

### THREE MEASURES GO TO VOTERS IN ELECTION OF '36

SALEM, Ore., June 13. — (P) — Three measures will appear on the ballot at the general election Nov. 3, 1936, it was announced today by David O'Hara, election clerk in the state department. Time for filing referendum petitions ended last night with but one measure referred to the electorate. Two others were referred by the legislature. Additional measures may be placed on the ballot by initiatives which would have to be filed by July 3, 1935.

The three measures are:

The referendum on the law making payment of \$15 a year student fees compulsory at the higher institutions of learning.

The legislative act changing the date of the primary election in Oregon from May to September.

The constitutional amendment affecting the salaries of members of the legislature. This would change section 23, article IV to make it read: "The members of the legislative assembly shall each receive such compensation as may be provided by law."

The constitution now limits the pay to \$3 a day or \$120 maximum for any regular session and \$3 a day for the 20-day limited special sessions.

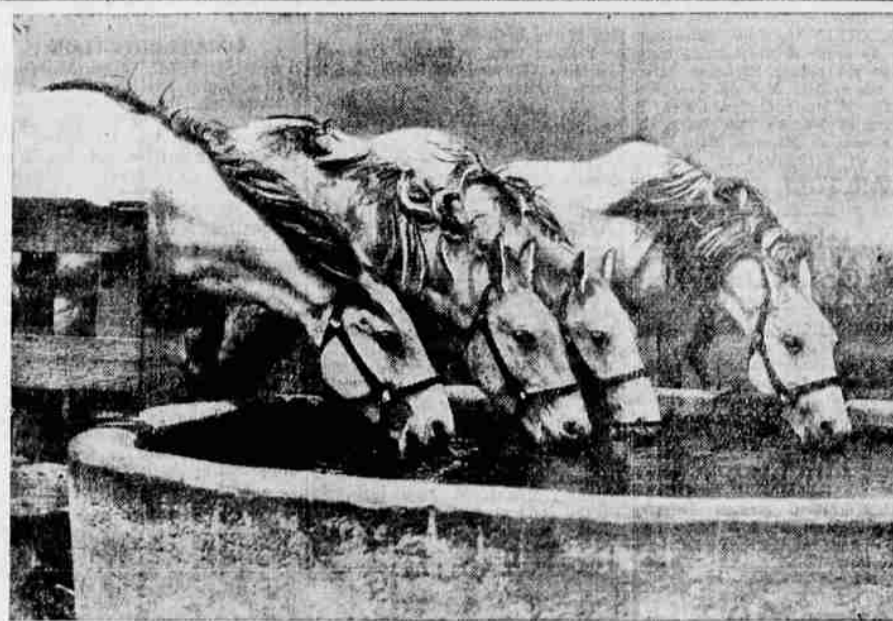

### Race of Supermen May Result From Gland Extract Find

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 13. — (P) — Discovery of a gland extract which may produce a race of "supermen" was reported today as 12,000 physicians of the United States and Canada met for the opening of a joint convention of the American and Canadian medical associations.

A colony of squeaking white rats in tiny cages demonstrated to the gathering scientists a development of thymus gland extract, from the secretions of calves, which speeds growth and maturity to an unprecedented degree. The extract is being tried on humans.

Dr. Leonard G. Dowdette of Philadelphia Institute of Medical Research and the Philadelphia general hospital, directing the experiments, reported that rats treated with the extract reproduced in one-eighth of normal time and lived longer than others of their species.

### F. D. SAYS PAROLE ABUSES MUST STOP

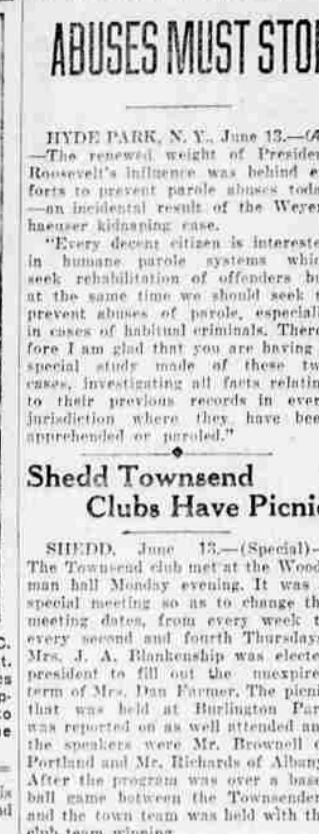

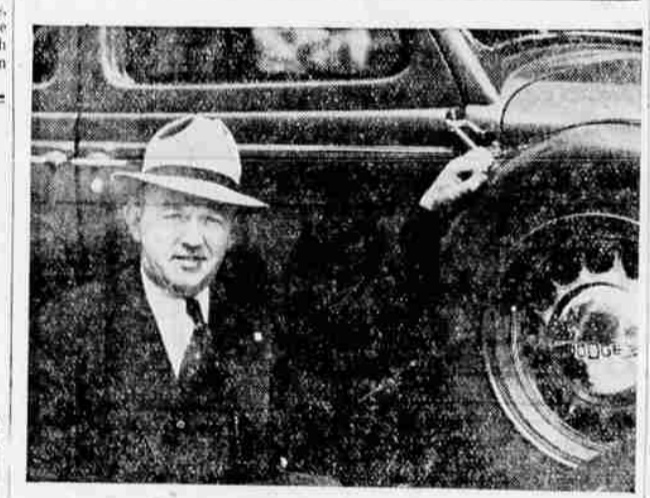
