

STRAWBERRY CROP THREATENED BY RAID OF SPITTLE BUGS

The Lane county strawberry crop is seriously threatened by the increase of the spittlebug in this area, many growers reporting that the 1935 crop reduced by 50 per cent by the damage done by the pest. The pest was first reported Thursday by O. S. Fletcher, county agent.

The spittlebug attacks strawberries more than other plants, but is likewise doing heavy damage in alfalfa, many flower gardens and other tender plants, County Agent Fletcher said.

Presence of the bug is indicated by a patch of froth on the plant. Inside this froth the spittlebugs develop to the adult stage, living off the plant the meanwhile. If the bug is allowed to start its life cycle, the vitality of the plant is sapped and it may be ruined entirely.

Experiments in controlling the spittlebug have been made through the county agent's office here with the result that a commercial dust containing a rotenone derivative has been found efficient in destroying the bug, Fletcher said.

At the C. E. Shelley farm, where the strawberry crop this season has been decreased by at least 50 per cent, the dusting was started recently and was partially successful in saving the plants. At the D. J. Culbert farm plants were dusted three weeks ago when the bug was first noticed and the kill was highly satisfactory, Fletcher said.

"Results of our experiments indicate that dusting must be started immediately the bug is spotted in order to effect satisfactory control," the county agent said. He urged farmers to apply this dust as soon as they find the bug in order to aid in clearing the obnoxious pest out of the county.

This is the first year the bug has been a serious hazard to Lane crops, Fletcher said. He was unable to account for the great increase of the pest this year.

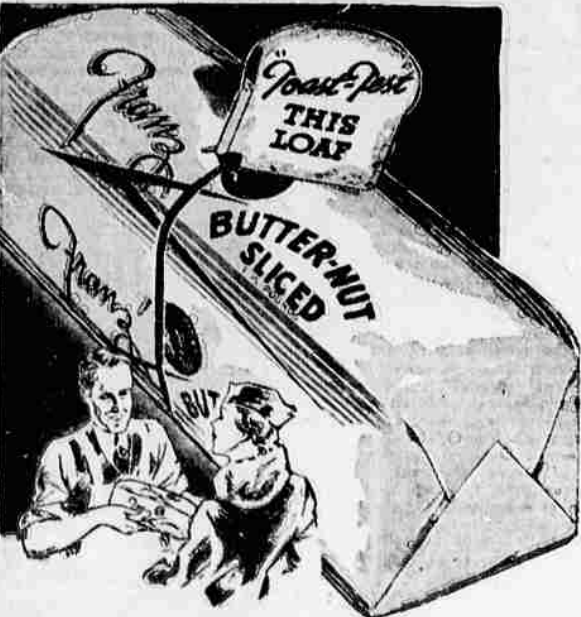
Company officials requested more time to consider these demands. Reynolds said, but the union refused to give more time and called the strike.

Work at the Fisher plant continued Thursday, it was said. Reports from other mill centers in the county indicated no labor troubles had developed as yet.

"The situation is getting beyond control."

An additional force of state police was ordered to speed to the mill to assist their fellow officers and special deputies.

A definite attempt to disperse the crowd of pickets was to be made by officials this afternoon. Some of the pickets carried firearms. The mill guards were heavily armed.

Sheriff John W. Connell had called for the national guard after it appeared the police would not be able to cope with the then rapidly growing force of pickets.

Operations at the Stimson mill were resumed Monday after a two-week shutdown because of the general lumber strike. The employees, mostly farmers, unidentified with any union, had asked to be returned, and the county and state guaranteed adequate protection. Last night the union pickets and sympathizers stormed the area, declaring the mill would not be permitted to open today. Their efforts were futile.

Harold Miller, mill manager, announced this afternoon the mill will continue to operate. He issued orders that arrangements be made for boarding and lodging the employees on mill property, to spare them the peril of passing through picket lines while going to and from the mill.

C. Y. McDonough, Portland newspaper photographer, was slugged and his camera wrecked, and Ernst Schmidt, mill worker, was dragged from his automobile and beaten. Two others were said to have been beaten in their homes.

In response to anxious queries from Oregon and Washington farmers, the northwest council of plywood and veneer workers announced today that "adequate arrangements" had been made for manufacturing all the fruit and vegetable containers needed for the harvest.

The companies with whom the council dealt were: Coast Basket and Veneer company, Portland; Williams-Bow company, Portland; O. W. Crandall company, Raymond, Wash.; Tillamook Box company, Tillamook, and the Spruce Package and Veneer company of Puyallup, Wash.

the extension when he visited the Woodmen headquarters in Denver. Following Breese's conference there, Congressman Willis Hawley visited the city, looked over the re-audit and books, and agreed to the extension, recommending it to the national headquarters. Hawley is one of the Head Managers of the lodge.

Following is a copy of the certified resolutions and order passed by the Board of Head Managers, May 15, 1935, and received from the Woodmen of the World, covering the \$20,000 issue:

"Whereas, Our association, Woodmen of the World, of Denver, Colo., is the owner and holder of \$20,000 principal amount of town of Springfield, Ore.; Improvement bonds, bearing interest at six per cent per annum payable semi-annually in May and November, dated Nov. 1, 1930, and maturing Nov. 1, 1935; and

"Whereas, said town of Springfield has represented to said Woodmen of the World that it will be impossible to pay and discharge said bonds on their maturity date, and has proposed the issuance of refunding bonds of said town on equal principal amount, grade and character of security as said bonds now owned and held by our association and to be substituted and exchanged therefore, said refunding bonds to bear interest at the rate of four and three-quarters per cent per annum payable semi-annually in May and November of each year, and

and whereas, said refunding bonds shall be dated either May 1, 1935, or Nov. 1, 1935, an ordinance of said town, dated May 1, 1935, in the event the same are dated May 1, 1935, said town of Springfield, shall, if and when the proposed exchange of bonds hereunder is effected, pay to our association \$125 in cash, difference in interest up to Nov. 1, 1935."

No Time Lost Here

Immediately after the vote, Sena-

James E. Van Zandt, commander in chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars which sponsored the Patman bill, issued a statement, which obviously had been prepared in anticipation of the senate's action. He characterized it as a "crucial blow" to the war veterans, but forecast ultimate victory at this session.

"This action," Van Zandt said, "turned into heartache the high hopes raised in thousands of needy veterans' homes by the overwhelming vote in the house to override the veto. This bitter disappointment will not be soon forgotten."

"But this setback means only one thing. The fight for full and immediate payment of the adjusted service certificates will be renewed at once with redoubled vigor."

Eleven republicans joined with 41 democrats and the lone farmer-laborite and lone progressive to over-ride the president, but his veto was sustained by 28 democrats and 12 republicans.

There were three switches from the senate's vote to pass the Patman bill two weeks ago. They were Senators Coolidge (D., Mass.); Pittman (D., Nev.); and Pope (D., Idaho), who voted today to sustain the veto but cast their votes two weeks ago to pass the bill.

In addition, newly appointed Sen-

ator Chavez (D., N.M.), and Senator Gore (D., Okla.), who was not registered on the former vote, voted to sustain the president.

Senators O'Mahoney (D., Wyo.) and Tydings (D., Md.), did not vote before but aided today with the president.
