

UNIONS TO TEST MARTIN POLICIES IN COURT TRIALS

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by an opinion on martial law issued by Attorney General L. H. Van Winkle.

"If law enforcement officers are unable to suppress breaches of the peace, or to prevent tumult or riot, or there is imminent danger thereof, you have the power and authority as governor of the state to declare martial law," the opinion said.

The opinion, written by Assistant Attorney General Ralph Moody, also declared:

"Where picketing is permissible, it must be carried on and maintained in a lawful way and must not have any tendency to intimidation, or any tendency to obstruct free passage to and from places of employment."

Opinion Bolsters State's Case
Moody's brief was to be presented today in Judge Crawford's court as a defense against injunction proceedings aimed at Superintendent of Police Charles P. Pray and Sheriff Martin T. Pratt of Multnomah county (Portland).

In commenting on his request for an opinion from the attorney general, Governor Martin declared:

"This flying squadron (of pickets) organized for the purpose of descending upon a business operation, does, by mere numbers, intimidate employees who want to work, endanger the operation of industrial plants and endanger peace and safety."

Only one witness was heard this morning. He was William Wedell, president of a Sawmill and Timber Workers' local, who charged that Deputy Sheriff Christofferson had called him names and that he was struck with a club "no less than 100 times" when the pickets were being forced to march along the highway from the Bridal Veil mill.

Governor Martin's promise that lumber trucks would be given police protection "from point of origination to destination" an dthe state board of conciliation's report to the governor hat neither employers nor employees are ready for arbitration of the differences existing in the lumber industry in Oregon comprised the only other major developments of the day.

GRAND JURY FINDS DRIVER BLAMELESS

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railroad crossing and a short distance east of the alley between Villard and Moss streets, as a result of a collision with an automobile driven by Clifford Troland westward on East 13th avenue. At this point the street was clear at the time of the collision, the bicycle and automobile being the only vehicles traveling at that point.

"The witnesses vary in their estimates as to the speed of the Troland car, but from all the evidence we find that its speed was not excessive."

"The evidence was conclusive that immediately prior to the impact

Glenn Estes, without giving any signal or looking backward, suddenly turned his bicycle sharply to the left within eight or ten feet of the Troland car, and then rode the bicycle directly into the path of the Troland car, and that the Troland car immediately turned sharply to the left in an attempt to avoid the collision. The right fender and bumper of the automobile struck the bicycle almost broadside. Had the bicycle continued without turning there is no doubt the automobile would have passed the bicycle without striking it. As the automobile approached the bicycle from the rear, the bicycle was traveling about three or four feet from the north curb.

"Immediately following the collision, the Troland car went at an angle of about thirty five degrees to the south curb, where the two left wheels ran onto the grass parking and the car continued in a practically straight line done the parking almost to Moss street, after which Troland drove the car across the street and parked it."

"In our opinion Clifford Troland

did his best to avoid a collision after observing the bicycle turn.

"It is regrettable that the accident happened, but we cannot conscientiously find that Clifford Troland was criminally responsible."

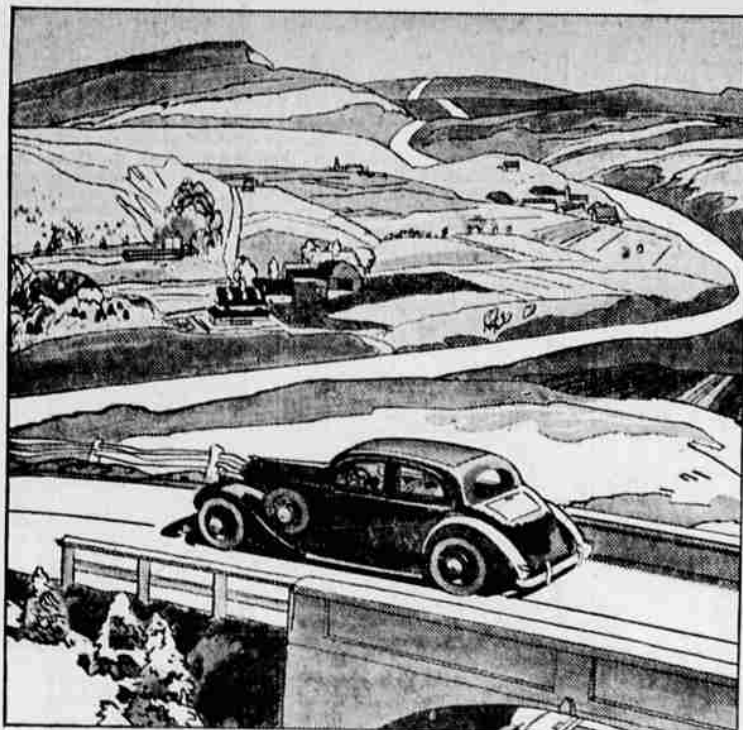
