solved. They are the Urschel and Bremer kidnappings.

The Harvey-Bailey-Machine Gun Kelly gang which engineered the abduction of Charles F. Urschel is now behind prison bars, while all but one major member of the Karpis-Barker gang which kidnapped Edward Bremer has been captured.

Alvin Karpis, No. 1, on the bureau's list of wanted public enemies, is the sole member of the Karpis-Barker gang at large. It is likely the bureau may consider Karpis as a possible ringleader in the Tacoma case.

Next to Karpis, the bureau desires most to capture Thomas H. Robinson, Jr., kidnaper of Mrs. Berry Stoll of Louisville, Robinson, however, is not regarded as the professional kidnaper that Karpis has shown himself to be.

In recent months there has been a lull in major kidnap cases, due, Hoover said, to the fact most of the notorious gangs had been broken by bullets or prison terms for their leaders.

Justice department statisticians said 89 persons had been convicted under the Lindbergh kidnaping act. Four of these were sentenced to death, 19 to life terms, and the others to a total of more than 1,200 years in prison.

BAY DISTRICT WATCHED
SAN FRANCISCO, May 25.—(AP)—Indications that the department of justice was spreading a net north of here for the kidnapers of nine-year-old George Weyerhaeuser of Tacoma were seen in activities of district headquarters here today.

Jay Newman, agent in charge, refused to discuss the case, however, and would neither deny nor confirm reports that a dozen heavily armed operatives had left for the north by airplane.

One of the reports here was that some of the agents were instructed to spread out from Eureka on the northern California coast and watch all highways for an automobile sedan bearing California license plates.

As the department of justice moved into action behind its cloak of secrecy, it was recalled here that one of the hideouts of the late George "Baby Face" Nelson and other members of the Dillinger gang was in northern California.

FAMILY IS FAMOUS
MINNEAPOLIS, May 25.—(AP)—The family of 10-year-old George Weyerhaeuser missing from his home in Tacoma, Wash., today, is closely linked with the Northwest's history of forest wealth.

The child is related to the late Frederick Weyerhaeuser, who as one of the first "lumber barons" was famous in Minnesota and Wisconsin. An immigrant from Germany, the senior Weyerhaeuser first tried his hand in Pennsylvania. His success in that venture only mediocre, he moved on to Illinois.

In that state, at Rock Island, the parent firm of the present large Weyerhaeuser Industries was founded and still operates.

The firm branched out into Minnesota and Wisconsin timberlands. Then the Weyerhaeuser hand reached into Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

"BIG LEAGUE JOB"
SEATTLE, May 25.—(AP)—"This looks like a big league job," said United States Marshal A. J. Chitty here today, on the disappearance of nine-year-old George Weyerhaeuser, of Tacoma.

"There was talk at first that it was done locally," he said, "but we've ascertained now that 'outsiders,' some 'big shot' gangsters from the east maybe, are mixed up in it."

Assistant United States District Attorney Gerald Schucklin pointed out that kidnapping is punishable by death. If a jury so directs, unless the seized person is liberated unharmed prior to the sentencing of his captors.

The elder Weyerhaeuser returned only yesterday morning from Rock Island, Ill., where he had gone with the body of his father, the late J. P. Weyerhaeuser Sr., who died here May 16. The mother of the boy was reported prostrated by grief and worry.

Moulded Fish Salad
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon mustard
2 tablespoons sugar
2 egg yolks
1 cup cream
1/4 cup vinegar
1 tablespoon gelatin
1-4 cup cold water
1 1/2 cups salmon, tuna or shrimp
1 cup celery
1 cup onion
Pimiento

Mix salt, mustard and sugar in the top part of a double boiler. Stir in the egg yolks and add cream and vinegar. Place over hot water and cook mixture to a custard, stirring constantly. Remove and add gelatin.

When cool, add salmon, tuna or shrimp and finely cut celery. Turn into mold. If a fish mold is used, place stuffed olives and strips of pimiento in the mold for the eye, mouth, fins, etc. and then pour the mixture carefully over them. One may also use individual molds.

Serves 8 to 10, depending on the size of molds.—Mrs. Frank N. Rhodes, Rte. No. 3, Eugene.

King Crab—Apple Surprise

Core eight large apples and place in baking dish. Cover bottom of dish with boiling water. Bake apples without sugar in hot oven (400 degrees F.) until soft, but firm. Remove from oven. Chill. Flake 1 can crab meat and mix with chopped maraschino cherries. Fill apple centers.

Serve on lettuce leaves with French dressing. For eight people—and how they will like it.—Mrs. F. R. Armstrong, 1392 West 11th Ave., Eugene.

Dutch Potato Salad

2 cups diced cooked potatoes
2 slices bacon
1-4 cup vinegar
1/2 cup onion, diced
1 teaspoon salt
1-4 teaspoon white pepper

Cut the bacon into squares. Fry. Pour half the fat over the diced potatoes. Brown the diced onion in the fat, add the vinegar, salt and pepper, and when hot add potatoes. Heat thoroughly and serve with wieners or cold boiled ham.—Mrs. M. C. Hack, 559 East 16th, Eugene.

Fish Tomato

Cook 1 large can tomatoes (or 1 can tomato soup) with small onion, 2 bay leaves, 1 teaspoon salt, sauce to make hot and spicy. 1-4 cup vinegar, cook until strained you have 2 cups. Dissolve 1 package lemon jello in hot tomato sauce, use soup water to make needed 2 cups.

Add 1 can shrimp shredded or crab or salmon to taste, when jello starts to congeal. Very good molded and served on lettuce.—Mrs. E. A. Staley, 2156 Harris, Eugene.

U. Moore. Student speakers will be Don Childers, who will talk on the history of American high schools; Arthur Murphy, who will outline the history of the University high school; and Edgar Wilson, who will discuss the high school of the future.

Music numbers will be given by the school orchestra with a violin solo by Jane Jelin accompanied on the harp by Brandon Young. Bill Sutherland and Doris Wulzen will sing a duet and Margaret Ellen Hill will play the professional.
