ator ice cream recipe I have found. It does not grain in freezing.  
2 eggs beaten separately.  
1 cup cream (whipping).  
1 cup sugar.  
1 1/2 cup cocoa (can be omitted for plain ice cream).  
1 1/2 tsp vanilla.  
Beat cream till stiff, add sugar and cocoa; beat slightly, and stiffly beaten whites, vanilla and lastly the well beaten yolks. Place in pan and freeze.

## Frozen Pudding

1 1/2 c. orange juice.  
1 c. lemon juice.  
Sugar.  
2 cups heavy cream.  
1/2 c. powdered sugar.  
1 1/2 tsp vanilla.  
1/2 c. broken walnut meats.  
Sweeten the orange and lemon juice to taste, being sure that the sugar is dissolved. Beat the cream until quite thick, add the powdered sugar, vanilla and prepared fruit juices to it. Stir in the nuts. Pour into refrigerator tray and freeze about two hours.

## Lemon Cream Sherbet

1 pint milk.  
1 cup sugar.  
Grated rind of 1 lemon.  
1 1/2 pint cream.  
Juice of two lemons.  
2 egg whites.  
2 tablespoons sugar.  
Add sugar to milk and allow to dissolve. When thoroughly dissolved add lemon rind and juice. Stir while adding lemon juice. Turn into freezer tray 45 minutes to 1 hour. Beat egg whites, adding the two tablespoons sugar. Whip the cream to a thick custard consistency. Combine with the beaten egg whites. Add frozen mixture and mix lightly. Return to freezing unit and freeze 2 to 2 1/2 hours. (requires no stirring). Serve garnished with a sprig of mint. This is delicious to serve at an afternoon or evening party.—Mrs. Henry Barell, Route No. 2, Box 88-A, Eugene.
