

DOG QUESTION IS REFERRED TO CITY COMMITTEE MONDAY

WHAT THE COUNCIL DID
REFERRED dog licensing matter to judicial committee.
DISCUSSED weed killing on neglected lots, took no action.
REFERRED care of bottle irrigation system to park commission.
VOTED to purchase new police car.

Declaring it was too late in the year to take any action regarding further regulation of dogs in the city, the city council Monday night referred this matter to the judicial committee for a complete investigation with the view of taking some action at the first of the year.

W. L. Wheeler, county dog law enforcement officer, was present and expressed doubt if the city should enter the "dog regulation business," pointing out that during the present year 532 dogs in the city have been licensed. However, since the city has no formal application to the county dog control board, the municipality does not receive its 80 per cent of the fund which would be available if the city applied for and obtained a city dog control officer.

The council discussed the matter of burning off weeds and rank growth on vacant lots, but took no definite action. A suggestion that the project be started with costs assessed against property was discarded as requiring too much bookkeeping. A proposal that transient labor be brought out to the complaint that the city receives virtually no labor from the federal transient camp.

Complaints were read stating that goats and chickens kept at a house at Nineteenth and Orchard constituted a nuisance, the property being owned by the city. The council was assured by Councilman Lamb, of the street committee, that the matter would be settled.

SPRINGFIELD, June 11.—(Special)—At the meeting of the city council Monday evening H. J. Cox of Eugene was named as acting auditor during the absence of O. V. Breese for two or three months.

The council also authorized the fire chief, Hugh Jolliff, to attend the State Firemen's school which will be held at Corvallis June 12, 13 and 14.

A petition, carrying the names of residents in the vicinity of Kelly, Mill and H streets, was presented to the council and the Mountain States Power company asking for an extension of the water main from Mill to Kelly streets on H, and also for a fire hydrant at Kelly and H streets. The petition was referred to the water and light committee and the power company.

The council voted to renew the lease to the government for the beacon property on top of Willamette Heights for the year beginning July 1, 1935, and extending to June 30, 1936.

A motion carried to pay a night fireman to stay at the fire hall and at the meeting the council members approved the new construction work which will be done at the Adams Feed and Seed store.

the state cities, had the low all-state average of 4.5 per cent.

The average interest rate for 14 cities over 5000 population, excluding Portland, was 5.3 per cent, while the rate for the next 12 cities, from 2500 to 5000 population was 5.4 per cent.

The remaining 123 cities under 2500 population also averaged 5.4 per cent.

Hood River, paying an average of 4.7 per cent, ranks next to Portland in low rates. Ashland, Pendleton, Newberg, Eugene, and Albany, all average under 5 per cent.

An irregular tendency for utility bonds to bear slightly lower rates of interest than general purpose bonds was noted, while Hancock bonds averaged about one-half per cent higher.

Average rates increase markedly as cities become smaller the survey showed. Median rates are 5.3 for cities over 5000; 5.4 for cities 2500 to 5000; 5.7 for cities 1000 to 2500; 5.8 from 500 to 1000, and 6 per cent for the group under 500.

The average interest rates of cities in Oregon over 2500 population for 1934 were found to be as follows: Portland, 4.5; Hood River, 4.7; Ashland, 4.91; Pendleton, 4.93; Newberg, 4.93; Eugene, 4.93; Albany, 5.1; Medford, 5.23; La Grande, 5.27; Salem, 5.302; Hillsboro, 5.306; Roseburg, 5.38; Oregon City, 5.39; Corvallis, 5.40; Grants Pass, 5.42; Tillamook, 5.45; Dallas, 5.46; Klamath Falls, 5.52; Astoria, 5.537; The Dalles, 5.563; Coquille, 5.561; St. Helens, 5.59; Bend, 5.70; Marshfield, 5.8; North Bend, 5.9; and Burns, 6.

The figures compiled in the survey are for the year 1934, and already substantial reductions have been obtained by a number of cities which have refunded parts of their debt under the recent legislation, it is pointed out in the report. Similar reductions will doubtless be obtained by other cities, those making the report state.

