Hart's two kidnapes-always on the telephone wire one night until police traced the call and trapped him in a telephone booth.

The kidnapers, Thomas M. Thurmmond and J. M. Holmes, who flung Hart over the San Mateo bridge into San Francisco bay, were lynched in the San Jose courtyard.

Without coat or hat, Mrs. Cohn rushed 15 miles to the Hart home the day of the kidnaping and cared for the missing man's parents, who had been friends of her husband for forty years.

She answered all telephone calls, conversing four times with Thurmmond, each time holding him on the wire by pretending not to hear.

"For ten days," she said, "I didn't take my clothes off."

"I was glad when I heard the kidnapers had been lynched," she added, "but his parents were too ill to care."

Mrs. Cohn came to the Hauptmann trial with Thomas W. Carroll, eastern manager of a telegraph company, and Mrs. Carroll, of Montclair, N. J. She sat on a front seat and looked all day at Bruno Hauptmann's back.
