Oakridge Has Deep Snow

There were two feet of snow at McKenzie bridge Thursday afternoon, according to Orel O'Brien, marker-reporter. Reports, Friday, said there were 38 inches.

The city street department had two trucks out, Friday, to aid in clearing the streets in town.

No Serious Trouble Here

Despite some minor hardships, however, all Eugene appeared to be enjoying the snow, the heaviest fall in five years here. Cars, carrying skis, sleds, and other snow recreation equipment were seen traveling all directions, late Thursday, as young and old went out to open places to enjoy the snow sports.
