

GRADUATION AT U.-O. OUTLINED FOR JUNE 14-17

Commencement exercises for the 58th graduating class of the University of Oregon will be held June 14, 15, 16, 17 with Oswald Garrison Villard, noted liberal editor and son of one of the university's early benefactors scheduled to deliver the address to the graduates.

Degrees will be granted to approximately 500, it was announced here today by C. L. Constance, assistant registrar. There will include more than 400 bachelor or arts or sciences, approximately 50 graduate degrees of master of arts or sciences, and about 50 doctor of medicine degrees for graduates of the university medical school in Portland. A number of certificates and other awards will also be announced at the commencement exercises.

The commencement functions will begin this year on Friday afternoon, June 14 when a silver tea, to raise funds for the Pauline Potter Homer collection of fine books, will be held in Alumni hall. In the evening the annual Fallingbeekman oratorical contest, for which prizes of \$150 and \$100 are offered, will be held in the music school auditorium.

Saturday will be a busy day for the graduates. In the morning the alumnae hold their annual breakfast and meeting. At 10:30 the semi-annual alumni meeting, with Merle H. Cressman of Astoria, state president, will be held in Guild hall. At noon the graduates will be guests for the annual campus luncheon, to be held in John Strub memorial hall.

During the luncheon five former classes, those of 1885, 1905, 1910, 1915, and 1925, will hold reunions. Edwin Meserve, president of the senior class, will be speaker.

During Saturday afternoon Chancellor W. J. Kerr and Dr. C. V. Boyer, university president, will hold a reception for seniors and alumni in Alumni hall. The five reunion classes will hold dinners at various places following the reception.

The annual flower and fern procession, one of the most picturesque and beautiful ceremonies of the year, will be held at the base of the Pioneer Mother statue at 7:30. Alumnae and seniors in cap and gown will march to the base of the memorial, and form a circle of floral offerings. Following this the twilight concert, with music by the university choruses, will be held on this spot.

Rev. R. C. Brooks, head of the department of religion at Pomona college, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon Sunday at 11 o'clock in McArthur court. He will speak in "The Challenge of the Present World Situation."

"Youth and the Republic" has been chosen by Mr. Villard as his topic for the commencement address, to be given at 11 o'clock Monday in McArthur court. Selection of Mr. Villard as speaker this year is regarded as particularly fitting, since it was just 50 years ago that the cornerstone of Villard hall, made possible by the gift of his father, Henry Villard, was laid.

Starting with June 10, it is expected 1,000,000 feet of lumber will be sent through Florence each month, Inman declared.

The Florence outfit was in charge of a committee consisting of J. C. Ponder, Mrs. George L. Basford, Lee Griner, Mrs. Ada Cox, Mrs. J. C. Ponder, Mrs. Hans Petersen, Earl Hill, Overton Dowd, Jr., and E. R. Hoyt, band leader. and taking care of stray and vicious dogs.

Fees Would Cover Costs

"If a municipality applied to the county dog control board for such an officer, the board must deputize a man empowered to look after dogs within the corporate limits of the city," Mayor Large pointed out. "His salary could be taken from the city's share of the license fees collected which is 50 per cent."

The council will discuss the feasibility of having a full-time officer, a part time man or any other method of getting a man to look after city dogs, Mayor Large said.

McCormack Relates History

The history of the dog regulation laws of the state was outlined here Monday by Senator E. A. McCormack, who, as a member of the lower house, handled this legislation.

Prior to the 1920 session, all dog control was in the hands of municipalities, but as many cities did nothing about it, farmers complained that they received no protection against stock-killing animals, Senator McCormack explained. Dogs in cities roamed over a considerable area and farmers adjacent to municipalities suffered heavy losses as a result of depredations of roaming dogs.