NEW LAWS AFFECT MANY INTERESTS IN LAKE COUNTY

McKenzie boat fishing law as amended at the last session. This law was thus amended at the instigation of Lake county sportsmen after Portland sportsmen had made an attempt to remove the boat ban altogether.

Of primary interest to motorists is the law returning the right-of-way at street intersections to the car coming on the right. The previous section had changed this law to give the right-of-way to the car first in the intersection. Complaint was made that this led to speeding at intersections in order to "get there first" and in addition, made fixing of the blame in crashes difficult. Beginning Wednesday, cars on the left must yield the right-of-way to the machine on the right.

In this connection, traffic police pointed out that while cars entering "stop" streets must come to a full stop and yield the right-of-way to cars on the through street, it was not necessary for the motorist thus stopping to yield for an indefinite time. After cars in the immediate vicinity of the intersection have been given the right-of-way, the motorist has the right to proceed, even if a car on the through street is forced to yield to his approach, it was pointed out.

Museum Becomes Official
Under provisions of Senate Bill 205, the state of Oregon establishes an archaeological museum at the University of Oregon, with Dr. L. S. Cressman, archaeologist, in charge.

Dr. Cressman plans several trips this summer to obtain pieces for the museum which will be located in Condon hall on the campus, university officials announced. Additional quarters for the museum will be provided when the new library is constructed and the reserve library books are taken out of Condon hall.

The timber acquisition law permits the government to take up timber areas in counties, thus taking them off the tax rolls. Counties fought this law strenuously, contending it would cut into the county revenues, but the act was passed and becomes effective Wednesday.

The bill providing for civil service for firemen, upon the vote of people in cities over 5,000 in population, becomes effective Wednesday and Eugene voters will pass on this matter at the next election.

Other acts effective Wednesday are: The safety-responsibility act, the gasoline tax refund act, the act providing for non-partisan election of county high school superintendents, the law creating a state bar association with membership compulsory on all practicing attorneys, the act prohibiting payment for "position pushing" in the major address by Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt at the convention opened yesterday.

No mention was made of the AAA, which was both criticized and defended by some of the delegates attending the ten-day meeting of midwestern republicans.

LINE EXTENSION IN IRVING AREA NEAR

Construction of the Stewart power line extension in the Irving district, serving several families with power produced by the Eugene electric utility will be possible if residents of that area will sign an agreement to aid in building the line it was announced Tuesday following a meeting of the water board Monday night.

Residents are understood to have agreed to this feature informally, but a formal petition will be necessary before the board will authorize the work, it was announced by J. W. McArthur, superintendent.

It was believed that this action of the board virtually assured the construction of the line. It is estimated to cost approximately \$1800.

The board authorized payment of bonds, due July 1. The purchase of \$205,000 in interest to \$740,000, \$28,000 in water board bonds, for the sinking and depreciation funds, also was authorized.

Leave of Absence Granted to Breese
O. V. Breese, Springfield auditor requested an absence of 90 to 100 days from his duties in a letter read at the city council meeting Monday evening at the city hall.

