Constitution Flexible But Can't Be Stretched Too Far, His View

FORUM HEARS VIEWS

Roosevelt Wise in Taking Reversal Gracefully, Dean Opines

Advocating the conception of the American constitution as "a living document, capable of interpretation in the light of existing social conditions," but pointing out that legislation started to cover "emergencies" was in conformity with the basic principles of the constitution, Dean Wayne L. Morse, head of the university law school recognized as an authority on constitutional law, commented the re-modeling of the NRA decision of the supreme court is a timely warning that the constitution can be stretched too far.

One of the largest crowds in the history of chamber forum luncheons gathered out to hear Dean Morse pay tribute to the president for "accepting the decision, indicating that democratic party leaders desired to maintain a constitutional form of government in America."

Nothing Stated, His View "We do not have a static constitution," the speaker said. "Concepts of rights in our constitution are as due process of law, interstate commerce and obligation of contracts are subject to varying interpretations, the concepts changing from case to case."

In discussing the famous decision in the poultry case recently, Dean Morse declared there were two important questions on constitutional law involved, delegation of powers and interstate commerce. In their unanimous decision, the supreme court held that emergency acts must conform with the constitution, but agreed that the court should take into consideration the conditions under which the acts were passed. It emphasized the point that congress must not delegate its legislative powers to an administrative agency.

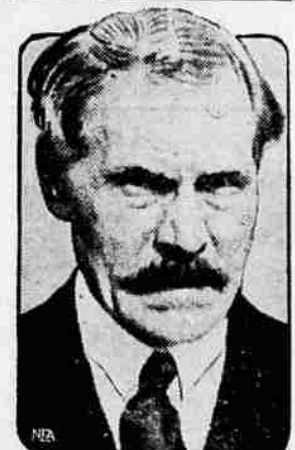

LAVAL IS VIRTUAL FRENCH DICTATOR

PARIS, June 7. (AP)—Pierre Laval, veteran foreign minister of France, established a new government tonight with emergency powers to save the franc and avert a financial crisis. Laval and his new government, a wide combination of parties, was solidified by power when the Chamber of deputies gave him a vote of confidence. A grave political crisis which has lasted more than a week was thus solved. Laval succeeded where others failed, and has a virtual dictatorship for the next five months, without interference from parliament. At the end of that period, he will submit his decrees to parliament for ratification and account for his stewardship.

Schwering Summer Home On McKenzie Destroyed By Fire

The residence at the summer home of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Schwering at the Belknap bridge on the upper McKenzie river was destroyed by fire Friday morning. The blaze was discovered on the roof by Mr. and Mrs. Lou Quimby, who were occupying the house temporarily, as they were eating breakfast. The alarm was spread and the neighbors and the entire crew of the Belknap sawmill nearby responded. Most of the furniture and some of the doors and windows in the building were saved as the fire was slow in spreading from the roof to the lower part. There was no insurance.

This was one of the older summer homes on the river, having been built many years ago by Mrs. Nettie Kress Pennington, who sold it to Mr. and Mrs. Schwering. It was located on the south side of the river close to the bridge. Mr. and Mrs. Schwering were at their home in Eugene at the time of the fire and Mr. Schwering is unable to go up the river to look after affairs on the property on account of illness.

BALDWIN GETS POST VACATED BY M'DONALD

Conservatives Dominate in New "Coalition" After Leaders Change

LABOR REPRESENTED

Shift Acknowledges Power Long Exerted By Tory Group

LONDON, June 7. (AP)—Stanley Baldwin, staunch conservative and leader of the Tory party, succeeded James Ramsay MacDonald, former labor chief, today as prime minister of Great Britain. The change of leadership was simple and efficient, MacDonald, in morning coat and top hat, visited Buckingham palace and drank tea with the king while he submitted his resignation. He stayed slightly more than an hour.

Decided Over Dish o' Tea The king accepted the resignation and, on MacDonald's suggestion, called in Baldwin and offered him the premiership. Baldwin stayed with the king only 17 minutes, hurried to Downing street, the governmental center, and quickly formed his cabinet.

The new government of 22 members is overwhelmingly conservative, but includes MacDonald as Lord President of the Council, two other national laborites and four liberals. Sir John Simon, liberal, was shifted from the foreign office to the home affairs post and his young but famous aide, Anthony Eden, was given a newly created post to handle league of nations affairs, indicating he would continue his important role in international affairs under Sir Samuel Hoare, conservative, the new foreign secretary.

Appointments Given Out An official announcement of the Baldwin cabinet included: Prime minister—Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the Council—J. Ramsay MacDonald, national labor. Home affairs—Sir John Simon, liberal.

Foreign secretary—Sir Samuel Hoare, conservative. Air secretary—Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, conservative. War secretary—Viscount Halifax, conservative. Lord chancellor—Lord Halsbury, conservative. Chancellor of exchequer—Neville Chamberlain, conservative.

SECOND QUARTER OF TAXES DUE JUNE 15

Tax payments at the sheriff's office are brisk, according to Alex McKinney, chief tax deputy in the office, and while the amount collected in the second quarter of 1935 will not be as large as that in the first quarter, collections are very satisfactory, the deputy said Friday. The second quarter payments will become delinquent after June 15 and if they are not paid by that date the law provides that a penalty of two-thirds of one per cent be collected. If neither quarter payment is made by that time there is a penalty of two and two-thirds per cent.

