 1 cup tart apple (finely chopped)  
 8 stuffed olives (finely chopped)  
 Crisp lettuce.  
 Method: Dissolve jello in boiling water, add vinegar, salt and cayenne, chill. When slightly thickened, add cabbage, apple and olives. Turn into individual molds, chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce leaves, garnish
