JUNCTION CITY, Jan. 16.—(Special.)—Mrs. Martha Wood, Junction City librarian, had made the following report for the year just closed: Sixty-two volumes were added by purchase; 54 by gift or exchange; total 116. The number of books on hand at the close of the year was 1,040; number of borrowers, 831; of the number, 100 cards are held by out of town people. A purchase of several of the new books has been made and will be added to the library soon.
