'Showdown' Reported Near In Strike Situation Along Columbia

FEELING RUNS HIGH

Union Leaders Challenging Right of Executive to Disturb Agents

SALEM, June 13.—(AP)—Orders for the immediate concentration of the entire state police force and a statement that "it will be just too bad for any interference," was Governor Charles H. Martin's reply today to threats that 8,000 union men would picket the Bridal Veil Lumber company plant near Portland.

Threats that thousands of men would be sent to the scene of yesterday's strike disorders followed dispersing of a group of about 175 men by state police last evening.

"Just Too Bad for Mobs." "It will be just too bad for the 8,000," the governor declared. "It means nothing but insurrection and defiance of the constituted law authority. There will be no crowd permitted at that mill if it is necessary to place the full authority of the state behind the order."

The order for immediate mobilization of the state police force from the entire state, consisting of about 140 men, was issued to Superintendent Charles P. Pray at 10 o'clock today. He ordered Pray to be ready to "meet the mob."

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HUNDREDS DIE IN EXPLOSION OF NAZI PLANT

BERLIN, June 13.—(AP)—The big explosives works at Heilsdorf, 52 miles southwest of Berlin, where 13,000 persons are employed, blew up at 3 p. m. today with the deaths estimated variously between 100 and 1,000. Practically every worker in the place was injured.

ROOSEVELT APPROVES OREGON FLOOD BILLS

The first was for the Coquille river, the second for the Umpqua river and its tributaries, and the third was for the Nehalem, Miami, Killebis, Wilson, Trask, and Tillamook rivers in Tillamook county.

BEGGS FOOD; KEEPS LOOT IN SATCHEL

Livingstone Woman Positive 'Beggars' is Fugitive In Kidnap Case

DESCRIPTION VIVID

Hunt Turns to Yellowstone Region in Belief Man Is Hiding There

LIVINGSTON, Mont., June 13.—(AP)—Hunger drove William Mahan, hunted like a wolf in the Weyerhaeuser kidnaping, into the home of a Livingston woman where he begged for food and gave department of justice agents their first definite tip on his whereabouts today.

Carrying a little black satchel that might have contained the missing \$80,000 of the Weyerhaeuser ransom, Mahan boldly entered the garden of Mrs. C. E. Jeffries.

"Please, lady, could you give me something to eat?" he asked.

Lady Doesn't Like Looks Mrs. Jeffries, struck by his dapper dress, Oxford gray suit, pearl colored hat, kid gloves and neat black satchel, was suspicious and turned him away.

"He was too well dressed to be a beggar but I did not recognize him immediately as the hunted man," Mrs. Jeffries said. "It was Tuesday when he called. After I thought it over I notified authorities."

May Try Tourist Racket Police and department of justice agents were quick to get on the new trail of the elusive Mahan and officers said he apparently had joined the tourist flow into Yellowstone national park. There are no banks in the park and police believed Mahan might have headed there believing he could pass his "hot" ransom money without suspicion.

Mrs. Jeffries said she was positive the beggar was Mahan, who escaped Sunday from Butte, Mont., abandoning \$15,155 of the ransom and his car.

Clerks in a store near the Jeffries home said the man later purchased food from them and they were struck by his resemblance to Mahan after they saw newspaper pictures of the fugitive.

It was the second time Mahan has been driven by hunger to beg for food, since he hurdled a back yard fence and outdistanced Detective J. E. Mooney at Butte, At Dillon, Mont., he appeared in a hotel and begged for food or money and then made a move as if he was going to hold up the place but fled when guests entered the lobby.

L. A. POLICE HOLD MAHAN 'SWEETIE'

LOS ANGELES, June 13.—(AP)—A woman whom sheriff's deputies said they had reason to believe might be the sweetheart of William Mahan, hunted Weyerhaeuser kidnaper, was taken into custody today. The woman gave the name of Peggy Shaw. She was questioned in the county jail.

The woman, also known as Peggy Radford, was arrested at Newhall on a Tacoma warrant. She is 22 years old. She told Captain Norris G. Stensland she knew nothing of the kidnaping and was not acquainted with Mahan.

The warrant on which she was arrested charged her with embezzlement of an automobile. According to Tacoma authorities, she purchased the automobile there several days ago and promised to return the next day with the money. She had not been seen since. Stensland said the woman had agreed to waive extradition.
