Scoring nine runs in the seventh and eighth innings, Washington came from behind to defeat the Philadelphia Athletics, 11-6. Bob Johnson, major league home run leader, hit No. 14.

WEYBRIDGE, Eng., June 8.—(AP)—Helen Wills Moody captured the St. George's Hill tennis tournament today, trouncing Mrs. Elsie Goldsack Pittman of England in the final round, 6-0, 6-4.

Playing in her first tournament since a back injury forced her to default to Helen Jacobs in the final round of the American championships in 1933, Mrs. Moody overpowered her British opponent with a siege-run attack for which Mrs. Pittman had no adequate defense.

The 29-year-old Californian raced through the opening set, dropping only 11 points. She ran into a 4-1 lead in the second set before Mrs. Pittman got under way. The English girl rallied to draw within one game at 5-4 but Mrs. Moody applied the pressure again to take the tenth game, set, and match.

It was the third successive tournament in which Mrs. Pittman has been a finalist and the third in which she was beaten.

JOHNSON CAPTURES NORTHWEST OPEN

YAKIMA, Wash., June 8.—(AP)—Jimmy Johnson, professional of the Tacoma Country club, is the new Pacific northwest open golf champion. He won the crown from Amateur Eddie Hogan yesterday, but the margin was only by two strokes after the crack Portlander closed in fast to nose out Neil Christian, Yakima pro, for second place. Hogan copped the title last year in Portland.

Jimmy, termed the "runner-up kid" and the "practice champion" by his colleagues, because of his many close finishes in the past, scored 73-71-74-75-293—five over par. Hogan carded 74-73-76-72-295, and Christian, 71-74-76-75-296.

Although rated as the second best professional in the state last year, this was the first major victory for Johnson since he started playing tournament golf about five years ago.

TAX TO SALVAGE NRA IS PROPOSED

ment the power to lay and collect taxes and to provide for the general welfare. The language in which this was done has confused scholars, but as far as the court is concerned there has been little question of the power to tax.

The supreme court frequently has held that the power to tax gives the power to control and regulate as well as "the power to destroy." This latter phrase was revived only recently when the court upheld a state tax on oleomargarine so prohibitive as to drive dealers in the product out of the state. The purpose of the tax was to help dairy farmers.

As long as the tax is imposed for the purpose of raising money the court has made no limitation on the taxing power when it is used for other purposes.

In the second child labor case the court threw out a tax on the products of child labor because it was the purpose of the tax to regulate intrastate commerce.

The court's rule has been that the regulation which is attempted under the taxing power must be a regulation which the government can enforce under other powers granted it in the constitution.

Those supporting the unemployment tax plan contend that it can be sustained if the federal government has the right to spend money for relief.

Raspberry Delight
3-4 c. sugar
1 c. water
2 t. gelatine
1 box raspberries
2 egg whites
1 t. lemon juice
Pinch of salt
1 c. whipping cream.

Boil sugar and water together, soak the gelatine in two tablespoons of cold water and dissolve over hot water. Pour syrup over stiffly beaten egg whites, add gelatine, then the raspberries which have been crushed. Add salt and lemon juice and freeze to mushy consistency. Then add whipped cream. Stir twice during freezing.—Mrs. F. G. Bennett, 804 E. 21st Street, Eugene.

Raspberry Fritters
1 c. flour
1 1/2 t. baking powder
1/4 t. salt
1 egg
2-3 c. milk
1 pt. fresh raspberries. (Red or Blackcaps can be used).

Sift dry ingredients together. Add beaten egg and milk, beat until smooth. Stir in raspberries. Drop into deep hot fat, turning gently until brown. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and serve hot.—Grace Mead, 321 B St., Springfield.
