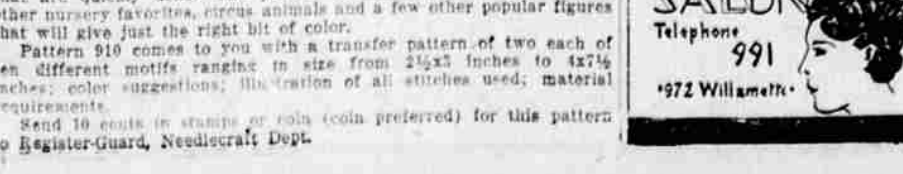

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City Federation Backing Act For Blind

A RESOLUTION, supporting the measure to aid the needy blind in Oregon to be introduced in the Oregon legislature this term, was passed at the monthly meeting of the City Federation of Women's Organizations, Friday afternoon at the Osburn hotel.

The feature of the day was a program given by blind members of the community. Mrs. Carroll Mahaffey of Horton gave readings; Miss Urdine Gatten of Springfield sang, accompanied by Mrs. Franklin Smith of Springfield; Mrs. G. A. Ebner read a paper on the blind bill written in braille; and Miss Maxine Sutton sang two songs. A talk on the bill for the blind was given by Dr. P. J. Bartle, chairman of the Lions club committee for the blind.

Mrs. Buford Roach led the community singing, accompanied by Miss Maude Denmore at the piano. Reports on projects sponsored by the Federation this year were read—the home products dinner, the radio programs being given for the benefit of the clubhouse fund, and the Junior Symphony orchestra.

Announcements were made for the members of the federation to encourage attendance at the university student body series of concerts, such as the Helfeta one held last night and the coming concerts of Hayes and Hoffman; also, for members of the federation to encourage attendance at the Junior Symphony concert on January 27.

The federation is launching a new women's chorus for those unable to get into the limited membership of the Women's Choral group formed last spring. The chorus is formed at the suggestion of Mrs. W. S. Nicholson, state federation president.

The federation is to revise its constitution to include individual memberships. Heretofore, the membership has been restricted to delegates from each affiliated group. Under the new plan, the board will be enlarged, too.
