

# ROOSEVELT WAGE POLICY ATTACKED BY SENATE FOES

WASHINGTON, May 21.—(AP)—Senators Huey P. Long, D., La., and Pat McCarran, D., Nev., joined organized labor today in attacking the new wage rates established by President Roosevelt for the work relief program.

McCarran charged that the wage scale of from \$19 to \$94 a month broke faith with the agreement made when the prevailing wage fight was settled in the senate last March. Long asserted Mr. Roosevelt was breaking campaign pledges which promised a more equitable distribution of the nation's wealth.

Senators Echo Bill Green The senators echoed the sweeping attack made on the wage scale by President William Green of the American Federation of Labor and other labor leaders throughout the country. Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins was caught today in the midst of a congressional scrap affecting the whole future of the department which she heads.

It was admitted by both senate and house leaders that the fact the secretary is a "lady" for the first time in history plays some part in the battle over enlargement of the department.

Two Bills in Dispute The fight centered on two bills, the Wagner-Connelly labor disputes measure and the administration social security bill.

As passed by the senate the labor disputes bill establishes a permanent labor relations board with full control over labor issues as an independent agency. The house bill, favorably reported by the labor committee and ready for action, places the board in the labor department where Miss Perkins wants it.

Miss Perkins has admittedly aroused the ire of some administration democratic leaders. Her original proposal that the vast social security bill be considered by a special house committee disgruntled various committee chairmen. Others have charged she had a tendency to order them about.

## EVANS WILL PLAY AT DEDICATION OF SPRINGFIELD ORGAN

SPRINGFIELD, May 21.—(Special).—With John Stark Evans and George Bishop as soloists, a dedication program for the new Reuter organ recently installed at the Methodist church in Springfield is planned for Wednesday evening.

Evans, director of the Eugene Gleemen and noted as a pipe organist at the University of Oregon, will be assisted by Bishop, soloist for the Eugene Gleemen.

The new organ is a Reuter, of the same type as those now in use at the University school of music and at the Baptist church in Eugene. It was custom-built for the local church at the Lawrence, Kansas, factory, at a cost of \$2500.

The purchase of the organ was made possible through a bequest of \$1250, in the will of Mrs. Janie Cruzan. The remainder of the sum was raised by subscription. The organ will be known as the "Cruzan Memorial Organ."

It was installed by James A. Bamford, and the grill work to cover the sound openings was made by Leiland Davidson of West Springfield. The console is of gumwood, and the organ has nearly 400 pipes.

would tend, on the contrary, to increase it.

"Germany of today is immersed in the tremendous work of repairing its domestic damages. None of our projects of a factual nature will be completed before ten or 20 years. None of our tasks of an ideal nature can find its fulfillment before 50 or even 100 years.

"What else could I desire but quiet and peace?"

Says Wilson Ideals Betrayed Speaking of world affairs in general, the German leader said:

"For some time, the world has been living in a veritable mania of collective and cooperative effort—collective security, collective obligation, etc.—but what is the meaning of collective cooperation?"

"The present day idea of collective cooperation of nations is the spiritual property of the American President Wilson.

"But when, in 1919, the Peace of Versailles was dictated to the German people, a death sentence was pronounced thereby on the collective, cooperative efforts of nations, for, in place of equality of all, there was put a classic occasion according to victors and vanquished, in place of equal rights, there was differentiation between those entitled to rights and those without rights."

## Denounces Other Nations

Hitler then made a long denunciation of the Versailles treaty, stating: "Not only did other nations not disarm but, on the contrary, they completed and improved and thereby justified their armaments extraordinarily."

The speaker followed with a long, detailed analysis of the armaments of other European nations, saying: "In other words, what was done, not only ran counter to the intentions of President Wilson but also, according to the opinion of the most prominent representatives of the other side, violated the obligations of the Versailles treaty to which they had affixed their signatures."

"For this there was no excuse."

PORT ORFORD, May 21.—(AP)—Hundreds of tons of rock crashed to the foot of the cliff at Graveside point yesterday as more than five tons of powder and dynamite was touched off to formally begin the project of constructing Port Orford's new dock. The initial blast was the forerunner of a program to remove more than 70,000 tons from the historic point, to be replaced in the bay here to form a breakwater 500 feet long and 100 feet wide.

## TORNADO DEATHS

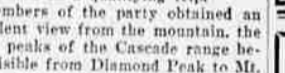

THE GREATEST MOTHER in the WORLD

MAY 21 is the 54th birthday of the American National Red Cross. Organized in 1881 under the leadership of Clara Barton this society has grown fast until today it has more than 3700 chapters throughout the United States and its possessions, with a membership of nearly 4,000,000.

The inadequacy of army medical staffs in early wars led to organization of the Red Cross workers in battle. The United States joined this agreement a year after the American Red Cross was formed.

In 1931, the United States issued a stamp commemorating the 50th anniversary of this society. It illustrated "The Greatest Mother in the World," from a Red Cross poster painted by Laurence W. Burd.
