

DUCKS KICK BALL, BUT WIN OSC TILT 15 TO 6 FRIDAY

CORVALLIS, June 1.—(Special).

—And there was Minnie, kicking the ball around! So goes the popular song, and so went Friday's "crucial" baseball game at Corvallis, between Oregon and Oregon State, and won by the locals, 15 to 6. Both clubs spent a major part of the afternoon "kick" in the ball around.

Oregon's Don McFadden, ace pitcher, had a bad afternoon and allowed 14 hits, which were combined with seven Oregon errors. However, three of the errors came on one play, which accounts for the comparatively few runs the Beavers amassed.

Ducks Hit 17

While McFadden was showing his poorest form of the season, the Ducks were releasing murder from their bats, with Boyd "Lefty" Rasmussen as the principal victim. The Ducks got 17 legitimate hits off the deliveries of Rasmussen, and off Kolkowski, who replaced him in the eighth, along with four blows which were argued, some authorities rating them hits and others errors by the Beaver fielders.

The win clinches a tie for northern division honors for the Ducks, and should they win the Saturday game the title will be all theirs. A clean sweep for Washington, on the other hand, would result in the tie, if Oregon lost Saturday. The Huskies defeated Washington State at Pullman Friday, 11 to 6.

Oregon State started strong, getting a run off McFadden in the first inning and another in the second to take a two run lead. In the first of the third, however, the Webfoots demonstrated the lethal quality of their bats, and rattled six hits off Rasmussen for six runs, three of them chased home by Joe Gordon's homer.

Again in the fourth the Ducks went wild to score four more runs and make it 10 to 2. The fifth saw Oregon chase another pair across, but the Staters matched it, and the count was 12 to 4.

Oregon was scoreless until the eighth. Hurney walked, McCall was hit by a pitched ball, and Vail sacrificed. McFadden boosted a long home run to score the last of the Webfoot muckers, just before Bruno Kolkowski took over the Oregon State mound duties.

The remainder of the tilt was scoreless. Oregon managed to pile up the amazing total of 7 errors, while the Staters did likewise. Don McFadden, however, tightened in the pinches, while Rasmussen was weakest with men on base. The teams were to play again Saturday at Eugene.

GIANTS LENGTHEN LEAD IN NATIONAL

NEW YORK, June 1.—(AP)—The New York Giants today held a margin of 5½ games in the National league race, greatest edge gained by any club in this campaign.

While other clubs idled yesterday afternoon, the Giants moved on against the luckless Boston Braves and won their third and fourth games in two days by taking a doubleheader, 15 to 3 and 4 to 2.

The Reds played the second game the majors have seen under lights last night and lost to the Pirates, 4 to 1.

The only other games were played in the American league, with the White Sox taking it on the chin against the Indians to increase further the lead of the idle Yankees. Clint Brown and Mel Harder held the Sox to six hits and won from Vernon Kennedy by 6 to 2.

The Detroit Tigers came from behind a 5 to 1 deficit in the last half of the ninth with a five-run rally that beat the Browns, 6 to 5.

only twice before—in the kidnapping of Edward G. Bremer and Charles F. Urschel.

The boy was released about five miles from Ilesquah, 25 miles northwest of here, and made his way as dawn broke to the farm home of John Bonomi.

Bonomi bundled the lad into an automobile and rushed him toward Tacoma, Enroute, he stopped at a gasoline service station and telephoned the family but could raise no one.

Farmer Finds Him
Then he called Tacoma police, who first revealed that the boy had been found.

Bonomi said the boy was unharmed and cheerful when he trudged into the farm home about 4 a. m.

Sources close to the Washington state patrol revealed a 1934 (Pontiac) sedan was being sought as the kidnaper. The patrol, notified all its widespread officers to be on the lookout, and halt the car.

George's reference to his kidnappers' names as "Harry, Bill and Alvin" recalled that "Harry" Campbell is the name of another widely sought gangster lieutenant of Karpis.

Numerous Tacoma residents in the past few days have identified pictures of Volney Davis, Karpis lieutenant, as resembling a man seen here last weekend. The identification gave rise to widespread belief that the Karpis gang was involved in the kidnapping. Authorities generally, and federal officers in particular, would not say whether they were interested in these reports.

As Bonomi started for Tacoma in his derelict automobile, he was met outside the city limits by John Dreher, Seattle newspaperman. But a few moments after the boy had been returned to his home by Dreher, justice department agents flocked in and started questioning young George.

Headquarters of the justice agents in a downtown office building said no report had been made by the questioners.

in your annual reports during the years you audited Springfield, that you ever set up the delinquent taxes either as an asset or a liability. I make this statement as an asset or a liability due to the fact that for years you have carried the Springfield capital account as an asset. I find no auditor who understands just how a capital account, whether overdrawn or not, could ever place a capital account in the column of assets. Probably a slight error on your part for years. Breese score one; Horton, goose egg.

You also made considerable comment about warrant No. 13496. The amount of this warrant is not the question. The fact still remains that the warrant, together with two other warrants as listed on page 27 of the audit, was not registered on the treasurer's records, but has been paid. For years, why did you allow Recorder Peterson to get by without accounting for all the receipts in the book of original entries? Why did you allow Mr. Peterson and the council of Springfield to acquire, dispose and handle some real estate and not run these transactions over their general books? I ask you why, since the \$1485.23 worth of city property that was inflated or written up to \$11,300, on Sept. 30, 1928, and referred to in my audit and on page 25 of the Journal book of the town of Springfield; now just why was there no further transactions entered in this real estate account that the city acquired or disposed of since that time.

You are dependent on your work for a livelihood and I will adequately warn you at this time that the audit I make will be defended at all costs. If it is necessary to use the columns of the press to answer more of your foolish remarks that have no foundation and that are just built up to entertain you while you whistle through the grave yards, I assure you that on my next episode I will be able to write plenty for an overnight cruise on the Chesapeake bay without giving any further indication of his views on the future of the recovery act.

is the subject of inquiry addressed to me by a member of the committee since that time. In response to such inquiry, I had information compiled as to past and present practice of leading institutions regarding the degree of doctor of science. As shown in the information supplied the committee member, it has been and is the practice to use this as an honorary degree at leading institutions such as Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Columbia, University of Illinois, Wisconsin university, and others. Only one instance was found where this degree is used otherwise. I informed the committee that my degree was given and received as an honorary degree, and that it has never been represented or thought of as other than an honorary degree.

The matter of my retirement from the chancellorship has been in the hands of the board for more than a year, and is doubtless better understood by its members and the people of Oregon than it appears to be by the members of the committee from Washington and California. There was no agreement, so far as I was concerned, as to exactly when such retirement would take place, as there could be none. As mentioned previously in this statement, I announced when appointed that I had no thought of remaining in the office indefinitely. I repeated the fact when, more than a year ago, I announced my desire to retire, and I have assisted the board since then in every way possible in seeking a successor. My responsibilities are to the board of higher education, to all of the institutions in the state system, and to the people of the entire state. It should be easily apparent that it is the customary procedure of the A. A. U. P. to supply advance proof copies of impending reports to principals concerned. I have not been supplied with such a copy either by the committee or by the national body, though I note in the press that miscellaneous copies have been circulated by the association chapter at Eugene.

He observed that the report was "filled largely with the repetition of old charges against the chancellor, unsupported by evidence or accompanied by findings of fact."

Dr. Kerr said he had no thought of continuing permanently in office when he took over reorganization work in 1932, and that the matter of his term was at discretion of the board of higher education.
