

PORTLAND LUMBER UNIONS TO BACK MUIR'S PROGRAM

PORTLAND, Ore., June 7.—(P)—Frank Johnson, executive secretary of the Portland local of the sawmill and lumber workers' union, declared today that union groups in this city were not entering into the controversy over the basis of settlement of the lumber strike, but were standing behind the program of the American Federation of Labor boys.

His comments were made during a interview on the inter-union fracas which flared up at Aberdeen and grew earlier this week. Johnson's attitude was declared to indicate the Portland unions are fully in accord with the plan of A. W. Muir, official in the lumbermen's union, which calls for a maximum wage minimum and a maximum week of 40 hours. Portland lumber in the main accepted the plan proposal which was approved by the northwest council at Longview.

The BEARDED ISLAND



PASSED up by Columbus and other navigators for more than a century, Barbados, easternmost island of the West Indies, became the possession of Great Britain in 1605, or 1625—historians aren't quite agreed—and has been under British rule since. It was when the British vessel "Olive," or "Olive Blossom," as some call it, stopped there that some of its crew landed, set up a cross, and inscribed on a tree the legend, "James, K of E and this island."

But the name goes back probably to the Portuguese, who were believed to have stopped there long before and named the island "Las Barbadas," the bearded, from the shaggy view its fig trees gave them at first. The stamp shown here illustrated the "Olive," or "Olive Blossom," flanked by the island's peculiar hanging vines whose branches take root when they touch the ground.
