Paul Vedder and son Alvin Vedder of Creswell have started up a shingle mill in the Dexter district. The mill

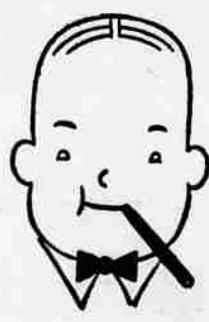
is known as Vedder and Vedder. The Lewis Lumber company is supplying the cedar for the shingles.
