RELIC OF PRIDE and POWER



ARCHEOLOGISTS and other students of ancient lore know the island of Cyprus in the Mediterranean for the wealth of relics of bygone eras that have been dug up there. Just a small token of the past is shown on one of the stamps Cyprus issued in 1928, commemorating the fiftieth anniversary of its existence as a British colony. It is the ½ piastre showing a silver coin dug from the ruins of the once proud and powerful city of Amathus. Today, only fragments of a wall and a great stone cistern mark the spot where this city stood, about five to 10 centuries before Christ.

Rancher Strangles Bride, Kills Self

MODESTO, Cal., June 6.—(AP)—After strangling his bride of six months with a window curtain, S. C. Cinto, 43-year-old rancher, hanged himself with a cord from the curtain in their home here, Coroner George Severn reported today.

The bodies were discovered by the parents of the 24-year-old wife, Mr. and Mrs. M. Alves, who called at the home to inquire why their daughter had not communicated with them. Coroner Severn said the couple had apparently been dead for 24 hours or more before the tragedy was discovered.
