

CITY CLEANUP WEEK NOW IN FULL SWING

Hundreds of citizens of Eugene have already begun to clean up their back yards and the alleys in the rear of their homes in observance of cleanup week being sponsored by the Eugene Garden club, according to B. F. Keener, president of the club. The offer of one garbage hauling firm to haul away from each home two sacks of rubbish free of charge caused a rush of orders Tuesday, it was learned. This firm, Shanks Brothers, is making this offer with the understanding that a small charge is to be made for hauling all over two sacks.

Mayor Large and the city council are leading every effort to make the cleanup week successful. The city's street department is doing extra street cleaning and the city dump wagons are hauling away a lot of trash scraped up from the street gutters.

In line with the campaign to make the city more beautiful, many home owners are having the exterior of their houses repainted, paint dealers reporting a bigger business in house paint this spring than for several years past.

There is still a great deal of room for improvement in the way of cleaning up streets and alleys and back yards, Mr. Keener says, and he is urging every resident, whether a home owner or a renter, to co-operate in the movement to the fullest extent.

LITTLE PROGRESS NOTED IN STRIKE

No progress in the settlement of Lane county's lumber strike difficulties was noted Tuesday, despite the decision of the northwest council of Sawmill and Timber Workers' union to accept a 50 cent minimum wage scale and 40 hour maximum work week.

Strikers at the Western Lumber company in Westfir met Monday night but Lawrence Reynolds, head of the union there, could not be reached for a statement on what was accomplished. The lumber company had offered the 50 cent minimum and 40 hour maximum in a proposition made Monday morning.

Earl Downing, manager of the Western firm, stated that the woods crew was still on strike, but that a few of the mill strikers were returning.

No developments were noted at Marcola, where the workers held a closed meeting Monday night. It was believed that routine matters were discussed, and the Fischer mills, scene of an earlier strike, reported no difficulties.

proved the act, and it was passed by the senate after a bitter fight. The bill then went to the governor. It was learned, however, he did not desire the act and at the same time did not wish to place his veto on it. Through administrative maneuvers the senate recalled the measure from the governor and laid it on the table. Several attempts by proponents to take it off the table and re-pass it failed, however, and the bill was still on the desk when the legislature adjourned.

Martin Agrees

Commenting upon the NRA opinion Governor Martin said he believed the court had handed down a proper decree. Further, he said, he failed to see the constitutionality of the Frazier-Lemke act and did not vote for the measure when he was a member of congress.

The attorney general refused to be quoted on his reaction to the opinion, but a prominent attorney in the office declared the principle of the

constitution that the country was "governed by laws, not men," had again been sustained.

Agricultural Director White said there were 11 codes in Oregon now in effect. The strawberry code was voted down this month, while the walnut growers in the state operated under federal AAA and not under the state law, he informed. The 11 effective codes are restaurant, ice cream, bakery, prune, bulb, nursery, melon and tomato, black raspberry, red raspberry, cauliflower and butter.

Governor Appoints New Parole Officer

SALEM, Ore., May 28.—(AP)—Edward M. Duffy, Portland, assistant chief clerk of the house of representatives in the recent legislative session, today was appointed by Governor Martin as state parole officer, succeeding Dan Kellaher, resigned. legislation as the AAA amendments, social security, the banking and utility holding company bills was deferred for examination in the light of yesterday's ruling.

30-Hour Bill Hit?

In the senate, Senator Robinson, democratic leader, contended congress could no longer regulate hours and wages in intra-state commerce. He was challenged at once by Senator Black (D., Ala.), who insisted his 30-hour week bill was "untouched" by the court decision.

In New York, President Harper

Sibley of the chamber of commerce of the United States appealed for business to uphold the wage and hour agreements of the voided codes. Asked whether the decision meant the recovery administration would fall up entirely, Donald Rickberg said: "We'll go on at least until June 30. What we will do from then on depends on what action is taken by congress."
