

COUNTY'S SCHOOLS SHOWING BIG GAIN OVER PAST YEARS

The county had 464 persons more school age in October, 1934, than at the same time in 1933, according to the annual school census taken last October and turned to County Superintendent L. C. Tooley by a SERA worker Thursday.

The compilation of the census was done under a SERA project.

The total number of persons between the ages of 4 and 20 years in 1934 was 15,663 and the year previous was 15,199.

The number counted in 1934 was 484 boys and 7650 girls while in 1933 there were 7700 boys and 7430 girls.

The district shows a gain of 255 in the number of school children.

At the last census being 4697 in 1933 and 4442 in 1934. Most of the year's increase was in the smaller ones.

At all some of the smaller ones the increase is accounted for by the beginning of construction operations on the big state bridge over the Willamette river.

The gain there from 1933 to 1934 was 104. The district with the smallest number of persons entitled to be enumerated is No. 151, Happy Hollow, near the mouth of the Willamette.

There were five in the district. It lost two pupils, only being counted at the last census.

Paris, No. 165, a small district, having but 6 counted this year.

LEAGUE OF OREGON CITIES MEET TO BE IN SALEM JAN. 18

Representatives of cities from all parts of the state are expected to be in Salem Friday to attend a special meeting of the League of Oregon Cities, it was announced here today by Henry Kehrl, executive secretary of the league and director of the University of Oregon bureau of municipal service.

The meeting will be in charge of the legislative committee of the league, it is stated by O. R. Bean,

Portland, president, and the committee's legislative program will be submitted to members at this time.

Bills which the committee has prepared, and which will be submitted to the league membership for approval before being offered to the legislature include:

Giving authority for cities to provide for collection of city licenses by tax collector in same manner taxes are collected.

Providing that no circulator of initiative, referendum or recall petitions shall receive compensation for securing names thereon.

To amend Knox law to give cities right to superimpose licenses and to make other adjustments.

To give cities right to levy occupational taxes.

Appointing interim committee to study distribution of revenues from gas tax and auto license money.

A number of other measures are also expected to be brought up at this time. The session will be held

in the chamber of commerce at 10 o'clock in the morning.

"AMAZON" CAST IS PRAISED BY CRITIC

A university cast, held together by the talent of Mary Bennett, one of Eugene's most capable, and incidentally most comely actresses, scored a comedy hit in spite of an ineffectual play, on the opening night of "The Amazons," Thursday, at the Guild theater on the campus.

The cast was chosen with discrimination, the acting was smoothly done, the staging excellent, the one flaw being the choice of Sir Arthur Wing Pinero's outmoded farce for a vehicle.

The plot is weak, with surprisingly trivial complications. It deals with Lady Castlejordan's (played by Dor-

othy Parks) efforts to make "boys" of her three attractive daughters in the absence of a real son, and the defeat of her plan by the "boys" falling in love.

The three lovers, played by Robert Winstead, Edgar Wulzen and Dan Clark, Jr., remain well in character, as do Elenore Gullion and Helen Vebien as the other two "boys," but the finest acting, except for the splendid performance of Mary Bennett, are the character bits contributed by Richard Koken as the Sully Poacher and Horace Robinson's portrayal of the Rev. Roger Minchin. Koken's part gave a refreshing whiff of real life and actuality to the stale air of the plot.

The play was directed by Mrs. Ottilie Turnbull Seybolt and will be presented again Friday evening at 8:15.—M. R.
