Chocolate Mousse

1 square chocolate

1 cup sugar

Pinch salt

1 cup milk

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 teaspoon gelatin

1 tablespoon cold water

1½ cups whipped cream

Melt chocolate over hot water.

Beat sugar, salt and milk over direct heat. Add this mixture to melted chocolate and stir continuously until mixture boils. While hot, add gelatin that has been mixed with cold water. Strain and cool. Add vanilla, then fold in whipped cream. Freeze. Use pastry tube and garnish with whipped cream and chopped nuts. 8 servings.

Chocolate Ice Cream

2 eggs

2 cups rich milk

¼ cup sugar

1 tablespoon vanilla

¼ teaspoon salt

1 cup heavy whipping cream

2 squares melted chocolate

Separate the eggs and make a soft custard of the milk, egg yolks and sugar. Add the melted chocolate. Beat the egg whites stiff and pour over them the hot custard. Add the vanilla and salt and when cold, the whipped cream. Freeze, stirring at 30 minute intervals until the mixture has been stirred three times.—Mrs. M. Johnson, 591 West Broadway, Eugene.

Orange and Lemon Sherbet

1 pkg. lemon jello ice cream powder

Grated rind of 2 oranges

2 c. sugar

5 c. boiling water

1 c. lemon juice

Combine jello ice cream powder, orange rind, and sugar. Add boiling water gradually, stirring constantly until mixture is smooth. Add orange and lemon juice. Strain into pan of electric refrigerator, stirring occasionally until frozen. Makes 1½ quarts sherbet.—Grace Mead, 321 B St., Springfield.

Night Riders Nail Carolina Man to Cross, Choke Him

HIGH POINT, N. C., June 1.—(AP)—R. J. Riggs, 35, was found here today nailed to a cross, a wire tightened about his neck, near his automobile service station. In a critical condition from nail wounds in the hands and feet, and suffering from extreme shock, he was taken to a hospital, where physicians said he may recover.

Riggs, conscious when found by patrolling policemen, said a band of men came into his bedroom after midnight, threw a quilt around his head and drove him to the crucifixion scene.

There, he said, his feet and hands were nailed to an improvised cross.

INDIA QUAKE TOLL PLACED AT 30,000

QUETTA, India, June 1.—(AP)—The number of dead in this earthquake-stricken area was unofficially estimated at 30,000 today as relief work went forward under martial law, proclaimed to facilitate rescue of the injured and burial of the victims.

The bodies of those who died in the catastrophe were burned or buried as soon as they were recovered to avoid the risk of an outbreak of disease. One of the disaster's most tragic incidents was the razing of the general hospital, killing 200 to 300 patients.

Floods outside the city added to the horror within. Water gushing from fissures caused by the quake in some places flooded to a depth of several feet.

HUNTER IS SLATED TO ANSWER MONDAY

PORTLAND, Ore., June 1.—(AP)—The Journal said today that Dr. Frederick Maurice Hunter, chancellor of University of Denver, is expected to give a definite answer Monday as to whether he is interested in becoming chancellor of Oregon's higher educational system.

Dr. Hunter came here last week-end at the invitation of the state board of higher education to determine whether he would care to accept the chancellorship.

The Journal said the Denver educator has wired for copies of the laws on education and copies of the by-laws of the state board and these have been forwarded to him.

Dr. W. J. Kerr, former president of Oregon State college, resigned as chancellor two years ago but the board asked him to continue in the office until his successor had been named.

WALNUT GROWERS JOIN PROTEST TO CODE OPERATION

Senator Charles McNary in which the latter stated: "I think you know I am in sympathy with everything you say, and when the growers visited me at my farm home a year ago, I advised them against becoming a part of the code and gave them the same advice when they called upon me last fall during the harvesting of my own walnut crop. I am going to send your letter and other supporting letters to the AAA and I intend again to discuss the matter personally with the general crops section of the AAA."

It was explained by Mr. Strong that the state group through this series of meetings is doing nothing with the means of marketing, the central committee being non-partisan in marketing affiliations. It was pointed out that several members of the central committee are directors of one or more cooperatives.

Mr. Strong presented his talk with considerable statistical data which he has gathered in his work in studying the code. He has spent the better part of the year studying the situation and was one of the group seeking amendments to the code last fall. "If the present artificial price hoisting of the walnut control board continues, next year 40 per cent instead of 30 percent will be surplus control. As more and more acreage bears, it is likely to reach 50 per cent," Mr. Strong declared, pointing out the protest northwest growers are making that 30 per cent of the Oregon crop is contributing to take care of the surplus of inferior walnuts grown elsewhere.

The resolution contained in the open letter signed by many at the Saturday meeting states:

"We believe that a vast majority of the growers in this state are agreed that there is no surplus of Oregon walnuts, and that the small tonnage produced here can readily be sold in the domestic market without resorting to dumping in foreign countries or to shelling or even price-cutting. . . . We believe that if it were necessary to reduce the general crop average of prices in the U. S. A. to sell the entire nut crop each year that the loss to the growers would certainly be no greater and probably less than under the present system, whereby 30 per cent is withheld for dumping or shelling with resulting returns to growers at a ridiculously low level for this fraction of the crop."

Several of the local growers attending were called upon for opinion. Many expressed their favor of the move against the present code set-up. Fred E. Chambers expressed the belief that if a code were obtained for Oregon and Washington alone, it would be better, otherwise the present code set-up is a waste of time.

Dr. John Altmach, Palo Alto, who recently bought an orchard here, said although he is a Californian that he was against some of the code practices. L. J. Whitaker, Rex, spoke of the efforts last fall to obtain amendments for the code, while W. H. Bentley, Portland, former salesmanager of the North Pacific Nut Growers association, discussed the original set-up of the code.

The meeting here was one of a series planned up and down the western part of the state.

TWO DIE AS HOUSE AT WESTFIR BURNS

Two persons are dead and one sustained severe burns as a result of the burning of the residence occupied by Dr. J. A. Benson and family at Westfir at an early hour Saturday morning.

The dead are Mrs. Benson, who died at the Pacific hospital about 10:45 o'clock, six hours after the fire, and her two-year-old son, Joseph Allen Benson, Jr., who was suffocated before he was taken from the burning house. Dr. Benson was severely burned about the face and arms and is at the hospital but he is expected to recover.

Deputy Coroner Harold Poole and District Attorney W. H. Brooke were at Westfir a greater portion of Saturday forenoon and part of the afternoon investigating the fire and it is probable and inquest will be held although no definite information was elicited from the coroner's office. It was reported by the lumber company officials at Westfir that there were no suspicions of incendiarism.

SALEM, Ore., June 1.—(AP)—All 12 Corinthian columns that lent a majestic air to the old state capitol building lay in ruins today. Broken chunks of brick and mortar were strewn over the State house steps and grounds as the columns fell with a crash at the tug of powerful trucks and cables. The walls will be tackled next, F. G. Leary, in charge of wrecking, said.