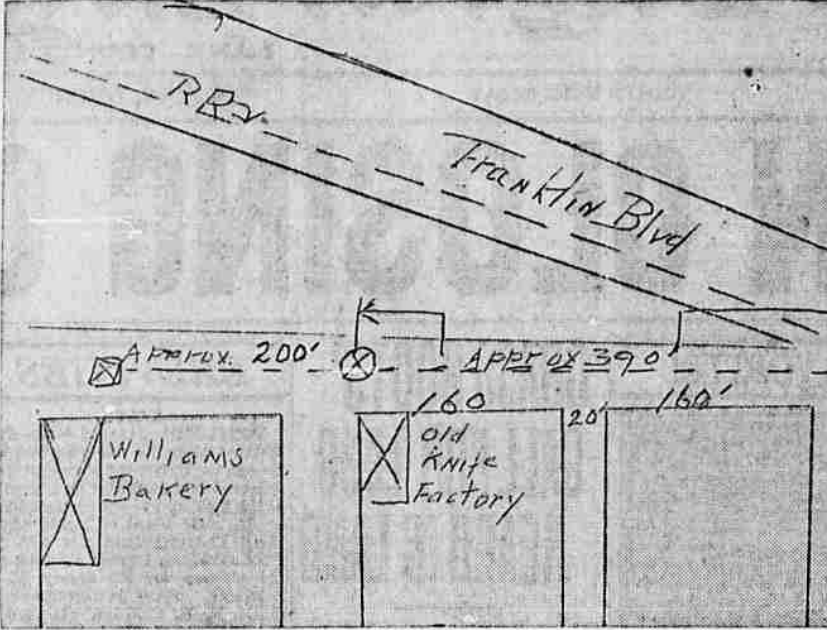

Blanc Mange with Raspberries
1 tablespoon granulated gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
2 cups milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1-8 teaspoon salt
3 egg yolks
1-3 cup sugar

Soak gelatin in cold water 5 minutes. Scald milk. Beat egg yolks, sugar and salt together and pour the scalded milk over the mixture. Cook over hot water until custard coats the spoon. Add gelatin and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Cool slightly and add vanilla. Pour into individual round (or square) Mary Ann Shell pans which have been rinsed in cold water. When ready to serve turn out on individual plates; fill with fresh raspberries (or any other desired fruit), and garnish with whipped cream. Serves four.—Mrs. W. R. Raspberry Bavarian Cream
1 package raspberry jello
1 cup boiling water
1 cup raspberry juice and cold water
4 tablespoons sugar
1 cup fresh raspberries crushed and drained
1/4 cup cream whipped

Method: Dissolve jello in boiling water, add raspberry juice and cold water and sugar, chill. When slightly thickened, beat with rotary egg beater until consistency of whipped cream. LEGISLATIVE AID TO BE SOUGHT FOR RELIEF FROM DOGS

The problem of dogs running at large in the city which has perplexed dog-lovers who wish to protect their pets from poison fluids, property shrubbery, and university professors who like to teach a class in comparative quiet, will probably be settled by the quiet matter to the legislature, according to Kenneth Shumaker who is working with a group interested in keeping the dogs from roaming at large.

The group has the view that dog owners should either keep their pets at home or in the country so that they will not become police victims and also not create a nuisance to neighbors.

Chapter 155, Oregon laws, 1931, provides that "on the petition of 20 or more legal voters of any incorporated city or precinct in the state being filed with the county clerk before the time giving notice of the general or special election in any year, the county clerk shall cause notice to be given that at such election a vote will be taken for and against permitting dogs to run at large."

Requests have been made to the city council for action in the matter, but the above section takes the matter out of its jurisdiction.

BROOKE ABANDONS ACCIDENT INQUEST

30 miles an hour while other witnesses said they were sure the car was going in excess of 40 or 45 miles an hour. The distance the machine traveled after the accident was pointed out by witnesses as indicating a high rate of speed. The machine continued across the street at an angle, going over the curb near the Williams Bakery plant.

Floyd Wetzel, employee at the bakery, told officers he heard the machine cross the railroad tracks and saw the actual impact, but could not tell whether or not the boy had turned in front of the car. He estimated the speed of the car at 50 miles an hour.

F. O. Hastings, grocer, also witnessed the crash and estimated the speed at more than 45 miles an hour. He said the boy apparently was intending to turn across the street, but he was not sure that he actually had started to turn.

In addition to Troland, passengers in the car were Bill Cooper, Darrell Miller and Lucy Ann Wendell, all students at the university.

In addition to his widowed mother, Estes is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Louis Chappell, Mrs. Helen Shipman of Edna, Kansas, Mrs. Ruth Coghill, of Emporia, Kansas; and two brothers, Archie of Salem and Earl of Kansas. Funeral services will be announced later.

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