Many of the large corporations and quite a number of individual property owners take advantage of the three per cent rebate by paying the entire year's tax in the first quarter but a large majority of the Lane county taxpayers pay quarterly.

Ball-Pin Machine Licenses Now Due

Applications for licenses for pin and ball machines are now being taken at the city recorder's office, Calvin M. Bryan, recorder, announced Friday. All applications are desired by June 15 in order to expedite action on them, Bryan said. Applications must go to the city council for final approval. Distributors must pay an annual license of \$1 per month for each machine with a minimum of \$10 a year. In addition they pay \$1 per month per machine as an operator's license. Proprietors who own their own machines pay \$1 per month per machine as an owners' license and \$1 per month per machine as an operators' license.

F. D. TAX PLAN INSPIRES NEW BONUS DRIVE

Veteran Spokesman Elated At Prospect of Tie With New Scheme

"RIDER" IS PLANNED

Present Session May Bring Strenuous Effort to Get Compensation

By W. H. MYLANDER (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, June 7. (AP)—Bonus lenders today forecast a new drive for immediate payment of the adjusted compensation certificates if the Roosevelt administration seeks new and high inheritance and gift taxes. Senator Thomas (D., Okla.), who only Tuesday said the bonus issue was "dead" for this session, changed that attitude quickly when he learned of the apparently well-founded reports that the president is considering the tax proposal. "Just What Doctor Ordered" "We don't need new taxes to pay the bonus," he said, "but if new ones are proposed, we will certainly try to attach a bonus bill as a 'rider'."

Representative Patman (D., Tex.), whose "new money" bonus measure was vetoed by the president, said he would be "glad to co-operate in such a move."

They and other bonus advocates recalled that when Secretary Morgenthau appeared before the senate finance committee on the question, he declared bonus legislation would require new taxes.

Asked what he would suggest, the treasury head replied in a letter to Chairman Harrison (D., Miss.), that "from the standpoint of immediate feasibility no less than that of our fundamental objectives, the best source of additional revenue at this juncture would be a system of taxes on the receipt of inheritance and gifts."

Rep. Vinson (D., Ky.), who sponsored the American Legion bonus bill, rejected for the Patman measure, has insisted right along that the issue was not dead, and has said that he was "waiting for a break."

JAPAN MOVES ON IN NORTH CHINA

TOKYO, June 7. (AP)—A crisis in the tense North China situation appeared impending today as Japanese troops were on the move and the army received government authorization to apply pressure to the region south of the great wall.

Army transports were sailing from Japanese ports. It was officially denied, however, that these activities were directly connected with the Japanese military authorities' objectives in Chinese territory. A full report on the Sino-Japanese situation was submitted to Emperor Hirohito by Field Marshal Prince Kotohiko Kanin, chief of the army general staff.

Premier Keisuke Okada also conferred on the same problem with Foreign Minister Koki Hirota and Lieut. Gen. Toranosuke Hashimoto, vice-minister for war.

Outgoing members are Supt. Austin Landreth, Pendleton; Supt. R. R. Turner, Dallas, who have served for the last eight years, and Dr. Nelson L. Bussing of the University of Oregon, who has served four years. The commission, which will serve four years, will not adopt new books for Oregon grammar and high schools until November, 1936. The educators, however, will consider curricula changes before this date, according to C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction.

AUTHORITY DEBATED

Some Say Trade Commission Should Replace F. D. in Approving Codes

WASHINGTON, June 7. (AP)—President Roosevelt today accepted the resignation of Donald Richberg, head of NRA, effective June 16. That is the date of expiration of the emergency organization.

WASHINGTON, June 7. (AP)—A resolution to extend a skeleton NRA organization until April 1, 1936, and to authorize the President to approve voluntary codes was adopted today by the House and sent to the Senate.

This action came after President Roosevelt had emphasized at a press conference that all voluntary codes of fair practice must conform to the anti-trust laws.

Senate May Delay Action Senate leaders predicted the resolution would pass there without much difficulty, although some critics of the recovery law served notice they would attempt to hold it up for further study.

Chairman Harrison of the finance committee had planned to ask for its consideration and approval today, but Senators Borah (R., Ida.), and King (D., Utah), said they would seek delay. The latter announced he would ask to have the resolution referred to finance committee for study.

Richberg Not So Happy Meanwhile, Donald R. Richberg, NRA chief, said he did not know "whether anyone would advise the President" to apply the voluntary agreement plan to NRA because of the doubtful character of the situation.

Just before the final vote the House refused 107 to 282 to send the resolution back to the ways and means committee to draft a substitute to give the trade commission instead of the President the power to approve voluntary codes. The proposal was by Representative Treadway (R., Mass.).

HOUSE GRABS FILE OF CHAIN 'LOBBY'

WASHINGTON, June 7. (AP)—The complete files of the Food, Drug and Grocery Chain Stores of America, Inc. were seized last night from its offices in the National Press building here under a subpoena issued by the special house committee investigating alleged lobbying activities of the American Retail Federation, Inc. The organization is composed of 100 groups of the largest chain stores in the country.

It was understood that two truck loads of papers were moved from the corporation's offices by a representative of the house committee, who was accompanied there by John A. Logan, executive secretary and office manager, on the orders of Committee Chairman Patman, of Texas.
