

MUCH INTEREST IS SHOWN IN HOUSING PROJECT IN OREGON

Borrowing for modernization, for refinancing and for new construction, through avenues opened by the National Housing Act, which has shown tremendous recent increase throughout the country, will continue to grow in volume as the year advances. In the opinion of E. J. Griffith, state director for Oregon, Federal Housing Administration, favorable weather conditions, he believes, have had much to do with recent rapid spread of building activities, and the same forces, he predicts, will continue to exert a speeding influence on the Better Housing program through the summer and fall; but a bigger factor in expanding the use of insured loans, the director believes, will be better understanding of the purposes of the Better Housing program, wider knowledge of the simplicity of borrowing from institutions cooperating with the Federal Housing Administration, and more general recognition by banks and other lending institutions of the fact that there exists a market for insured mortgages, ready and waiting to absorb them in any quantity offered.

Sufficient has been accomplished during the brief time the Federal Housing Administration has been in existence, Director Griffith points out, to prove the worth of the Better Housing program as an aid to national recovery, of particular benefit to the building trades and associated industries. More than 127,000 loans have been made throughout the nation for repair and modernizing work which will put approximately \$54,000,000 in circulation in addition to the many other millions lately invested in such work by property owners who were in a position to pay in cash, the estimated cash outlay being from four to five times that of credit.

The Better Housing program is reported to have provided employment for a million workers thus far, and many of the leading industrial and mercantile companies of the country have been able to turn losses into profits as the result of stimulated building activities. When the Better Housing program gains the momentum present signs indicate it will have within another few weeks, its helpful influence will be felt in all sections of the country, Director Griffith believes, and especially benefited will be those communities which take advantage of the opportunities presented to participate in the great national drive for better housing standards. Whether one finds it necessary to borrow money to pay for needed repairs or renovating, or has the cash to meet such requirements, the Better Housing program represents an urge to do something about it immediately, so that idle money and idle workers can be brought into action against continuance of suspended building activity.

Mistakes To Be Listed

In checking traffic violations, observers will keep track of errors made in operating cars in city traffic, tabulating the different mistakes and pointing to those mistakes which are most dangerous in busy traffic.

The list of honor drivers will be continued during the remainder of the campaign and each day those who find their names published in the Register-Guard will receive passes to the Eugene theatre. In connection with the observation of cars in traffic, the following statement in regard to giving signals was released by the committee in charge of the campaign:

"One of the major causes of traffic accidents and near accidents is the failure of motorists to give a signal when turning, stopping, or changing from one traffic lane to another. A basic rule of safety is involved in the giving of proper signals. Other motorists have no other dependable means of knowing what a driver intends to do.

"The law in Oregon requires that a signal be given continuously during the last fifty feet before stopping or turning. The reason for this provision is plain, the motorist not given until the last moment either traffic may not be able to slow down or stop in time to avoid a collision.

"The law also requires that all motorists, before starting, turning, or stopping their cars, must first make sure whether they can do so in safety. If they can not do so they must wait until the way is clear.

"The manner in which signals shall be given is detailed in the Oregon motor vehicle act as follows:

"Whenever the signal is given by means of the hand and arm, the driver shall indicate his intention to turn to the left by extending his hand and arm horizontally from the side and beyond the left side of the vehicle; his intention to turn to the right by extending his hand and arm upward and beyond the left side of the vehicle; and his intention to stop or suddenly decrease speed by extending his hand and arm downward from and beyond the left side of the vehicle."

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MARKED INCREASE NOTED IN OREGON IN BUILDING FIELD

Reports, coming to Portland headquarters of the Federal Housing Administration indicate that the Better Housing Program, sponsored by the United States government under the National Housing Act, has been responsible for a marked revival of building activities throughout the country. And accompanying this revival there has come improvement in employment conditions in the building trades, some localities reporting an actual shortage of skilled workers.

One of the biggest modernizing booms "of all time" is rapidly getting under way, according to building specialists and experts close to the construction industry of the nation, the Federal Housing Administration has been informed.

Given as reason for this opinion are the following factors in present-day modernization impetus:

Easy payment, "no-money-down" features of the FHA modernization loan plan.

Approach of the year's ideal building and repair seasons.

Nation-wide spread of financial institutions as lending agencies under the modernization credit plan.

Better understanding of the real nature of the FHA plan of financing and more general appreciation of the profits open to financial institutions through the making of "character loans" for modernizing.

Rev. Mr. Higginbotham was assistant to the pastor at Berkeley before coming to Eugene. He is a native of England and has been in the United States 25 years. He studied at Manchester university, England, is a graduate of the University of California, and has studied at the University of California and at the Unitarian seminary in Berkeley and the Pacific school of religion.

Much interest is being manifested here in the visits of Dr. Elliot, Dr. Wilbur, and Dr. Steiner.

Dr. William G. Elliot Jr., is a well-known figure in Oregon, having been prominent in public life for many years. Last year he retired from the active pastorate of Church of Our Father, Portland, after a long ministry, in which he succeeded his father, Dr. Thomas Lamb Elliot, who is still living, so that both father and son are pastors emeriti of the Portland church. Dr. William G. Elliot Jr., gave the address at the dedication of the Fine Arts building of the University of Oregon at Eugene in 1926. He is a regent of Reed college.

Dr. Earl Morse Wilbur will preside over the council of ordination to be held in the afternoon Tuesday and deliver the charge to the candidate at the public service in the evening. Dr. Wilbur's book, "Our Unitarian Heritage," published in 1925 after extensive researches into the early beginnings of the movement in Europe, is the best known work on the subject. He has just returned from three years spent in Europe in search of material for another book.

For twenty-seven years he was head of the Pacific Unitarian school for the ministry at Berkeley, California. He is a Phi Delta Theta and Phi Delta Kappa and member of several historical societies.

The sermon of installation will be delivered by Rev. Richard M. Steiner, present pastor of Church of Our Father, Portland. He is graduate of Grinnell, Iowa, and the University of Michigan, also of the Chicago Theological seminary. He will speak on "Realism in Religion." He will also be the speaker at a silver tea which will be held in the Chinese room of the Osburn hotel at 2:30 o'clock, Tuesday, when he will speak on "Modern Ethical Values." Dr. Steiner is a son of the well-known sociologist, Dr. Edward A. Steiner.
