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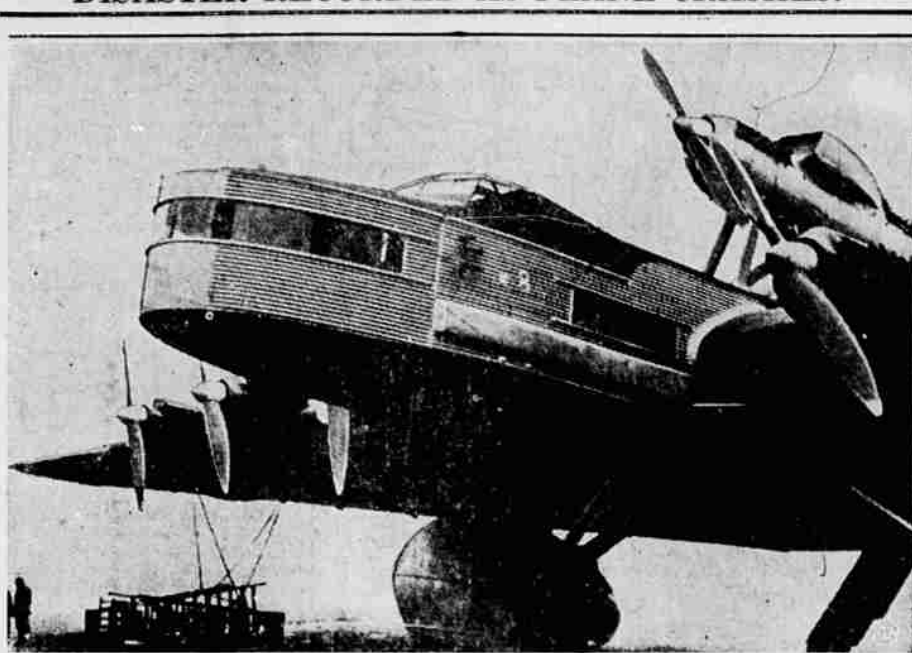
tuna fish which has been shredded and the diced celery. Combine with a fork and chill well. When ready to serve add three-fourth cupful of mayonnaise. Arrange on individual beds of crisp lettuce and garnish with the remaining mayonnaise. Seed the green peppers. Slice in rings and arrange over the salad. Serves six.—Mrs. George Everingham, 1042 Polk street, Eugene.

Salmon Salad with Asparagus Tips—Flake cold boiled salmon, or any other kind of fish. Season with salt and pepper. Sprinkle with lemon juice and mix with a thick mayonnaise. Mold on a bed of crisp lettuce leaves, garnish with capers, pitted olives and chopped parsley, and surrounded with asparagus tips marinated in French dressing.—Grace Mead, 321 B St., Springfield.

Molded Chicken Salad—2 1/2 cups cold cooked chicken, 1/4 cup diced celery, 1/4 cup chopped green pepper, 2 cups chicken stock, 2 tablespoons gelatin, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup whipping cream.

Mix chicken, celery, and pepper. Soften the gelatin in the cold stock and dissolve by bringing to the boiling point. Add to the first mixture and let stand until it begins to thicken. Fold in the mayonnaise and cream which has been whipped until stiff. Turn into a mold and let stand until firm. Unmold onto a bed of lettuce leaves. Fill the center with mayonnaise to which an equal quantity of whipped cream has been added. Recipe makes eight servings.—Mrs. W. J. Green, 831 West 11th avenue, Eugene.

DISASTER RECORDED AS PLANE CRASHES!

GERMAN DEMANDS
HOISTED A NOTCH

LONDON, May 27.—(AP)—A Nazi demand for recognition of Germany's right to hold colonies was revealed here today as Britain and Germany launched diplomatic exchanges calculated to give substance to peace suggestions Adolf Hitler made in his Reichstag speech Tuesday.

the German foreign minister, told Ambassador Sir Eric Phillips that while Germany does not want colonies or mandates just now, she insists that the former allies recognize in some tangible way her right to have them before the Reich returns to the League of Nations.

Germany also notified Britain that she could not stop to discuss armaments until she had attained full military equality with Russia.
