KEENEY OPPOSES BILL OFFERED BY POLK ASSESSOR

Ben F. Keeney, county assessor, is emphatic in his opposition to a measure to be introduced at this session of the state legislature providing for the employment of an engineer to check the descriptions of property in all deeds filed for record. The measure is being sponsored by Ed Dunn, newly-elected assessor of Polk county. Assessor Keeney, Thursday, received a letter from Dunn, enclosing a copy of the bill and asking him to write Lane county's representatives and senators to support the measure. The bill provides that an engineer with at least two years' experience in working with plats be employed in each county to daily compute the area of tracts and examine the descriptions in deeds offered for record, the object being to see if the property is properly described. Assessor Keeney wrote in reply to the letter stating that such a measure would be detrimental and expensive to the counties. It would cost from \$150 to \$200 a month, he says, whereas Lane county pays out only \$10 a month to an abstract company to check the descriptions in the deeds. The assessor says that in case the bill becomes a law the deeds would be held up at least a day and the county might be liable to damage suits. Mr. Keeney says he sees no necessity of such a law.

some. More than that, he is homesick and following in logical order he wants to go home to Grant county where he can "hear the coyotes wail and the wolves howl" at the door of his Blue Mountain Eagle weekly. He wants all this so bad he made the first real speech of the house session Wednesday morning so he could tell all the other representatives that he wanted to go home. Just to emphasize the idea, he previously had introduced a resolution calling for adjournment sine die on Jan. 26, but this resolution was killed by indefinite postponement Wednesday morning. With a flight of oratory that nearly carried him to the ceiling of the house chamber, Representative Haight expressed his sentiments and established himself as the ipso facto (what-ever that means) Will Rogers of the house. He brought considerable fun into the turmoil of getting the house in motion and incidentally brought out a potent point in regard to getting down to business, getting important legislation into the house before the last minute in order to save the state the expense of a prolonged session.

Haight served warning that demagogues in the house intended to see to it that the ways and means committee did not dump important appropriation bills into the hopper just before midnight of the closing day so that the tired legislators might pass them without too careful scrutiny in their hurry to go home. He demanded the ways and means committee get busy on such matters at once. Up popped Representative Semon, Klamath Falls, chairman of the ways and means committee, to call a meeting of that committee at 8 o'clock Wednesday night.

As if the hundreds of bills piling up on a legislator's desk were not enough, propaganda for everything from a darning machine for marking each peanut marketed in the state to voting information on the Star plebiscite eventually lands on his desk. Probably no legislator in the house has any idea of what good he will get out of the printed pamphlet he received Wednesday containing, among other things, "The address of General Charles H. Sherrill, formerly U. S. ambassador to Turkey, acclaiming President Mustafa Kemal as a great international statesman."

The final shake-up in committees places the important education committee under Grace Kent Macaruder, representative from Clatsop and Columbia counties. Mrs. Macaruder, who has a son attending Reed college, was at one time a school teacher and has been interested in educational affairs of the state for many years. She is a democrat. A resolution reached desks of the Lane house delegation Wednesday informing the state legislators "there oughta be a law" making it mandatory for every candidate for the legislature to file with the secretary of state a statement of bonds, shares, stocks or securities held by him 30 days before the primaries. The resolution was adopted by the Central grange of Lane county because past experience shows many legislators' votes are guided by such ownership of stocks, bonds, shares or securities. Legislation concerning this subject will go through the legislature and rules committee of the house, under the chairmanship of Representative Hyde.

Will James, prominent Eugene vegetable grower, visited the state capital Wednesday morning in the interest of

the agricultural marketing agreements. While in Salem Mr. James conferred with members of the Lane county delegation in senate and house and later attended sessions of the mining congress being held in Salem Wednesday.

Appointment of Mary Virginia Bryan, as stenographer for the house legislation and rules committee, was announced here Wednesday by Representative C. F. Hyde, chairman of the committee.

As chairman of this committee, Representative Hyde also had the appointment of an attorney and offered the position to L. L. Ray, prominent democrat of Eugene. Mr. Ray was unable to accept the position, however, and Mr. Hyde turned the matter over to the committee members who selected Blaine McCord, Woodburn attorney, for the position.

C. J. Fulton, Eugene clothier and painter, visited at the capital Wednesday. He was "just looking around," he said.
